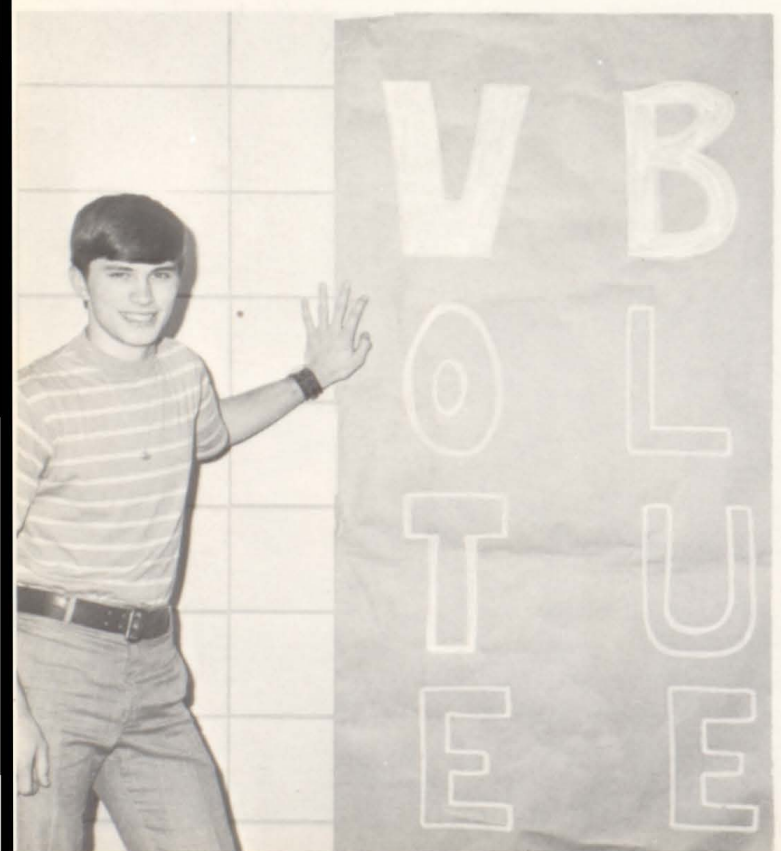

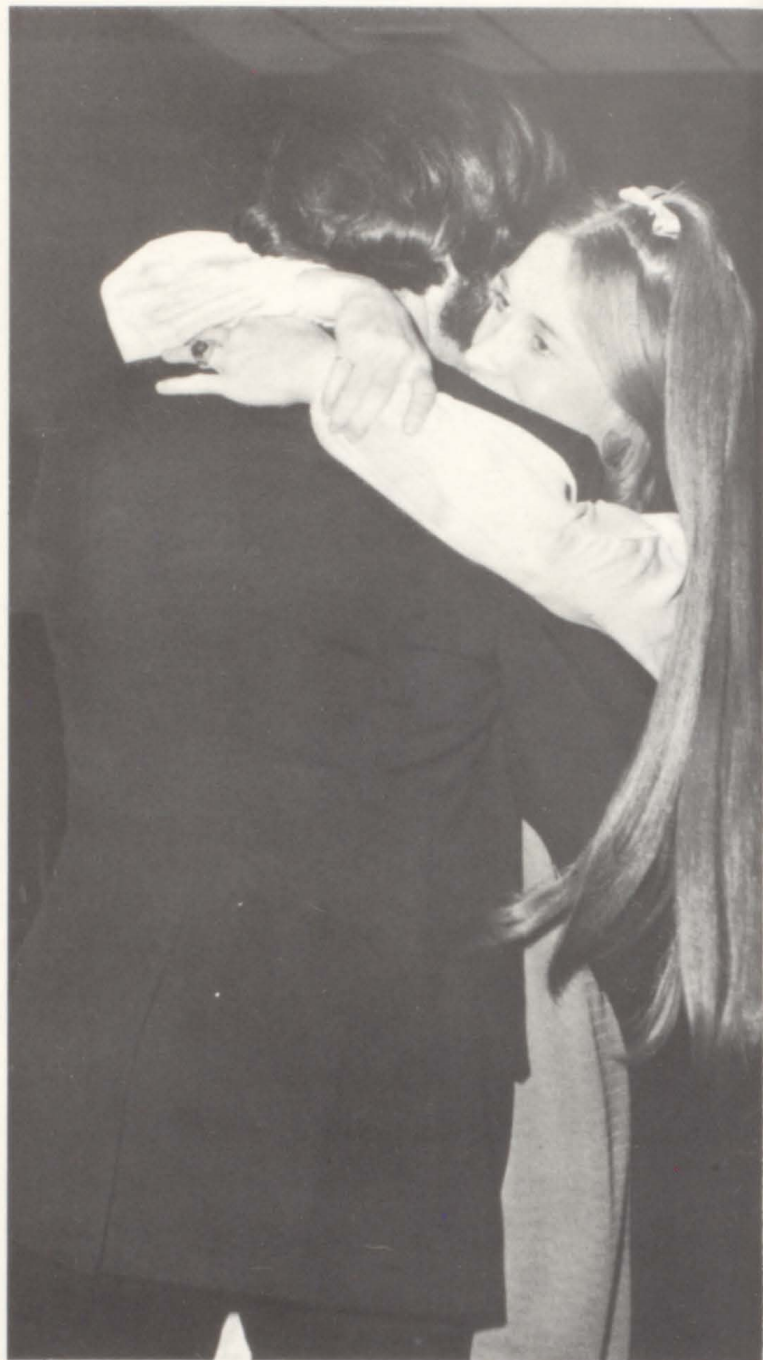
“Come Together”

