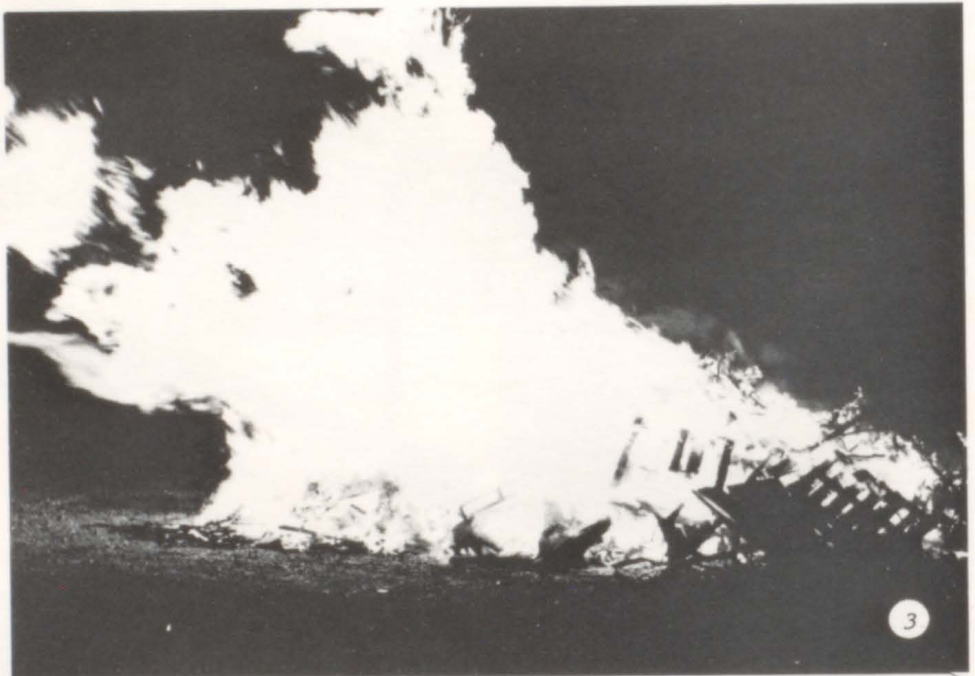


We get excited

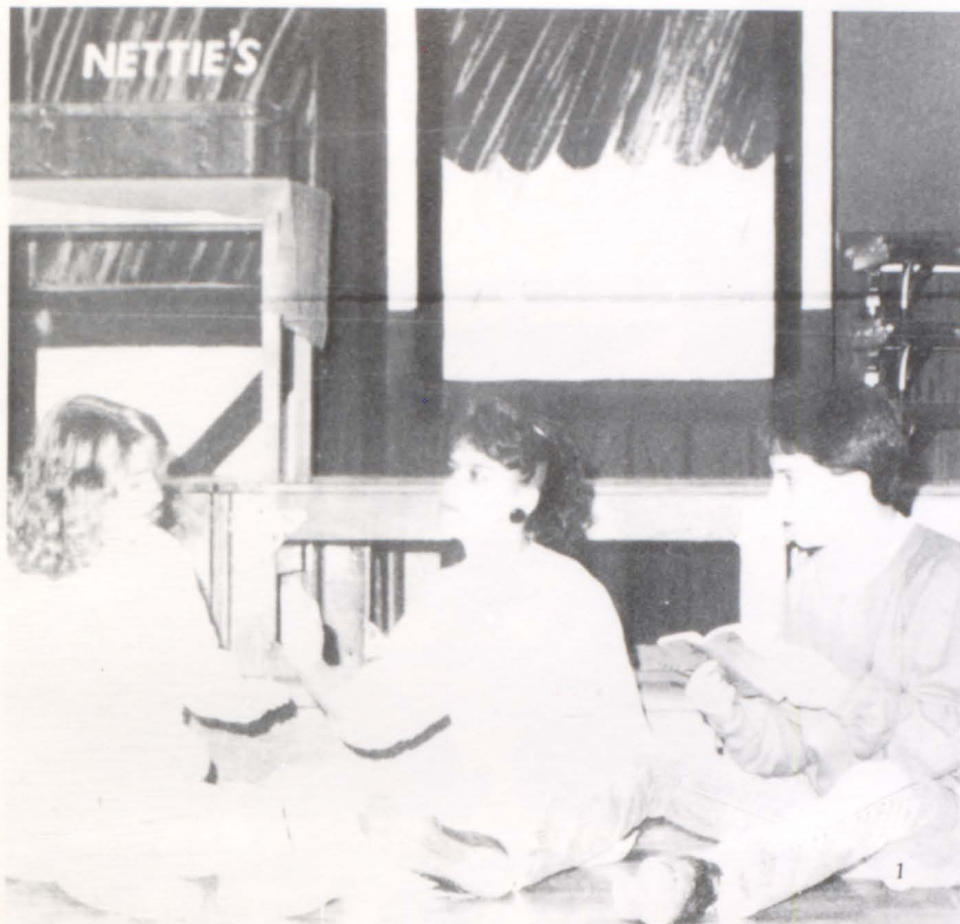
Going 'round with Carousel

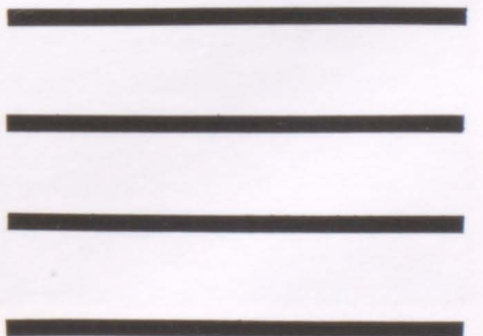
“A Knight in Camelot”

