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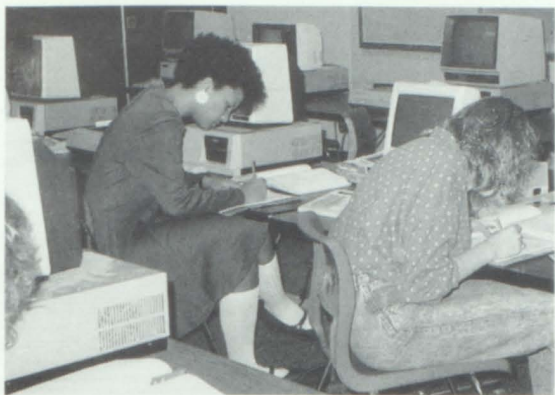


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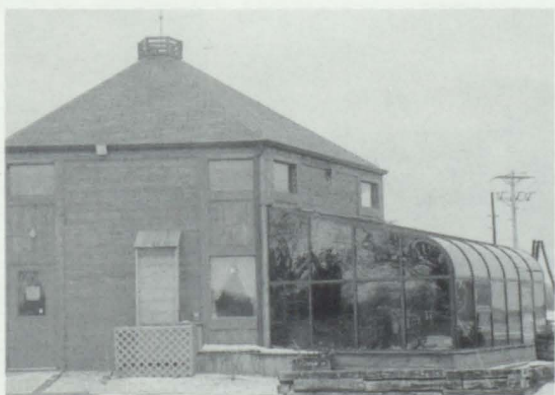
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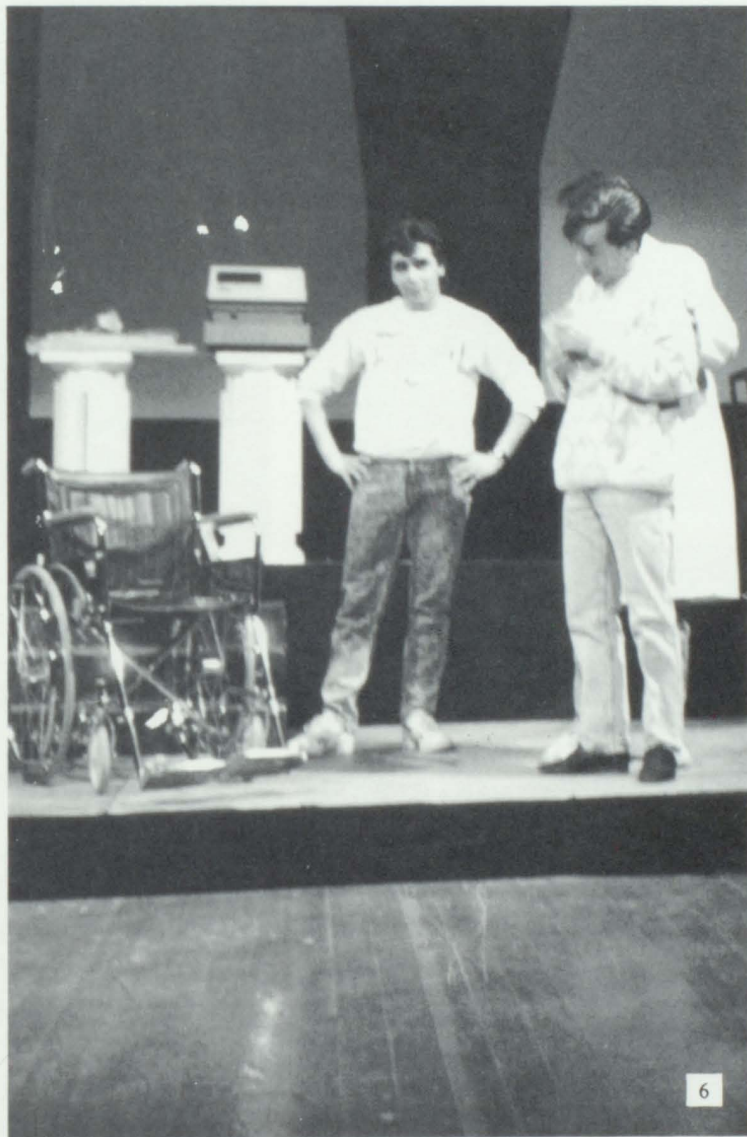
STUDENT LIFE

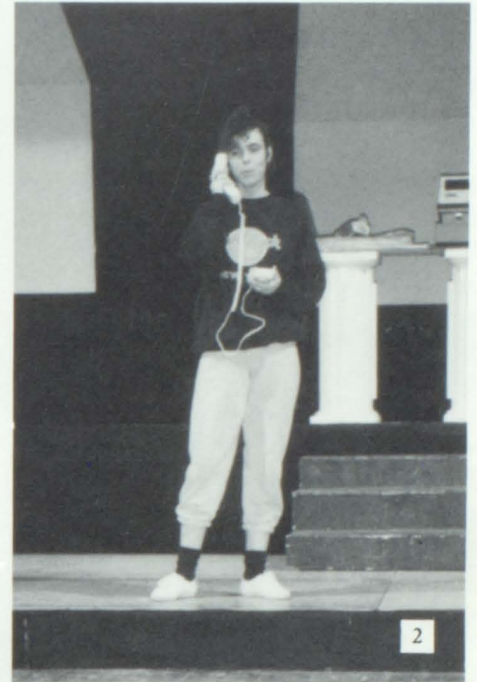
The Great State of . . .