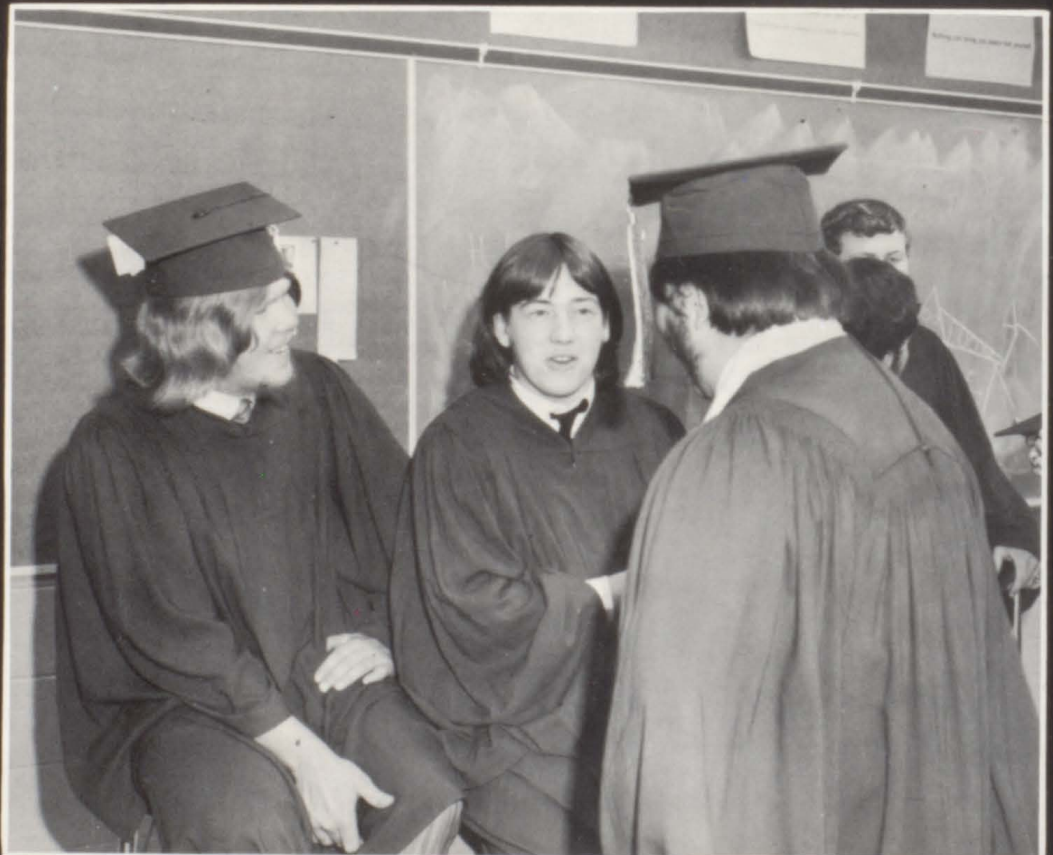




HAIL WAWASEE SENIORS

The three-fold Independent Study program at Wawasee involves three major areas: the Learning Resource Center, the Commons, and the Quiet Study Hall. These three areas, along with the Audio-Visual Aids Center, make available to the student body the necessary environment and materials needed for study.

Both the Commons and the Quiet Study Hall are supervised by either a teacher or a secretary. The Learning Resource Center is under the supervision of Mrs. Whiteman and her assistant Mrs. Schacht.

Mr. Ritchie is the school corporation Audio-Visual director. He has ready access to five hundred permanently owned films, seventy projectors, and various other pieces of equipment. The L.R.C. has increased to four thousand three hundred volumes of books. The amount of periodic literature has grown steadily with eighty different sources.