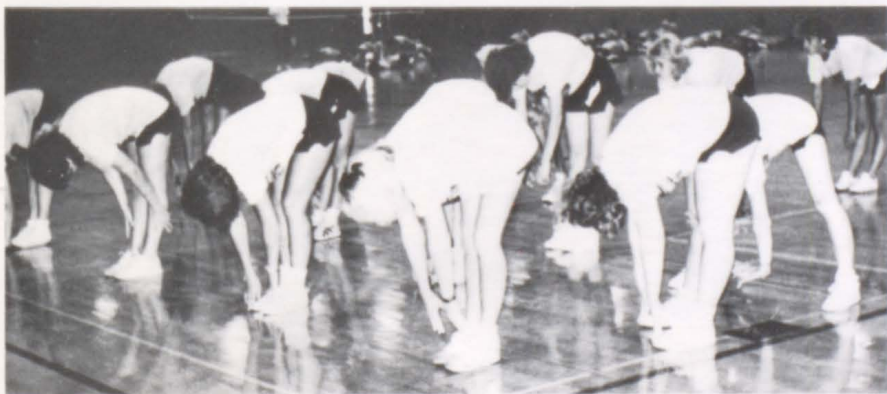

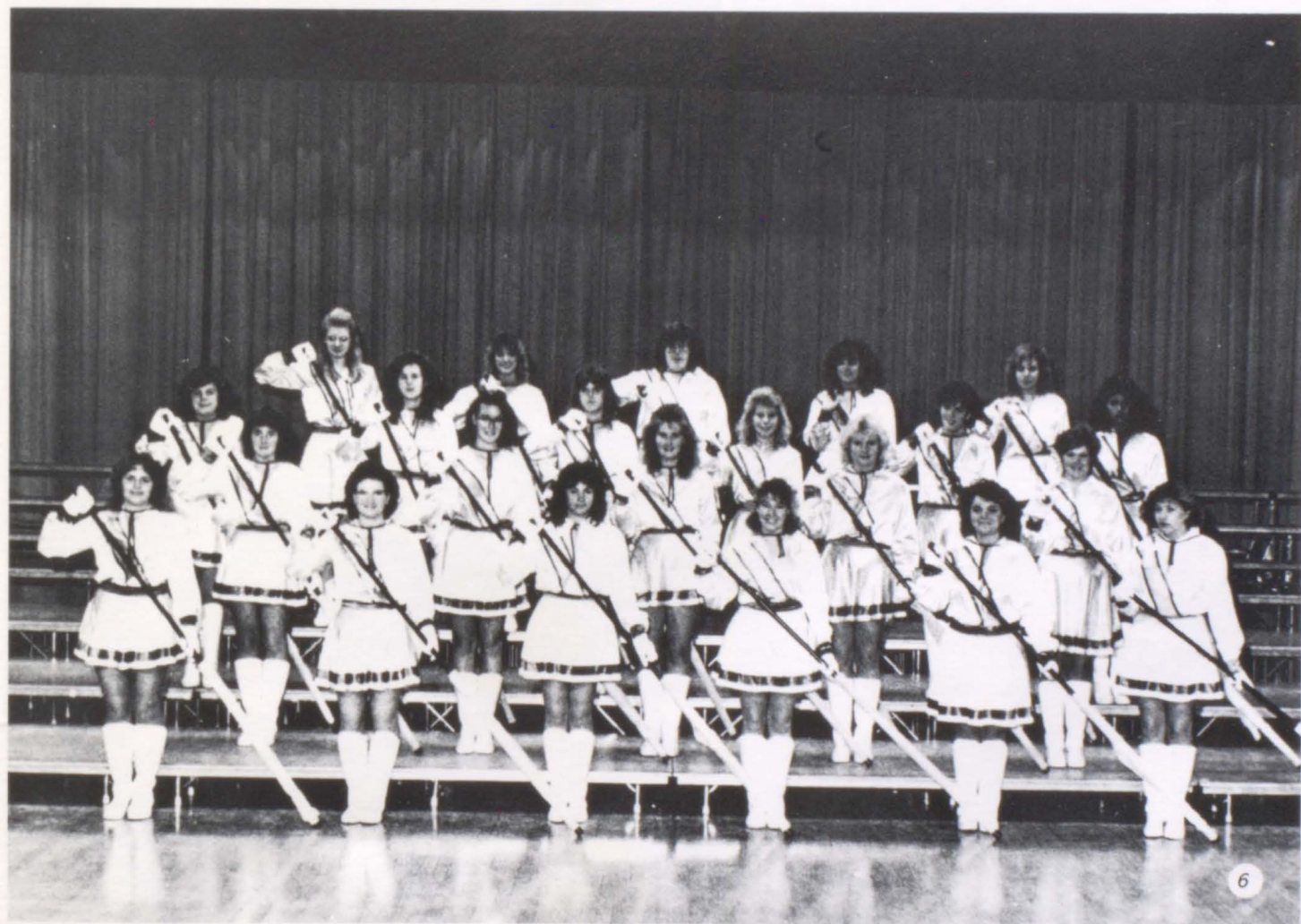


Marching Warrior Pride

Choir students join Dream Company