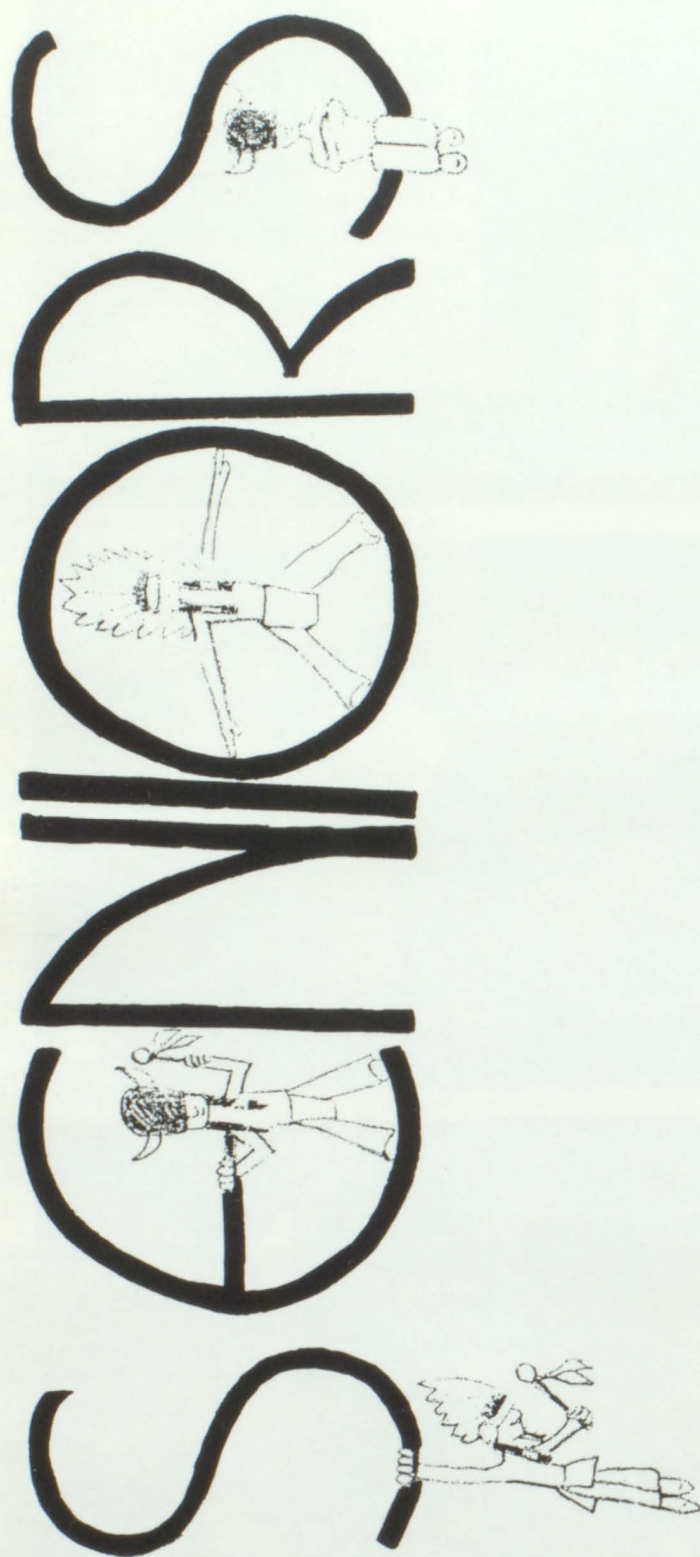
Time Out From Class

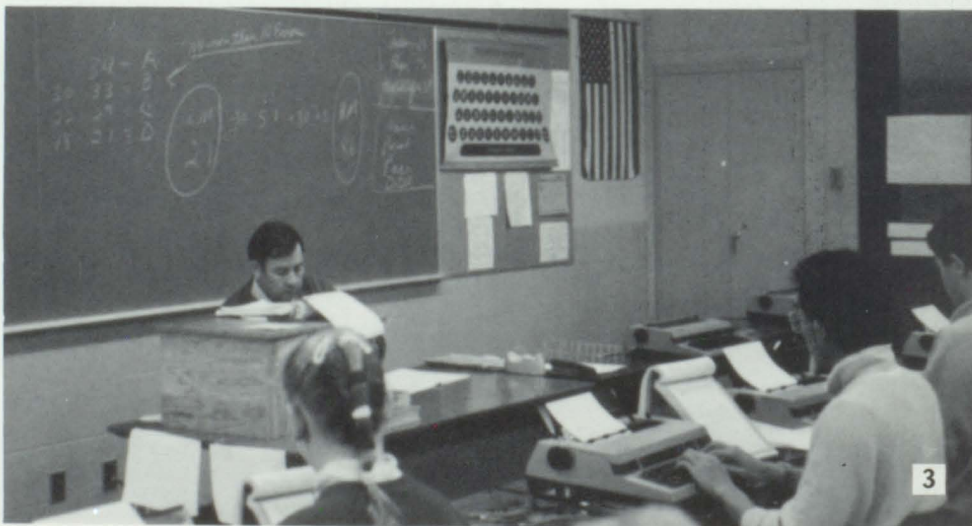
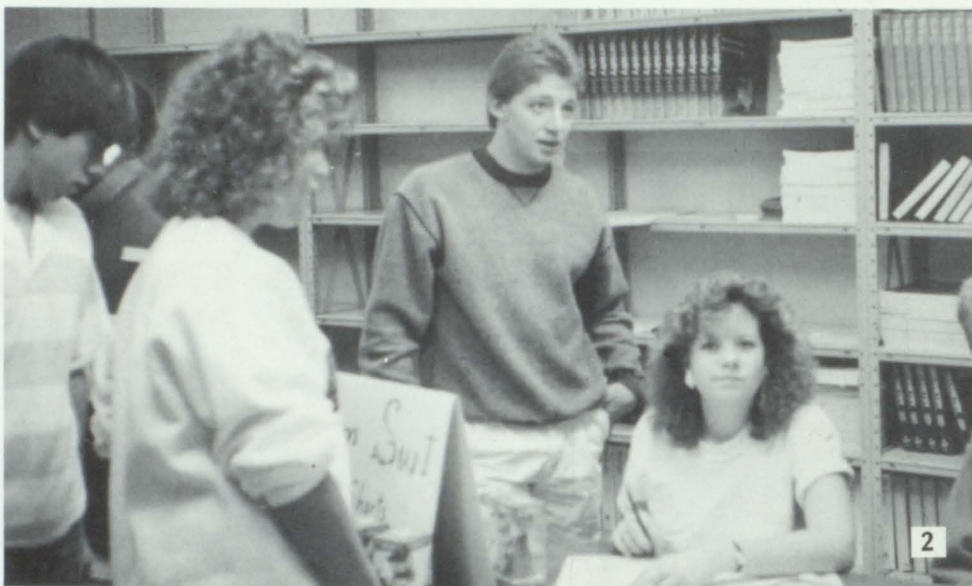
The World of Business