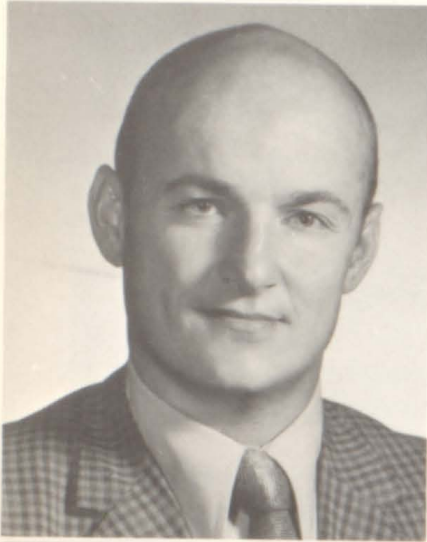

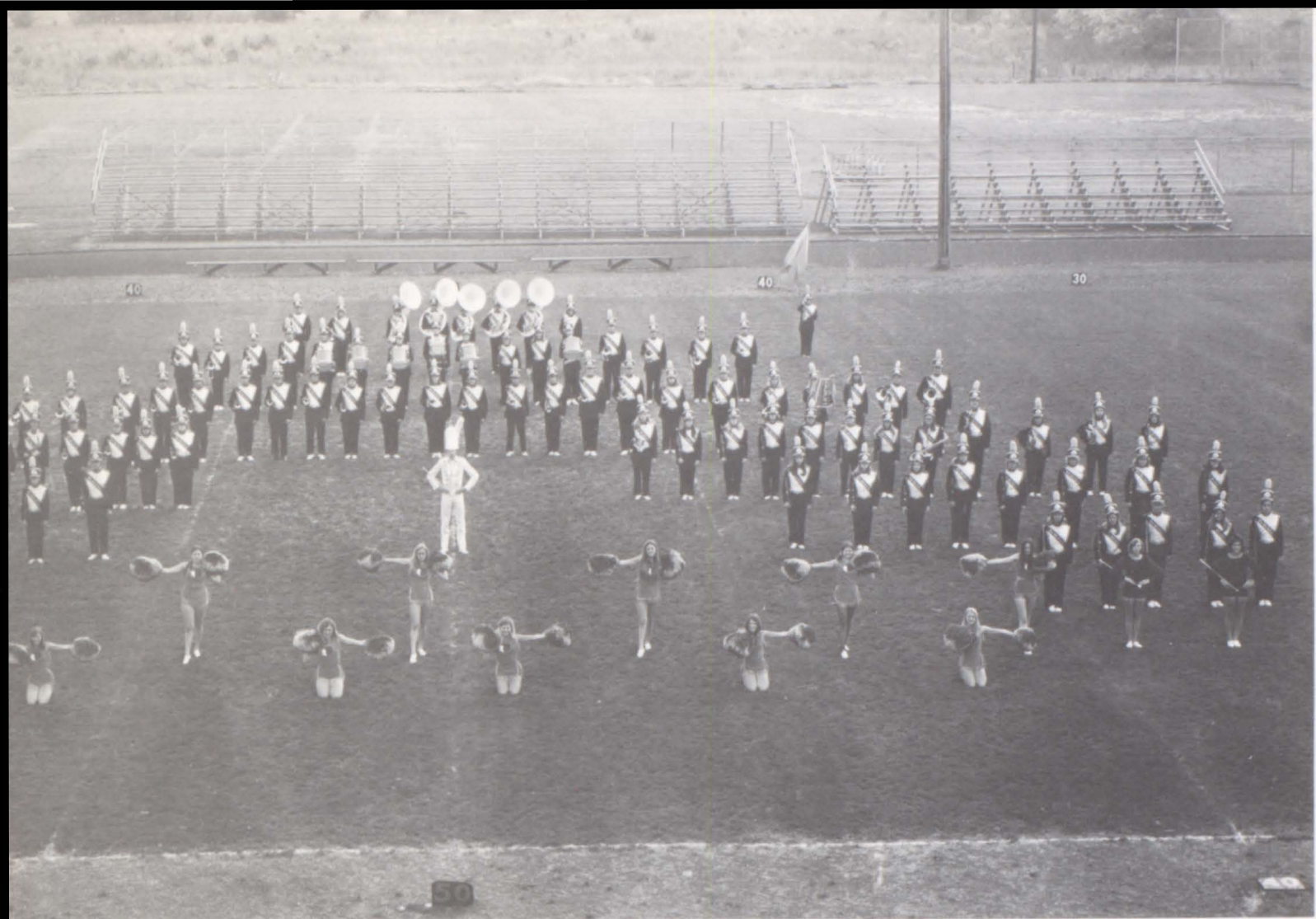

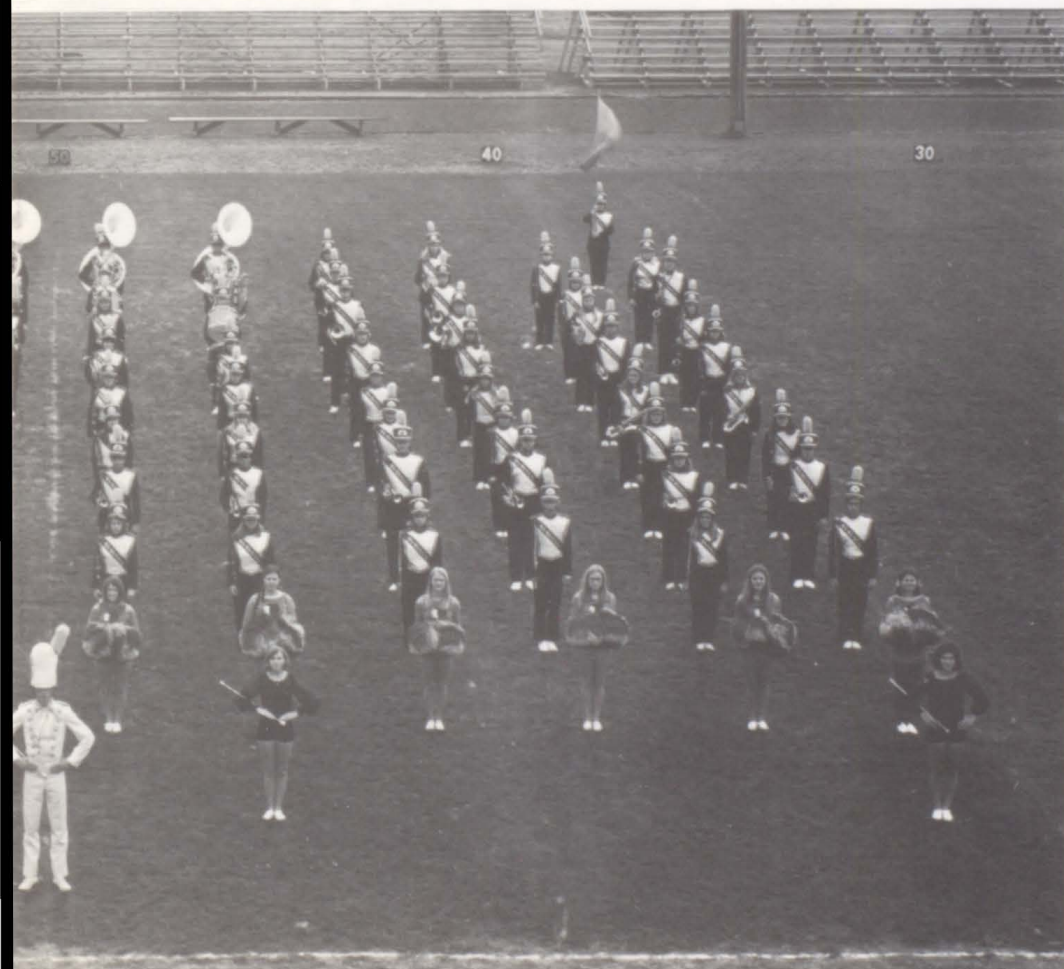

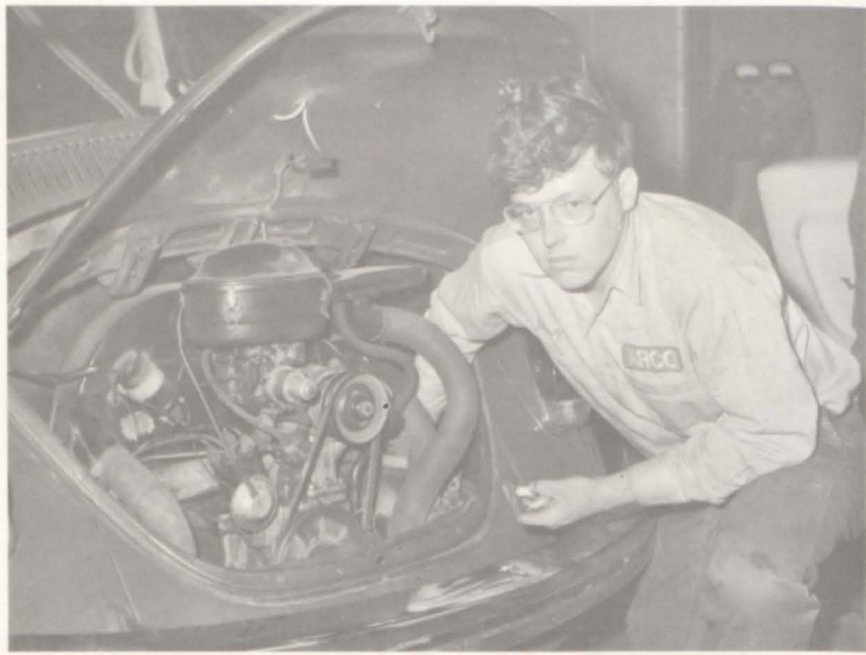