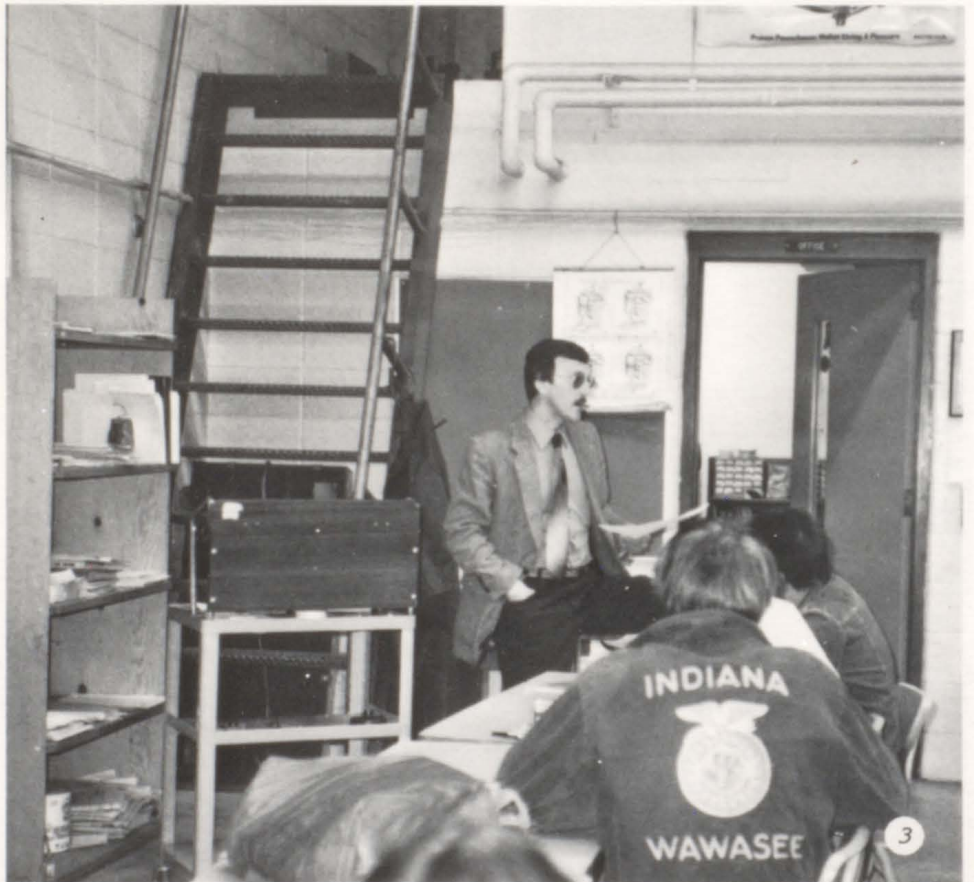

Learning new trades

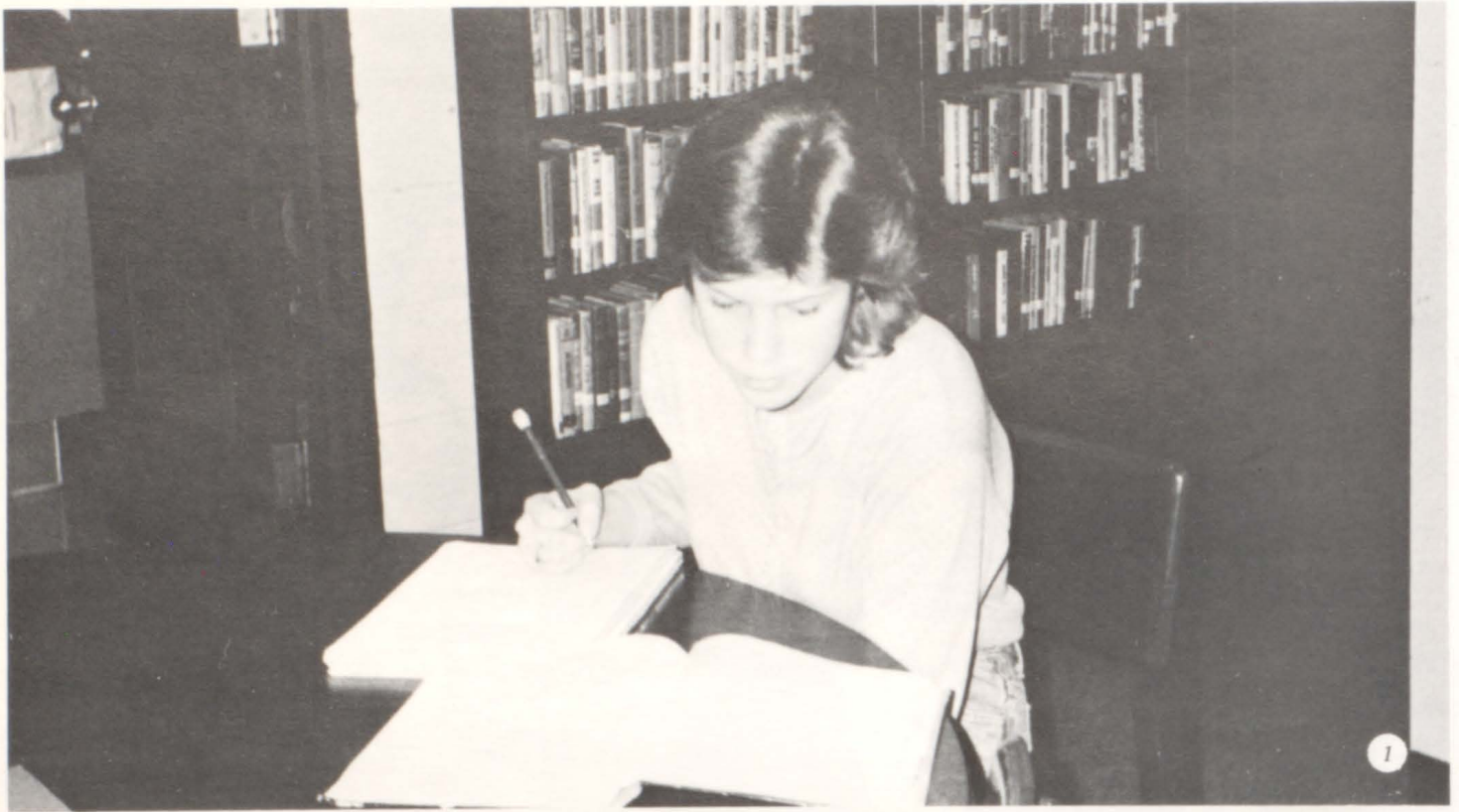