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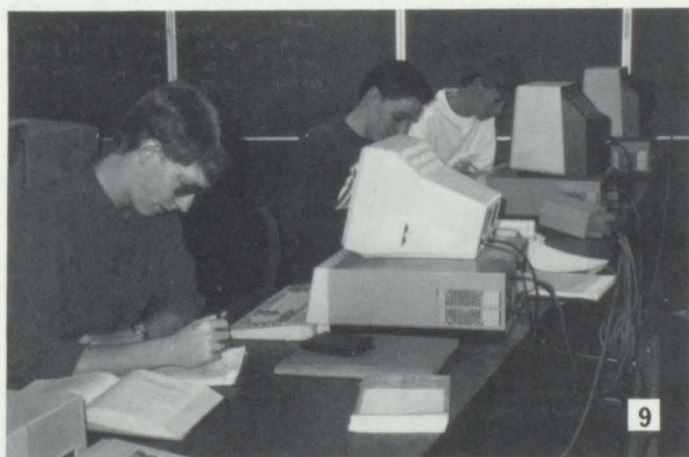
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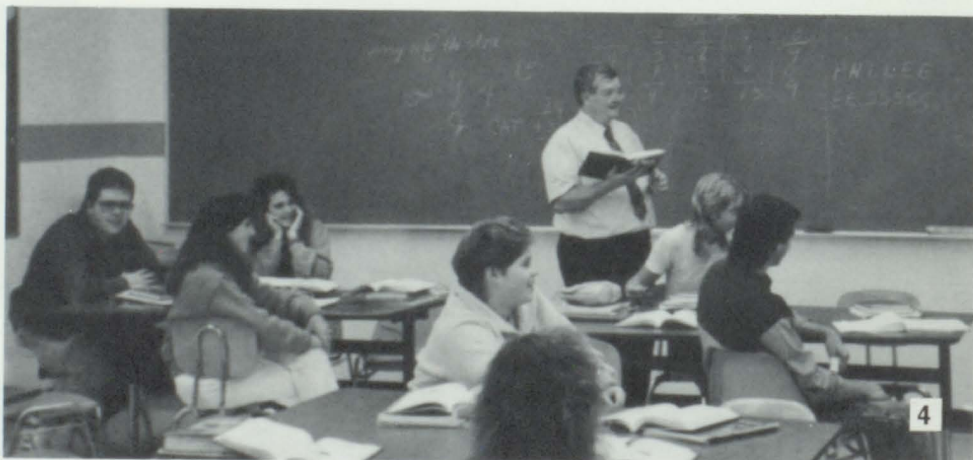
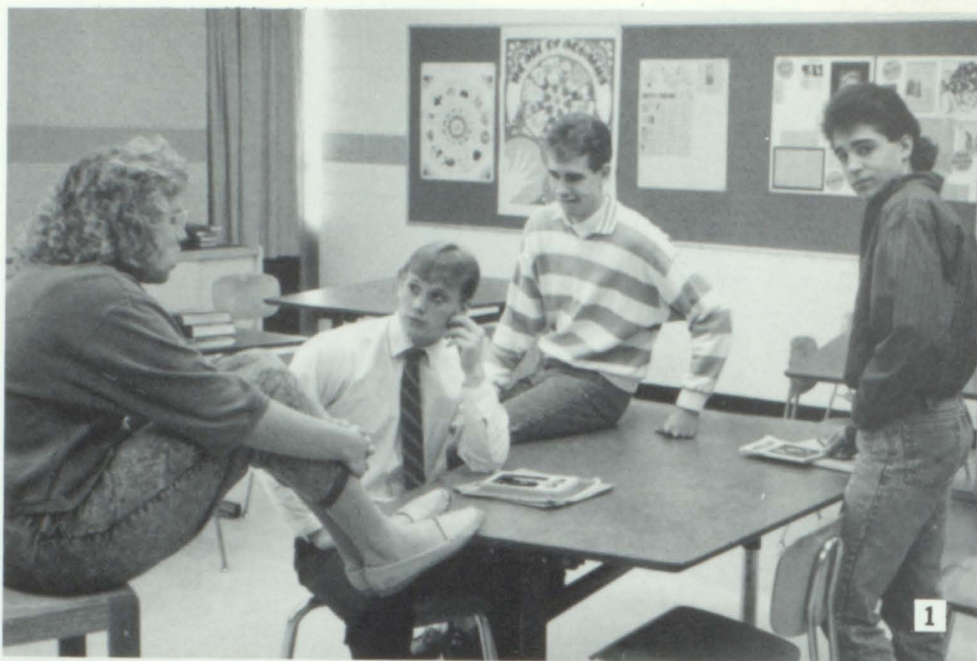


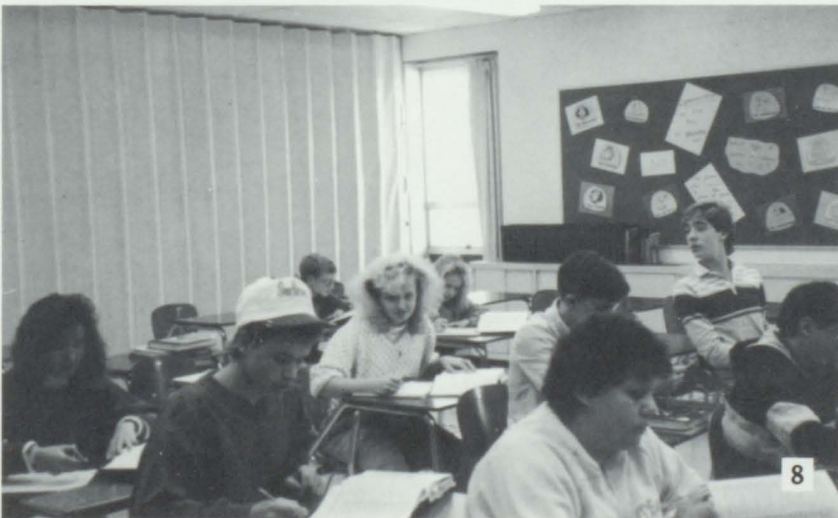
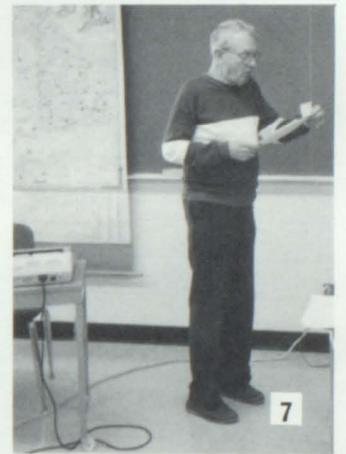
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More than Just Words

