








Seniors Achieve Everything

The senior class council organized everything from homecoming to prom, to the senior breakfasts. Everything was a big success.























Warriors March On







ISTEP Testing in English






A New Look for Careers






Keeping Fit in Gym Class














Planning for the Future








The Way to Communicate




















The Demand of Computers at Wawasee