Science acquires new room

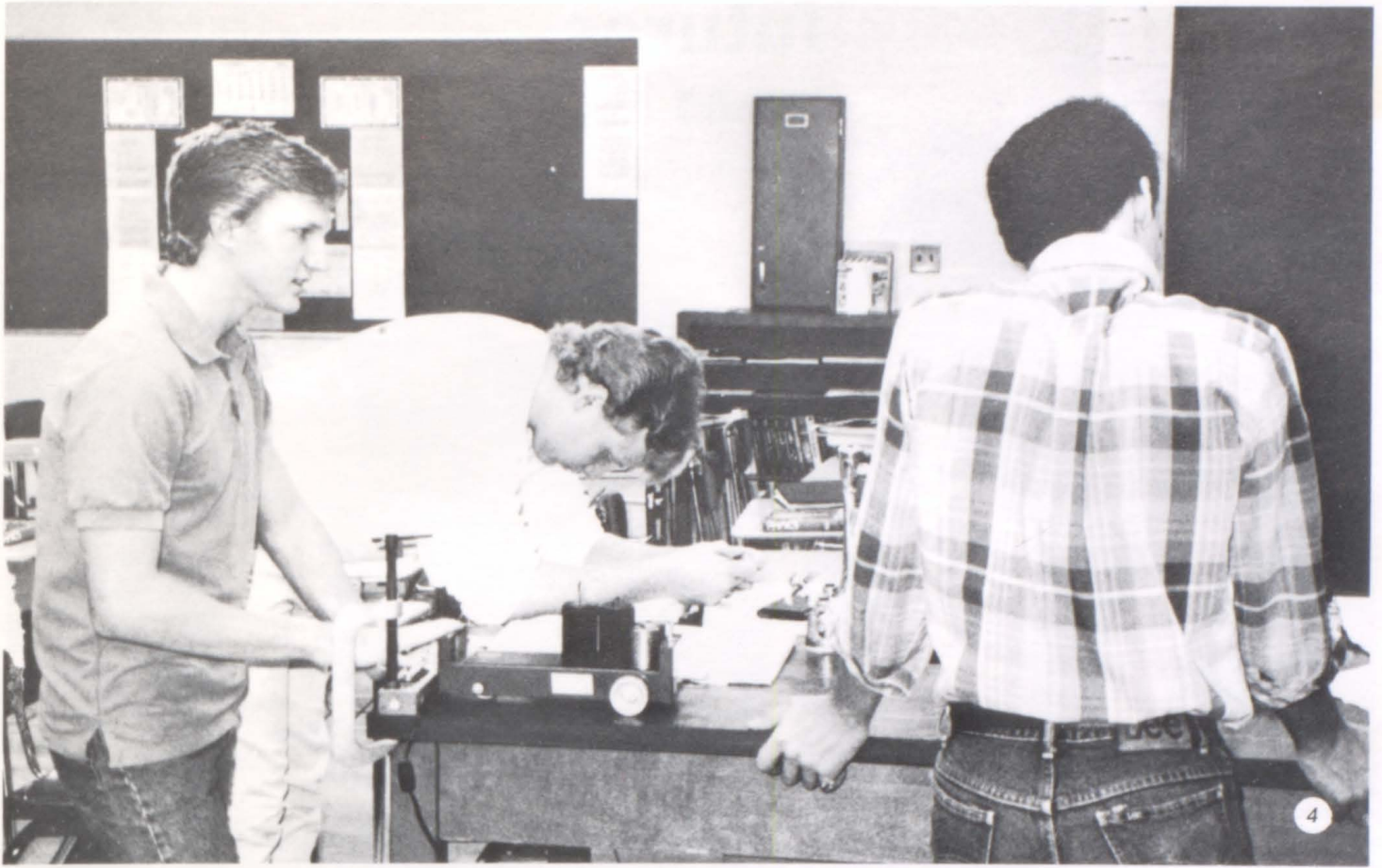

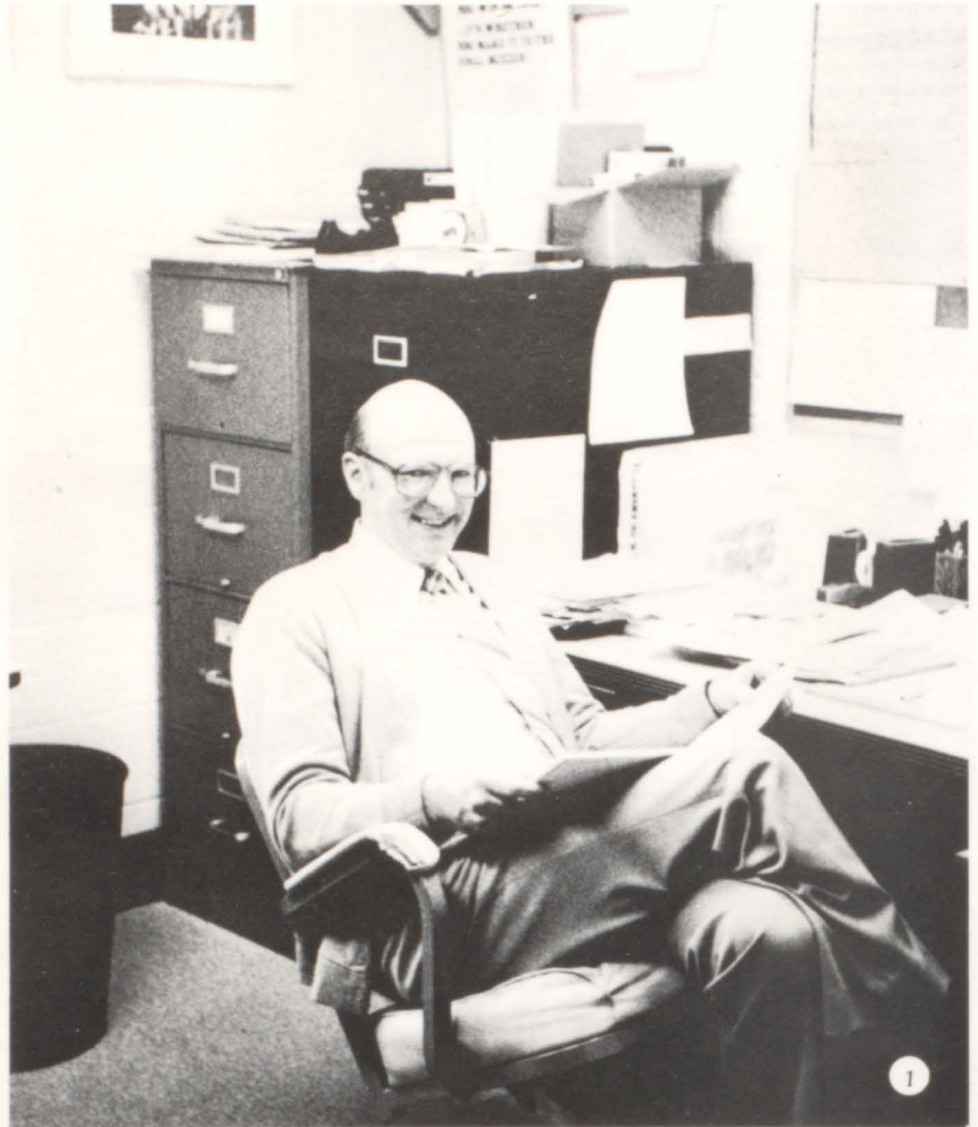




Guidance aids in the students' futures