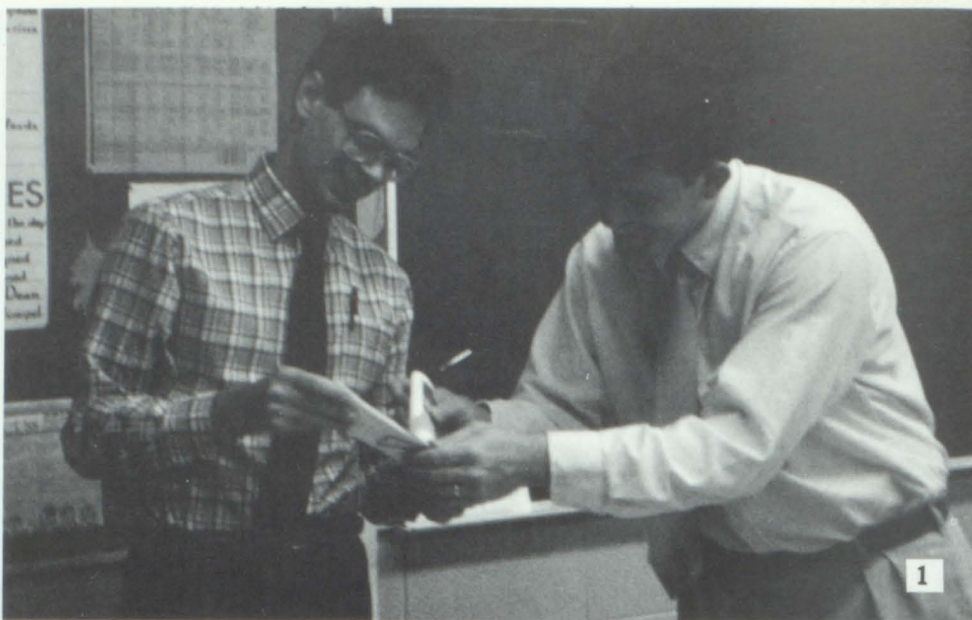




Warriors Speak in Foreign Tongues

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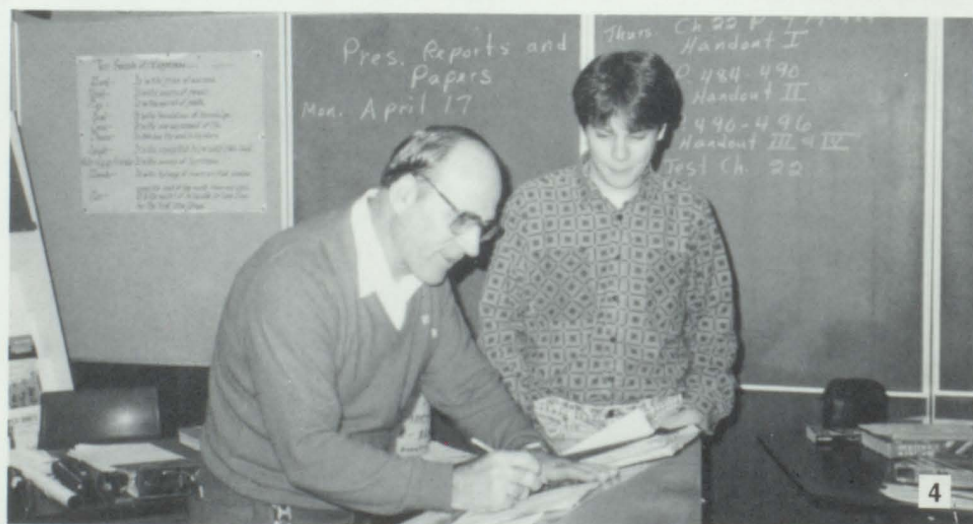


