








Three Efficient Secretaries Keep Things Going

About 59 per cent of the students are enrolled in a mathematics course. It is possible that other courses may be added to the mathematics curriculum. Possible courses are: Calculator Mathematics, Computer Mathematics, and Calculus.










We Are Great, We Are Fine


The first class effort consisted of selling concessions at the first four home football games and the first three home basketball games. Although the weather conditions seemed unfavorable, team effort make the project a success.

The Pep Band, consisting of twelve of the High School Band members, played at all of the home basketball games. They did a great job of keeping the school spirit high. They also played both school songs.












NHS Gives Recognition to Outstanding Students





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Bradley's Braves Show Spirit; Support Team



Annual Staff Meets Their Deadlines