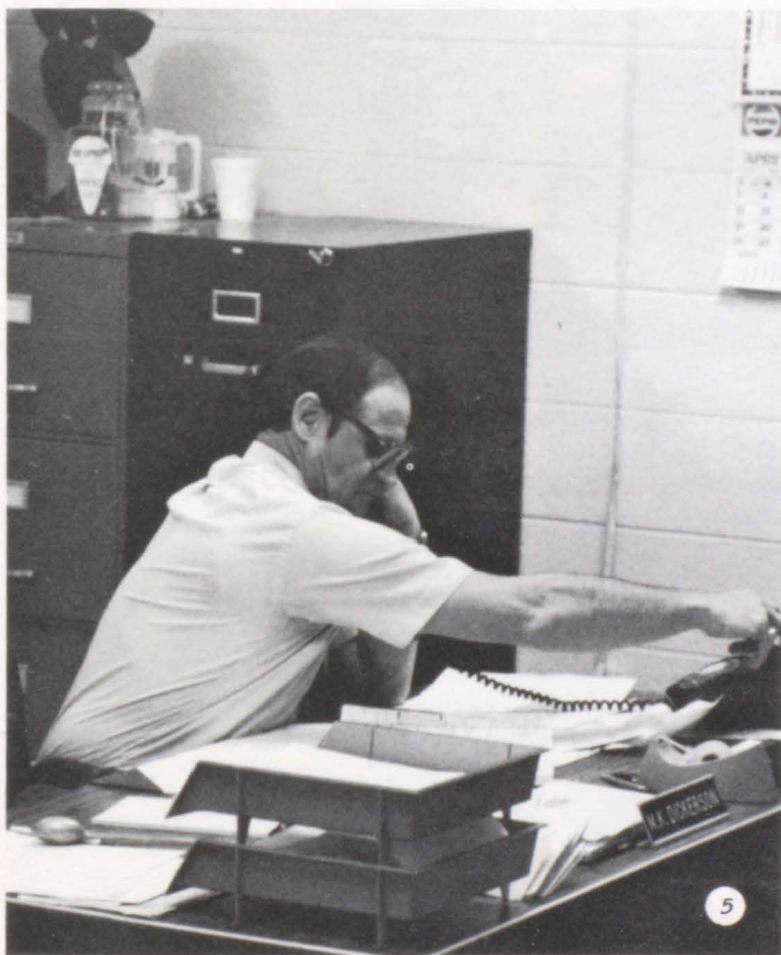
Administrators work on improvements

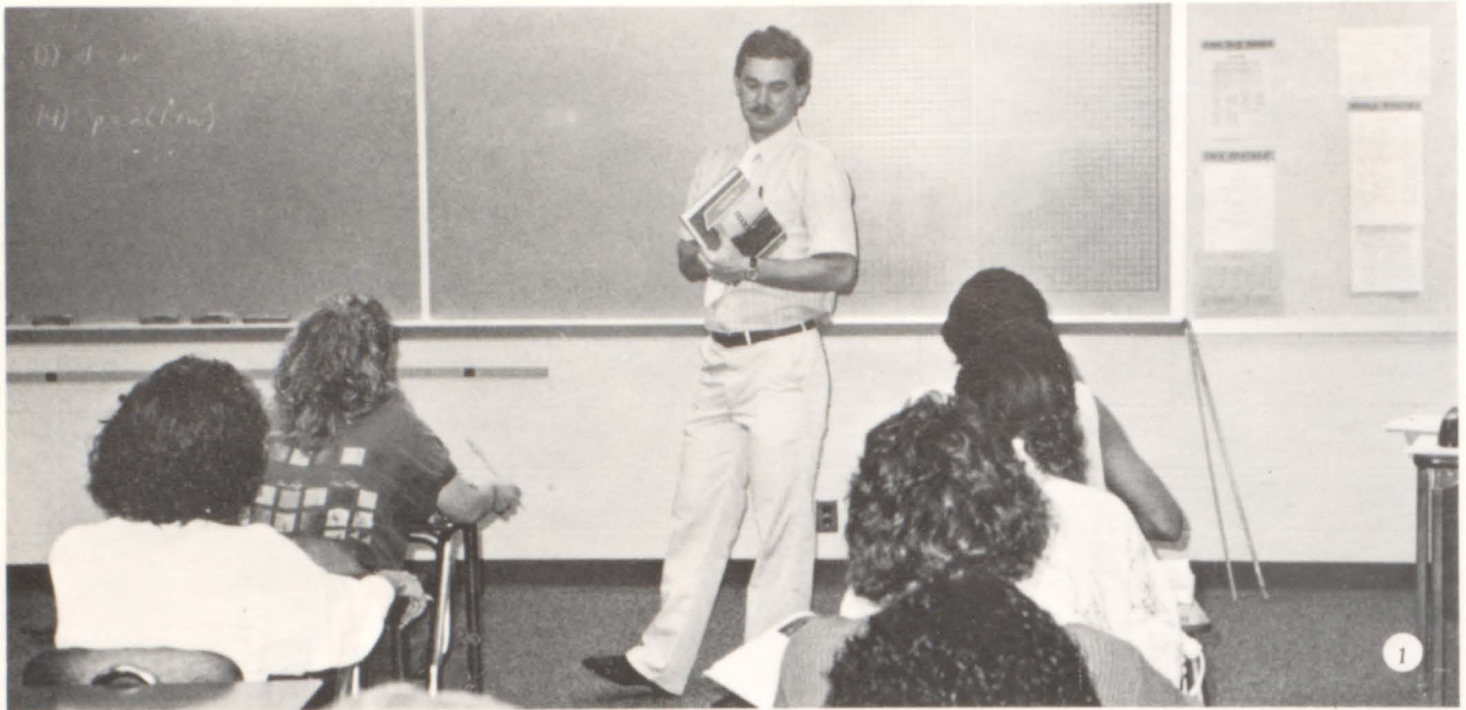