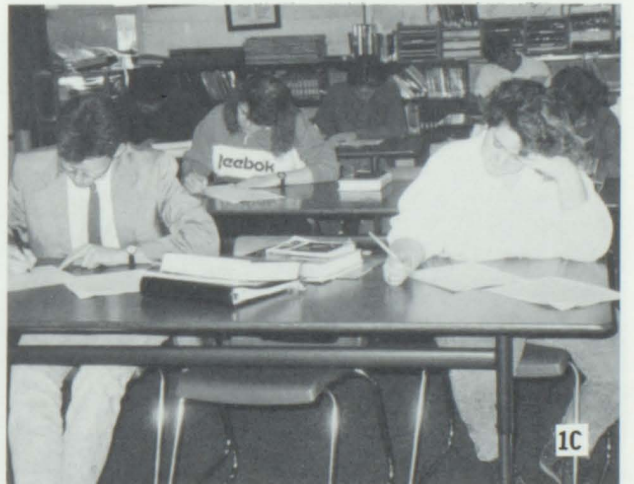
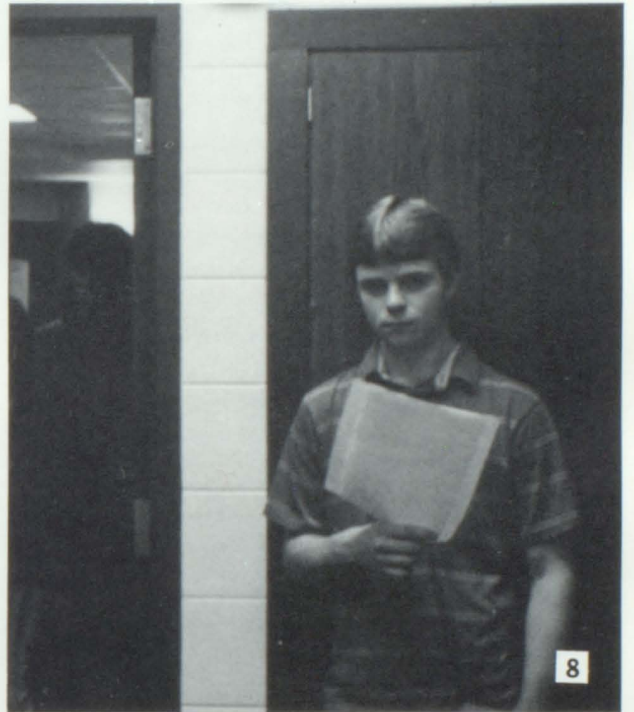
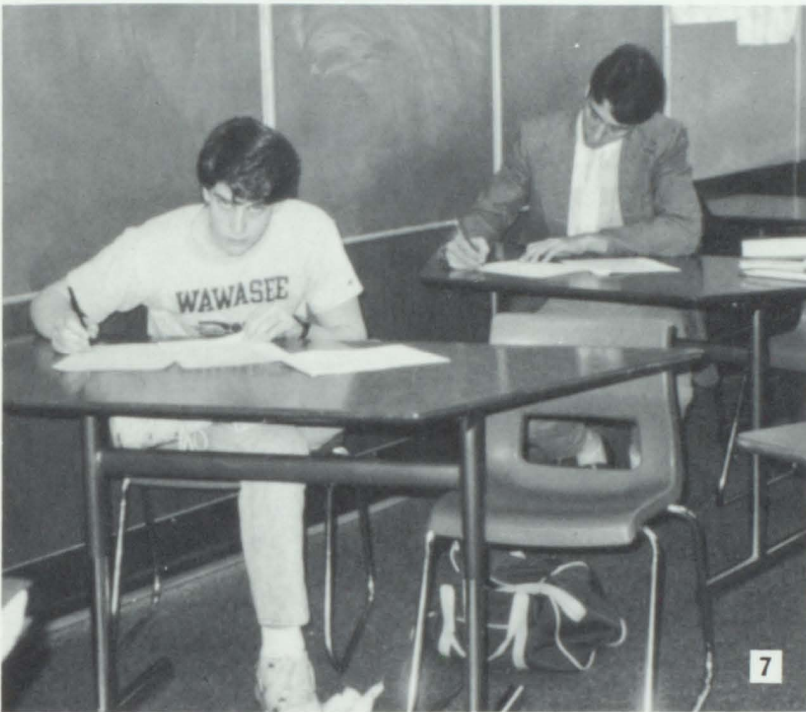
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Science in the Making

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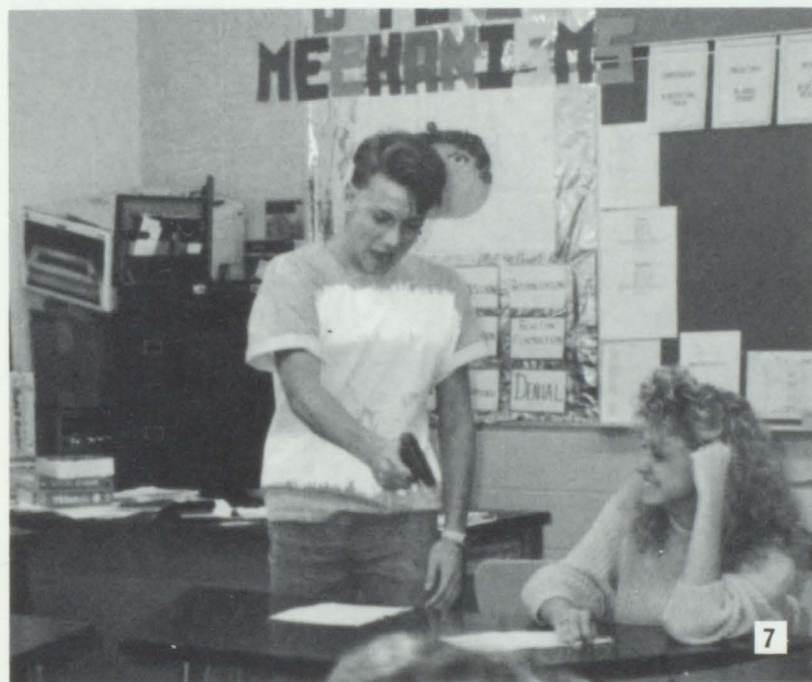
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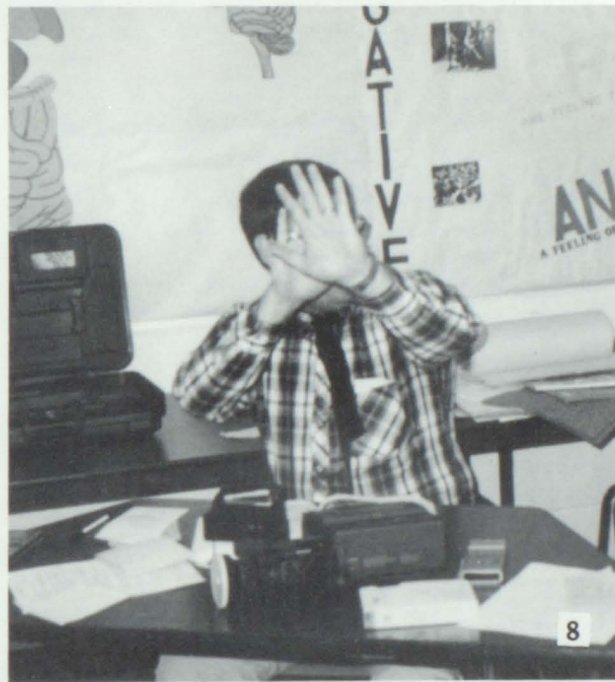
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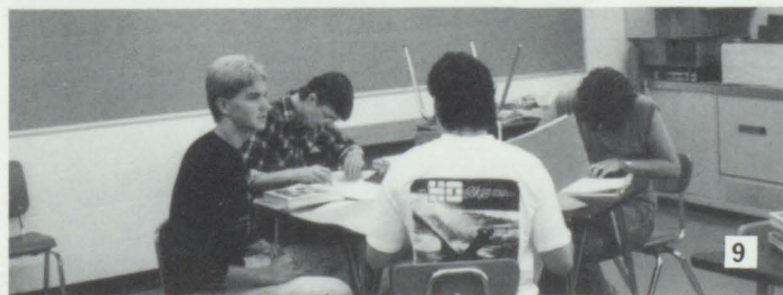
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Home Making Heaven