Industrial Arts—A Growing Field

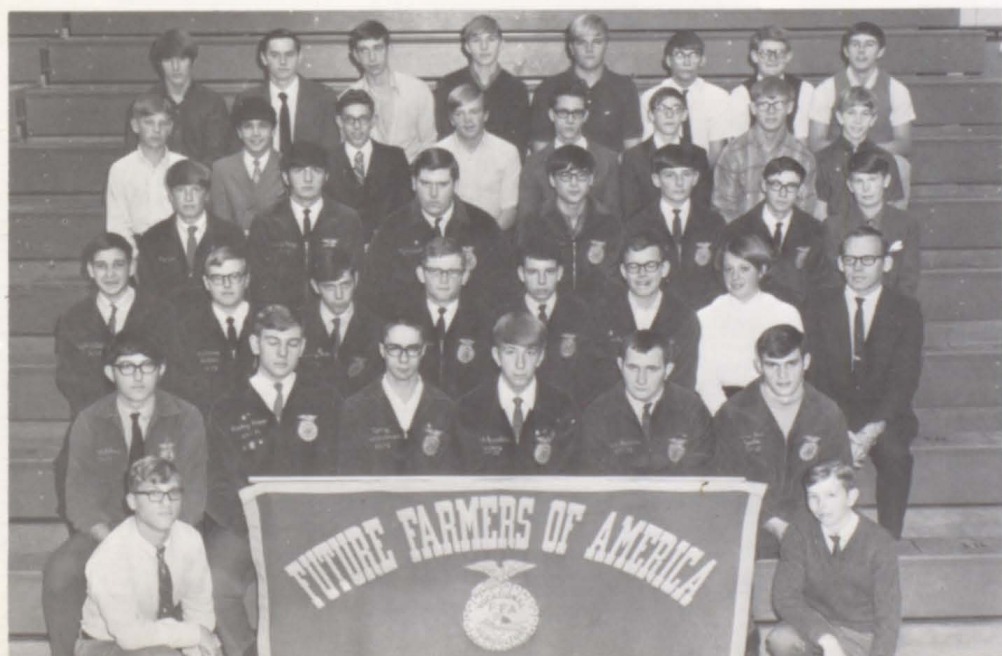
F.F.A. Competes in Dairy, Soil, & Livestock Judging