Math updates course to help students



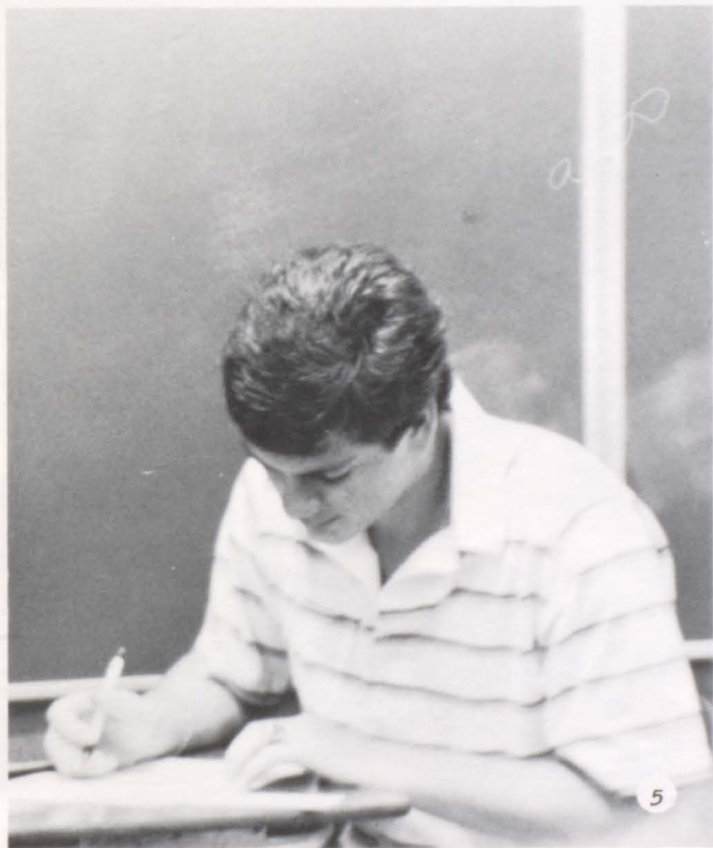
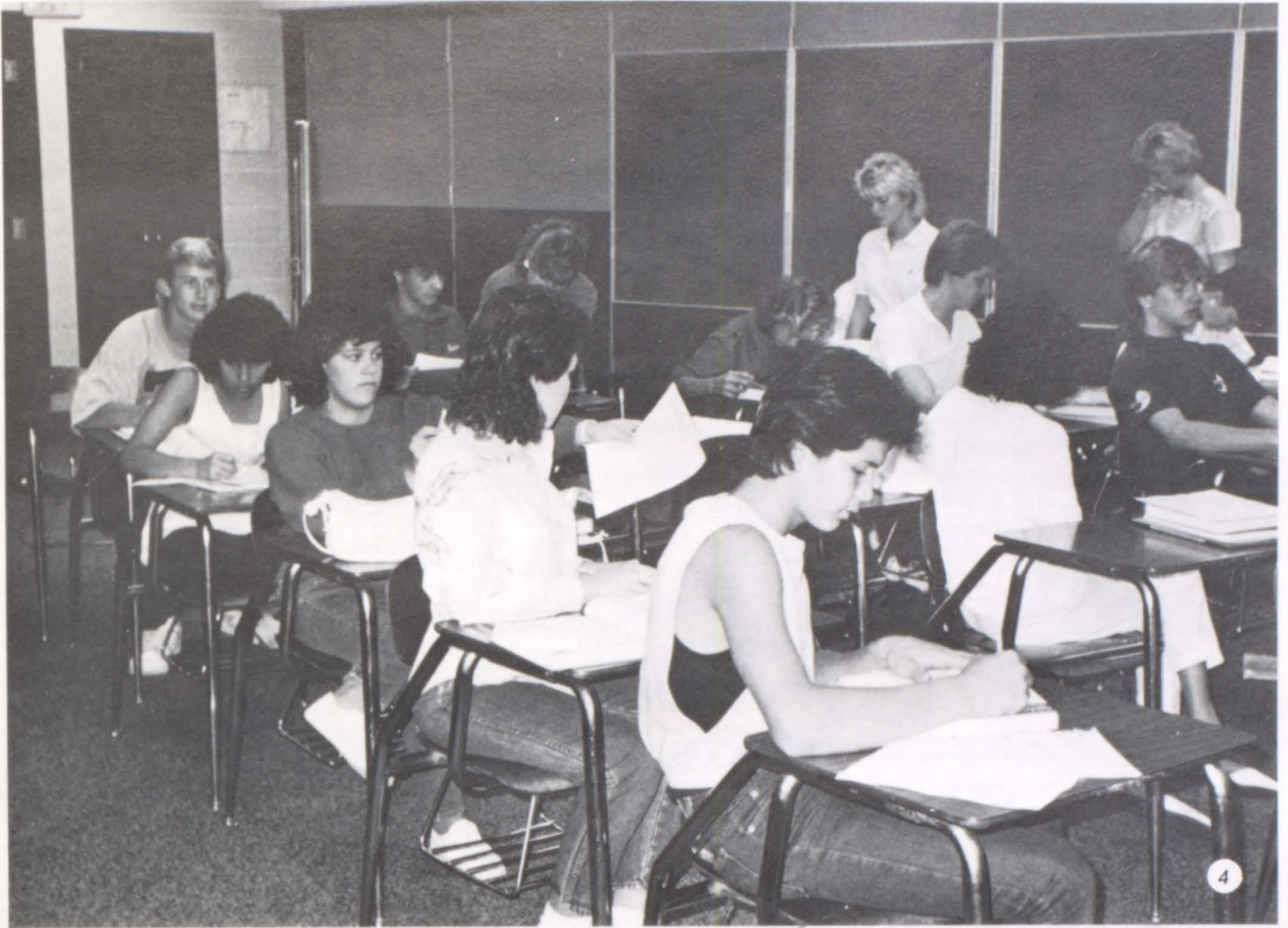