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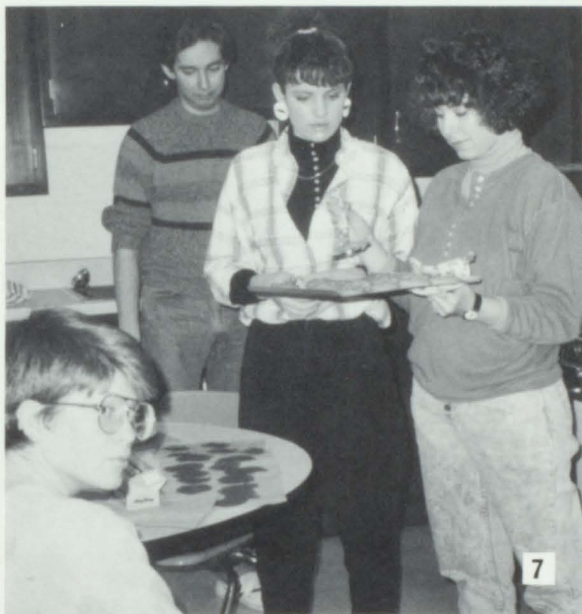
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Changes in the Office

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Young Industrialists Experience Success

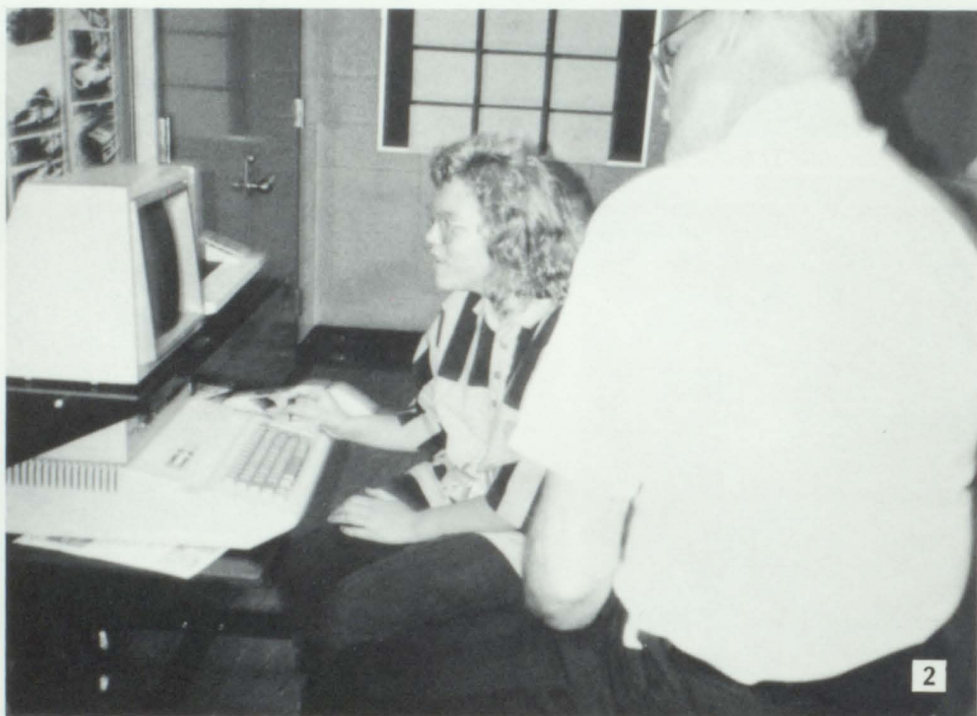
The Industrial Technology department spent this year planning to purchase some modern equipment for the next fall. Such things as robots and CNC machines will allow students to gain experience in modern industrial processes. Things such as spray painting, pick and place, and welding will be done with robots; parts production will be programmed on a computer and then machined on a CNC lathe and milling machine.