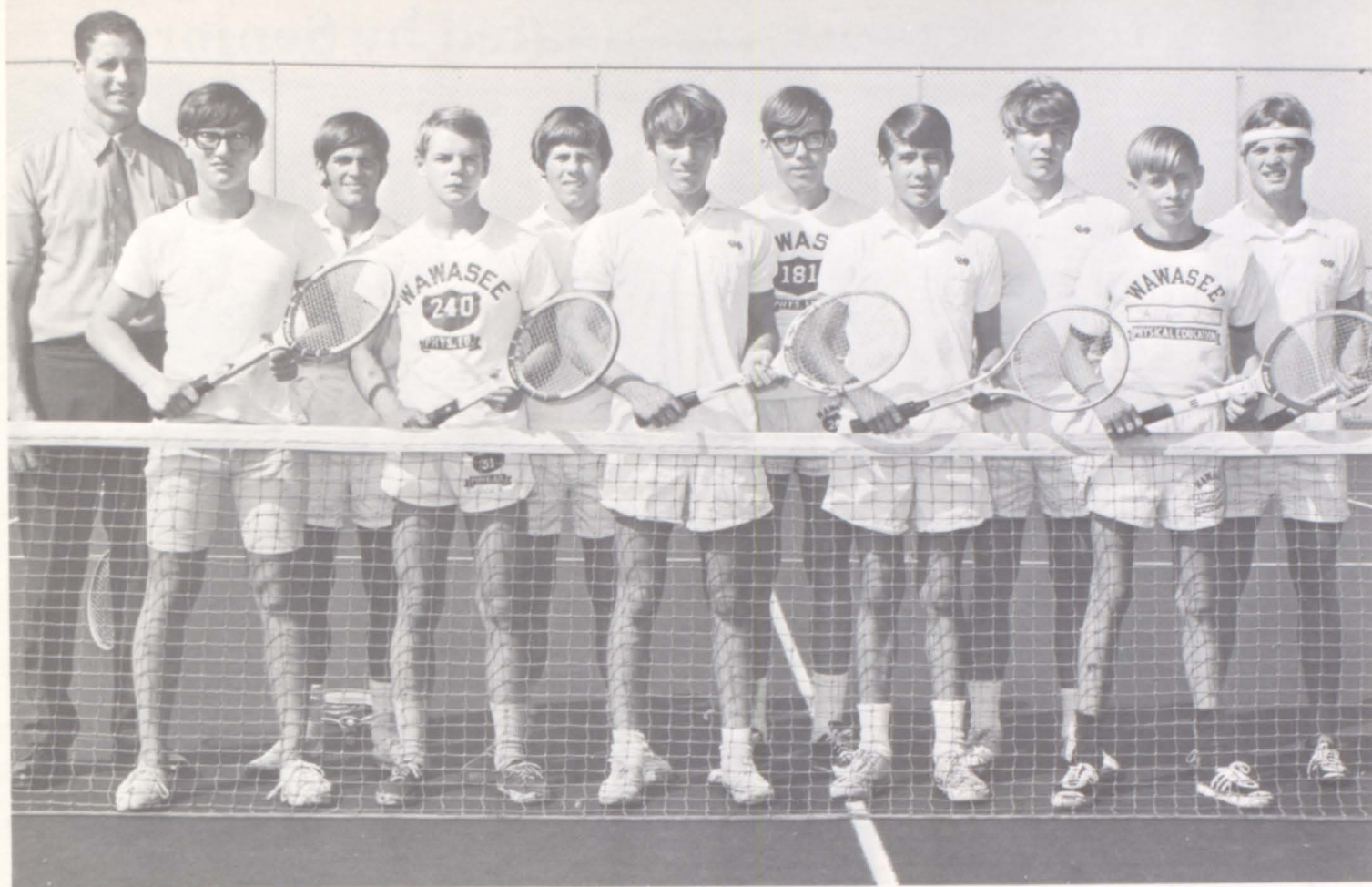

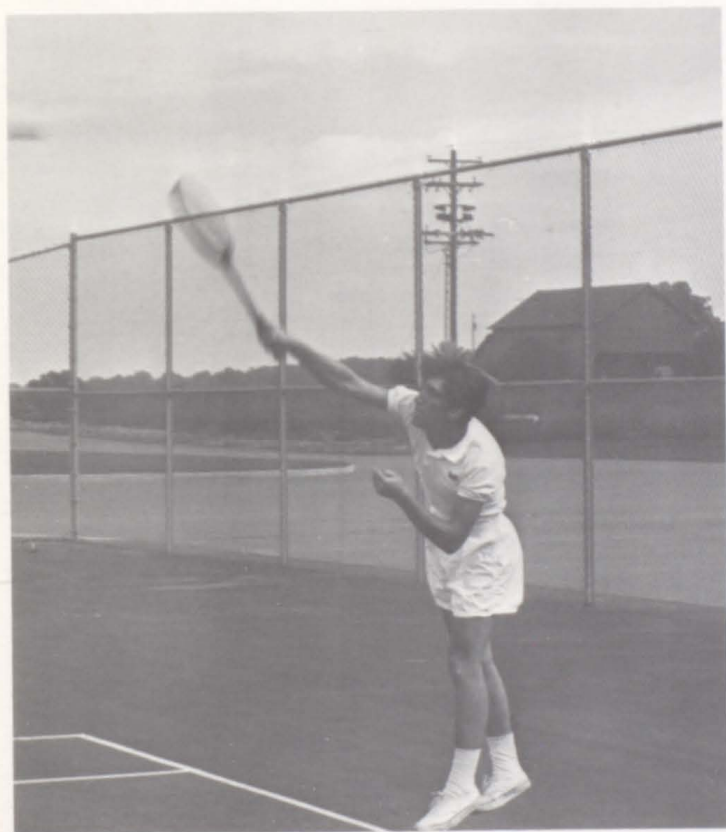

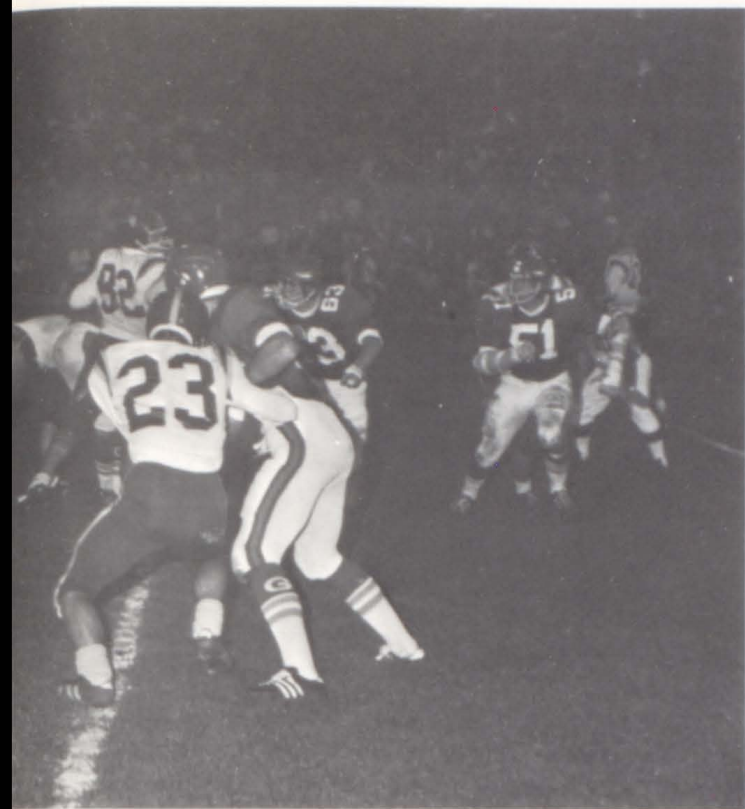