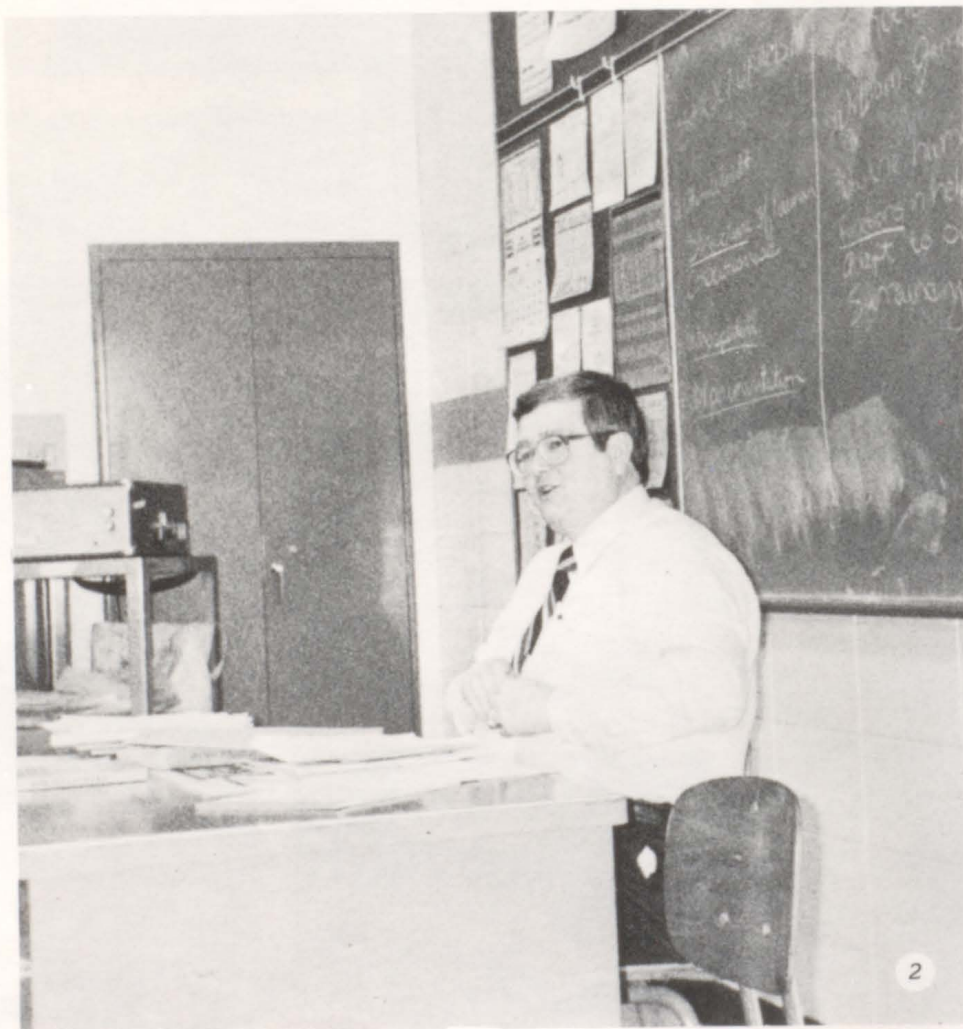
English adds speech and theatre class

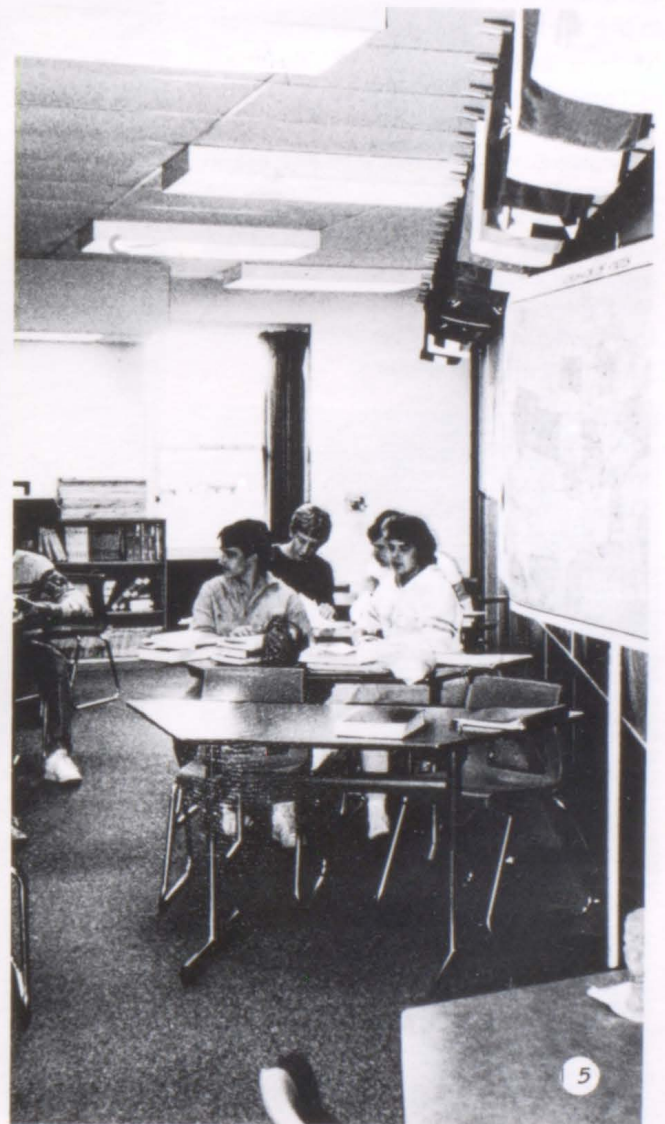
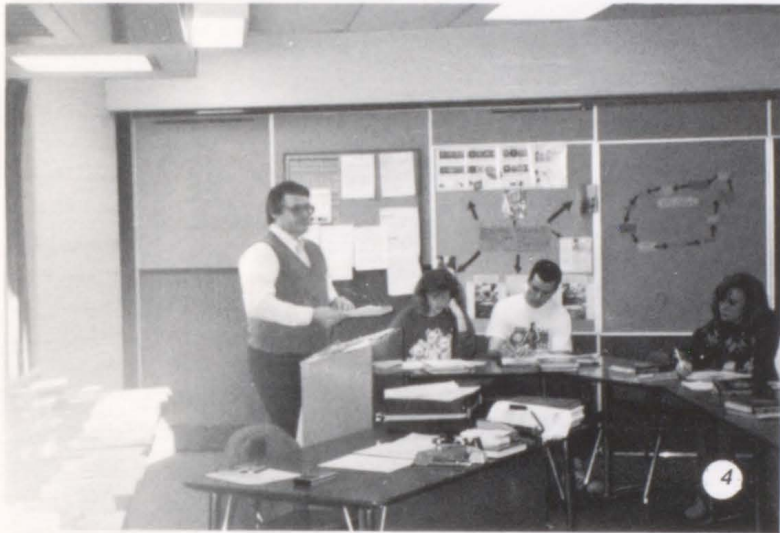
Social Science requires economics