This year the curriculum offered six areas of technological experience. The manufacturing class had fun working in metals, welding, and designing a product that could be produced and sold. The small engine class learned how to fix engines used on such items from lawn mowers to boats. Producing TV ads, filming their own advertisements, and doing small skits that students wrote and acted out themselves were things that kept the communication class busy. The design class worked along the lines of drawing, sketching, architectural and machine design. They got to use the CAD system (computer aided design). The construction class built storage sheds, dog houses, and made models for bridges and tunnels to show how they were built. 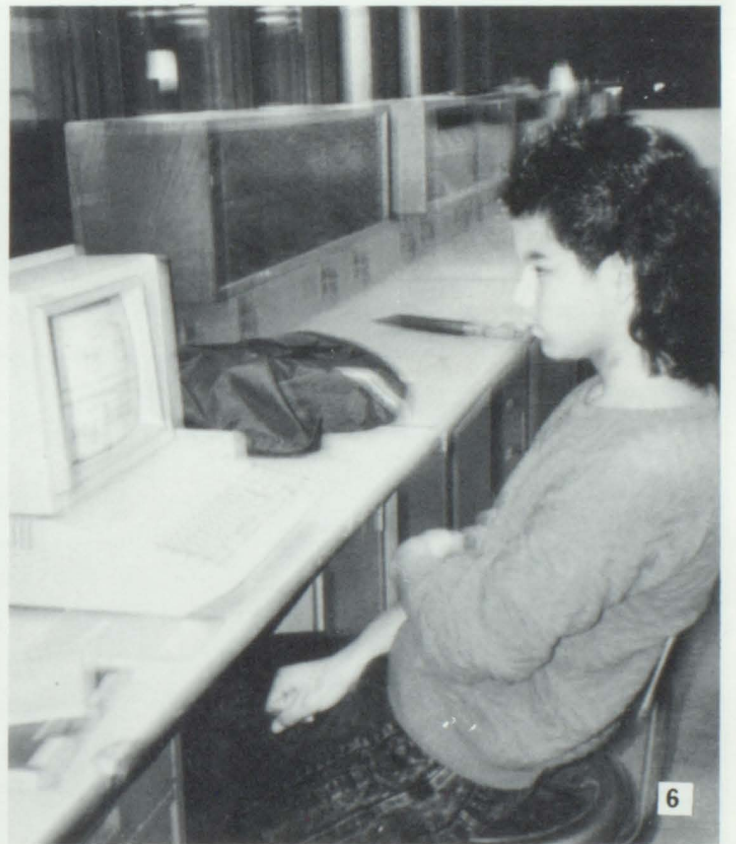
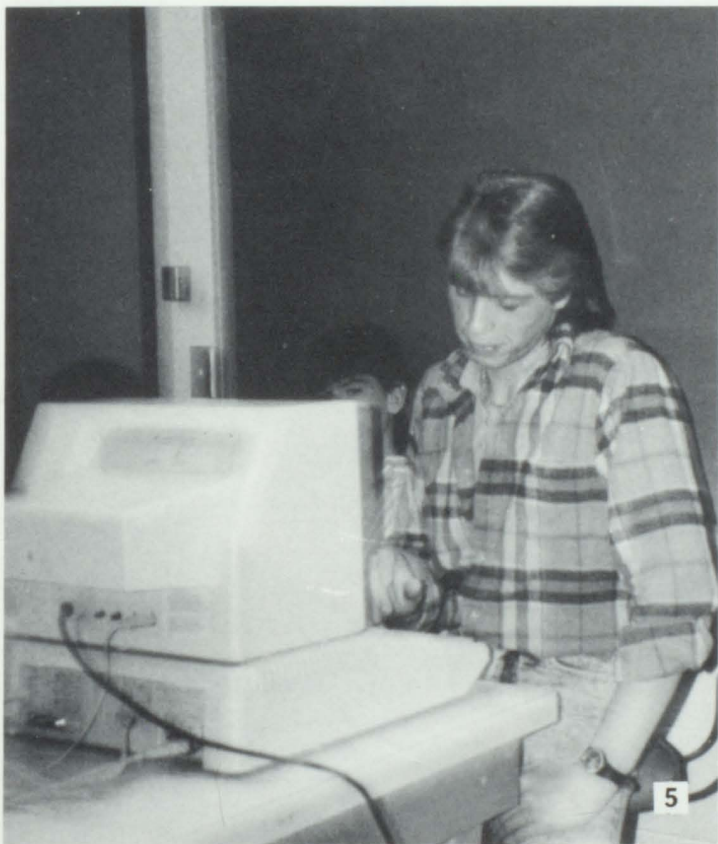
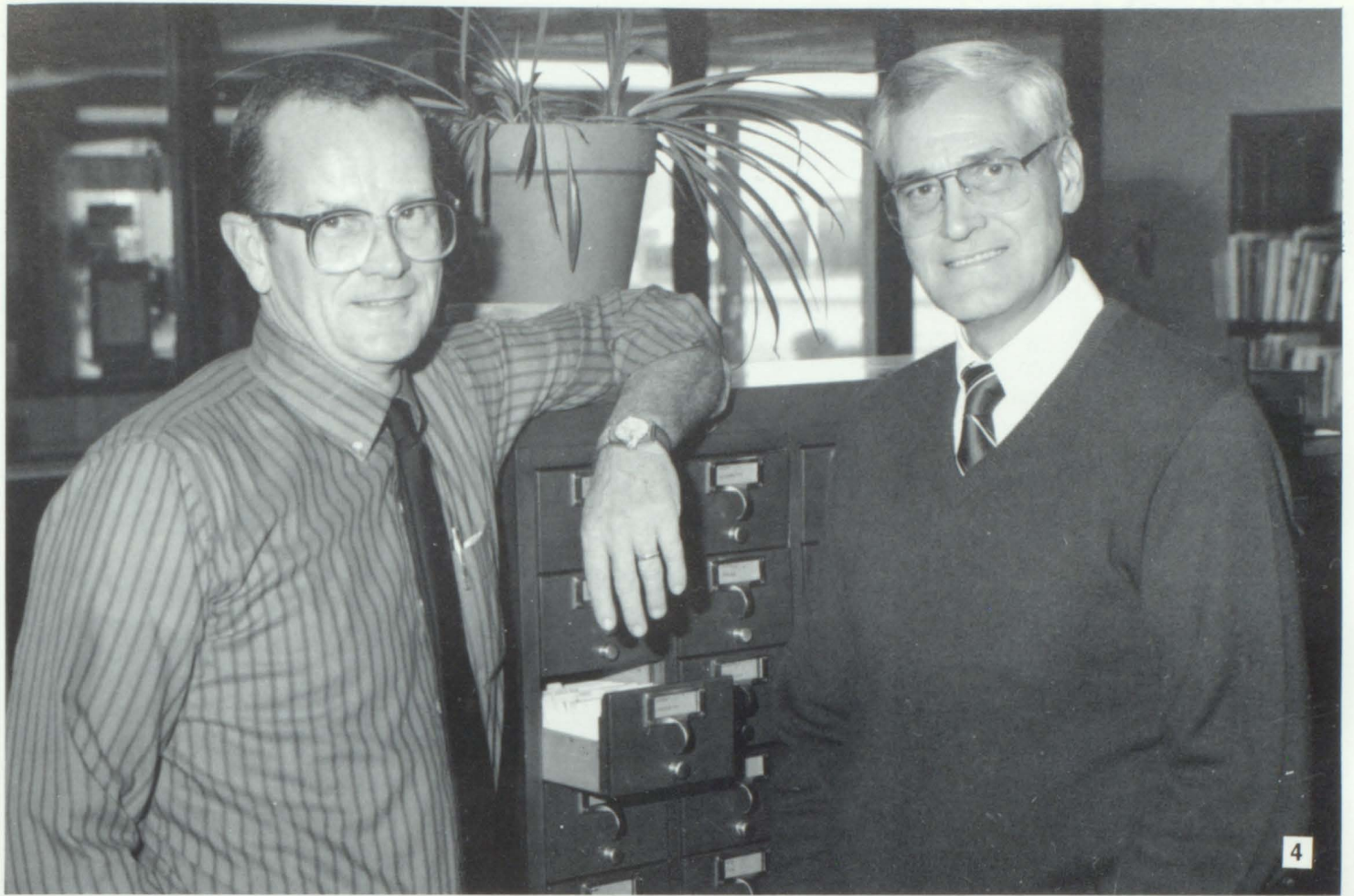
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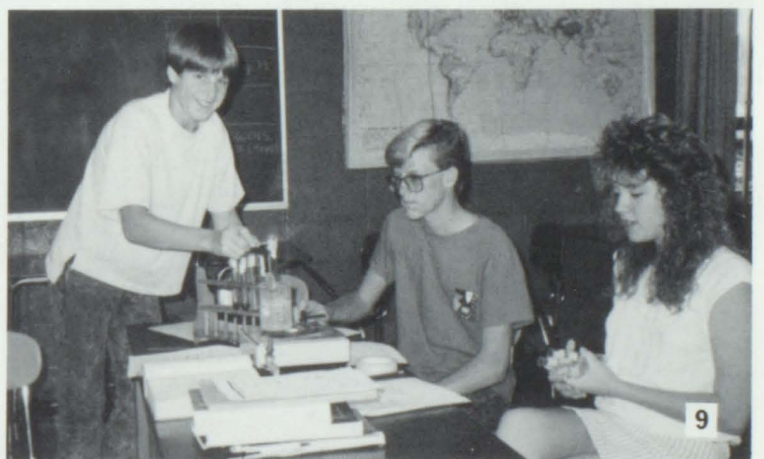