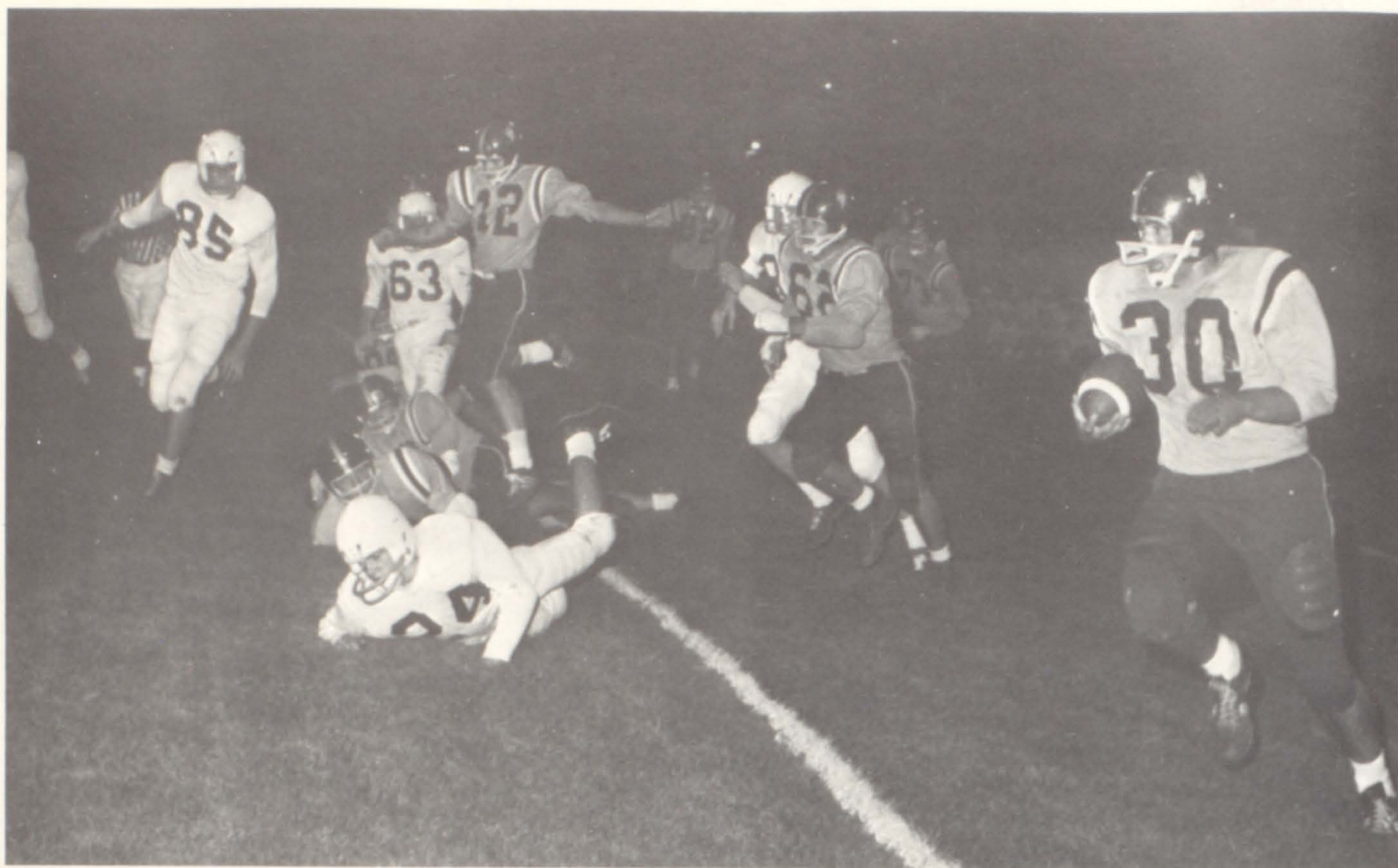

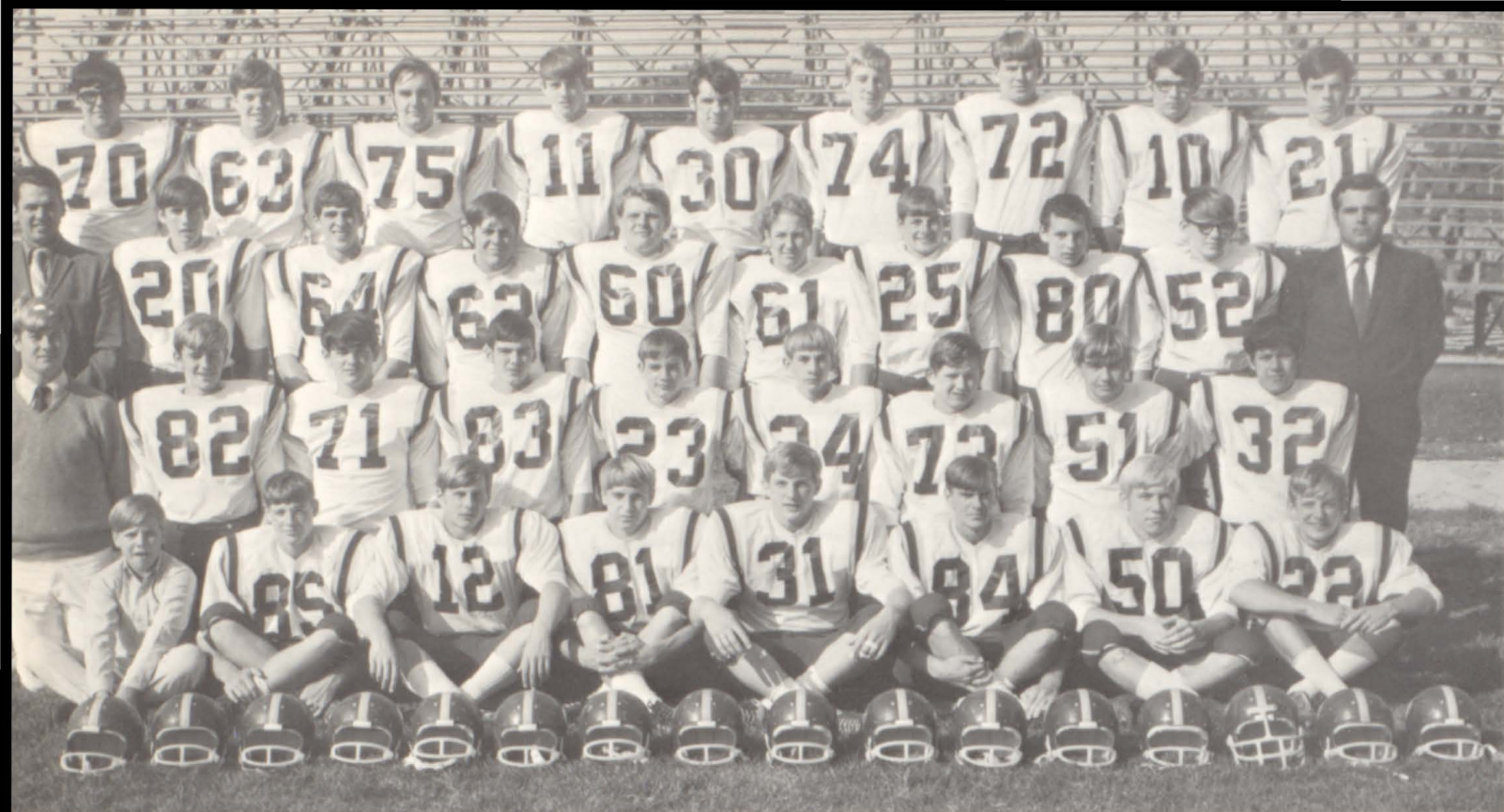

