
















Intramurals Played the Game










Academics

Science institutes summer program





Student wins "Good Citizen" award








Wawasee Concert Series


Students experiment with airplanes




Students get fit in gym class














Library helps students in learning


Wawasee acquires new principal

Underclassmen



Warriors Take to the Hoops



Wrestlers are Sectional Champs

Coach Welborn told the Wawasee Wrestling Team at the beginning of the season, "You have to have a dream." Commitment and hard work paid off as the dream became a reality. Wawasee captured the sectional title, scoring 211 1/2 points; the closest team to that score was East Noble with 166 points. Eleven wrestlers advanced to regional competition, eight of whom were Sectional Champions. Wawasee placed fourth at regionals with 73 points.