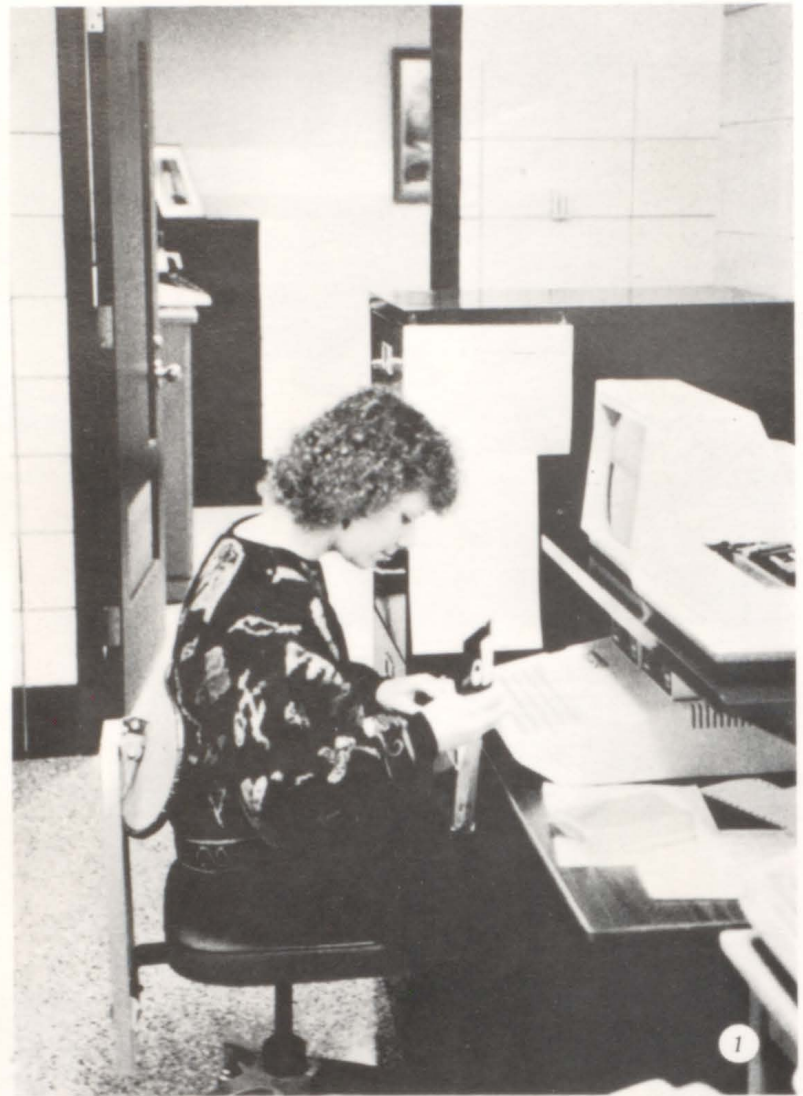

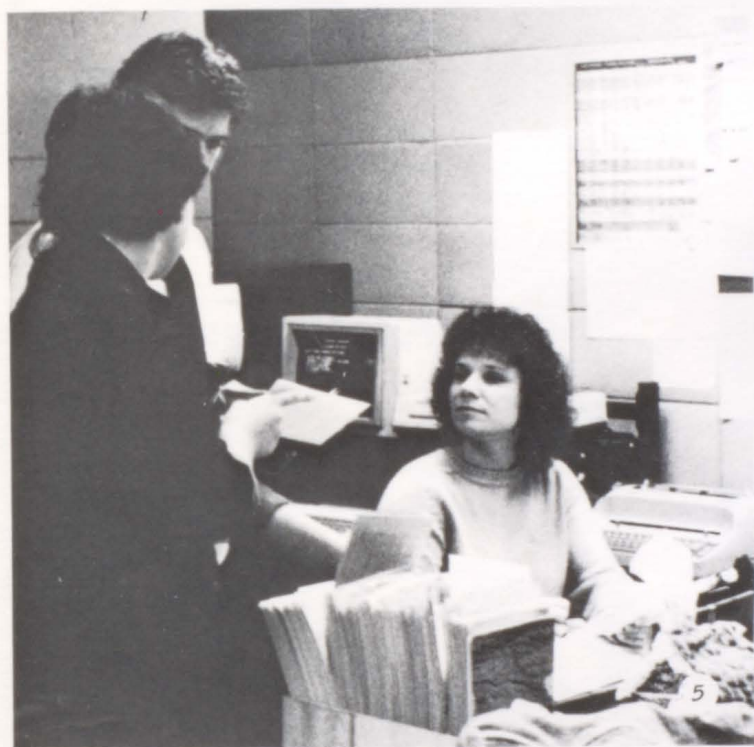
Secretaries and Aides keep busy

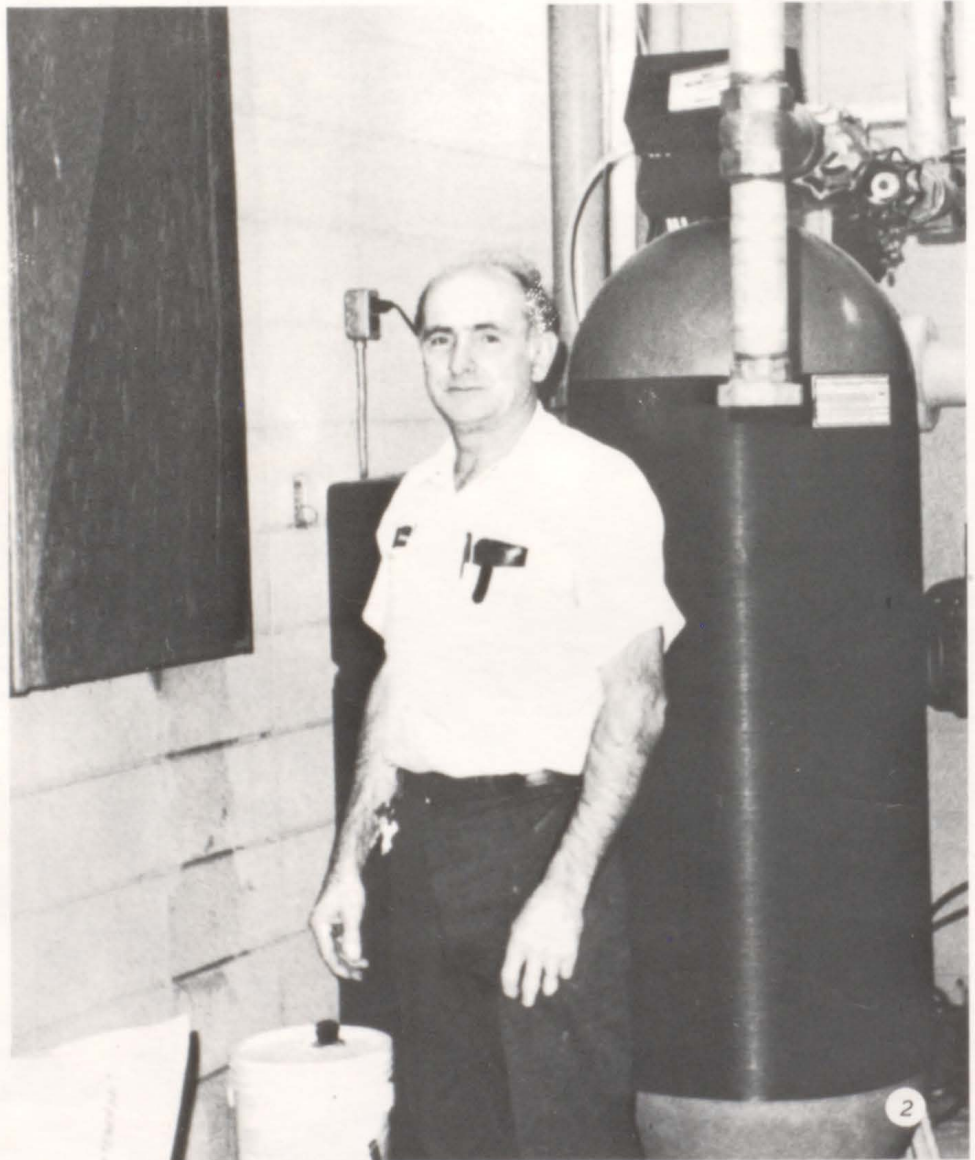
Support staff keep school in order

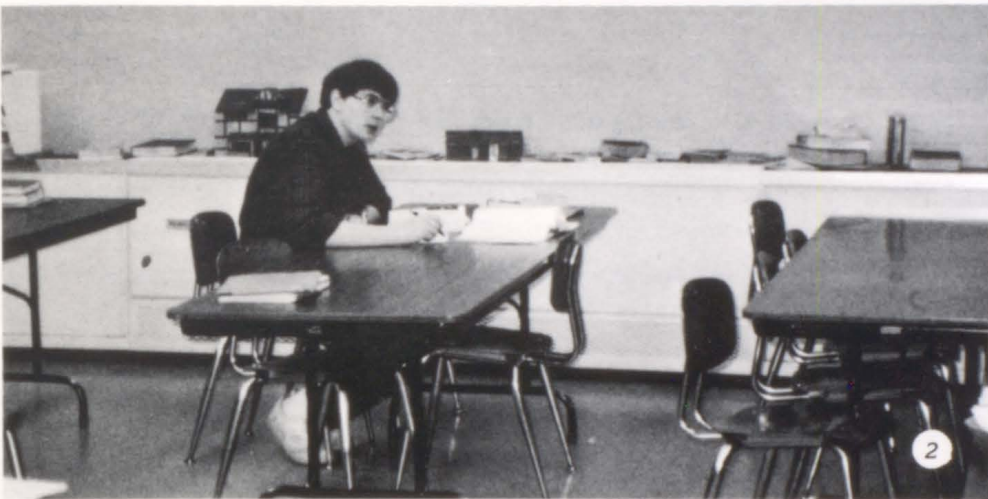


Wawasee's Signals