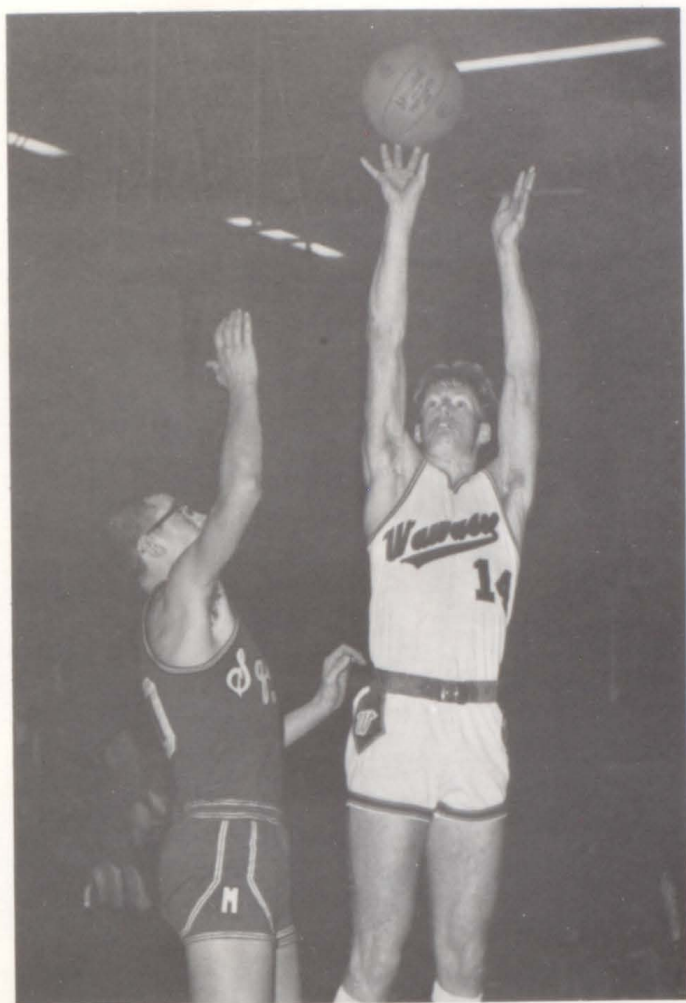


Junior, Mark Workman attempts to score against Manchester.

Senior, Mark Thomas pulls down a rebound without any interference.



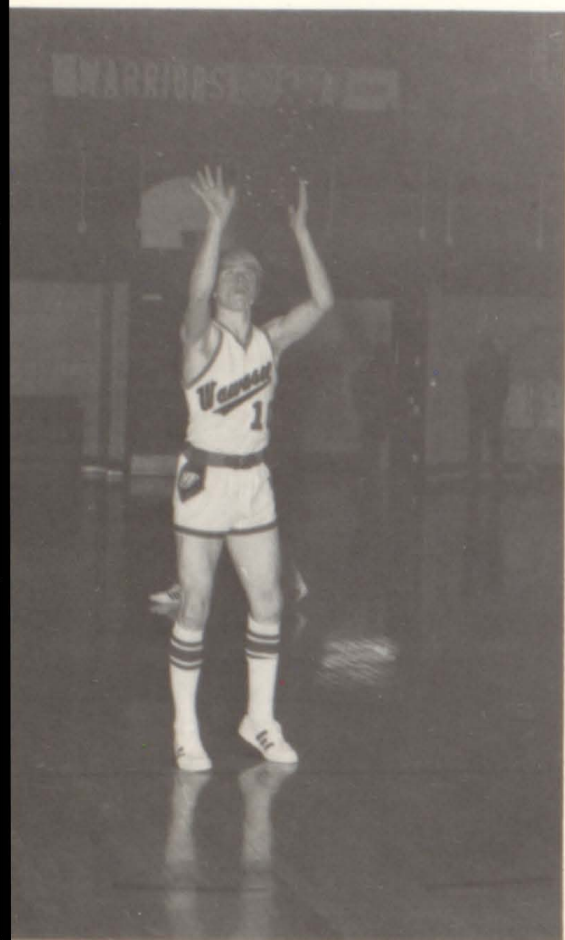