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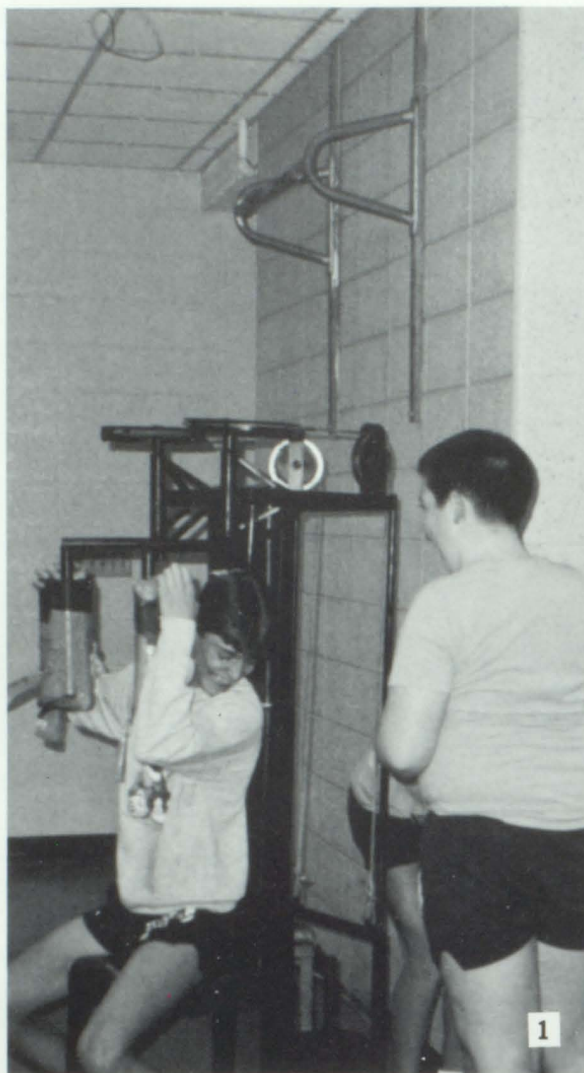




Getting a Lean on Fitness

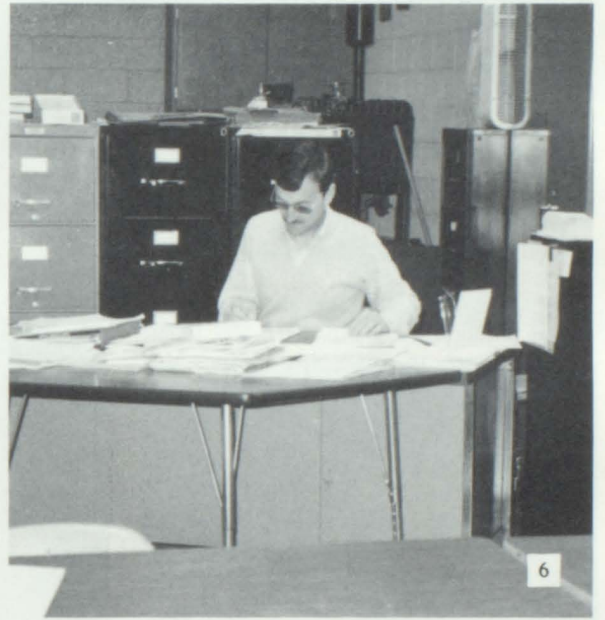


Preparing for the Future

At Wawasee there were many outstanding vocational opportunities. There were classes in Auto Mechanics I and II, where students worked on automobiles. In Building Trades I and II the students built a house during the school year. This year they built two duplex houses. There was also an ag power or mechanics class which was designed to prepare students to be tractor and diesel mechanics. In the Ag Placement Program, students were released from school to work on an approved farm or in an approved ag-related business. In the business area, there were two programs. One was Marketing Education On-The-Job Training where the students were placed in jobs in the community and the Secretarial Office Lab program, a duplication of an actual office. Other courses available to the students, but taught at either Fairfield High School or West Noble High School, were Cosmetology I and II at Fairfield and Printing and Graphics at West Noble. In the Cosmetology I and II classes the students received the skills and the related knowledge necessary for the State Board of Beauty Culture exam. The Printing and Graphics class dealt with layout, composition, offset printing, letter press plate making, bindery, and photography.

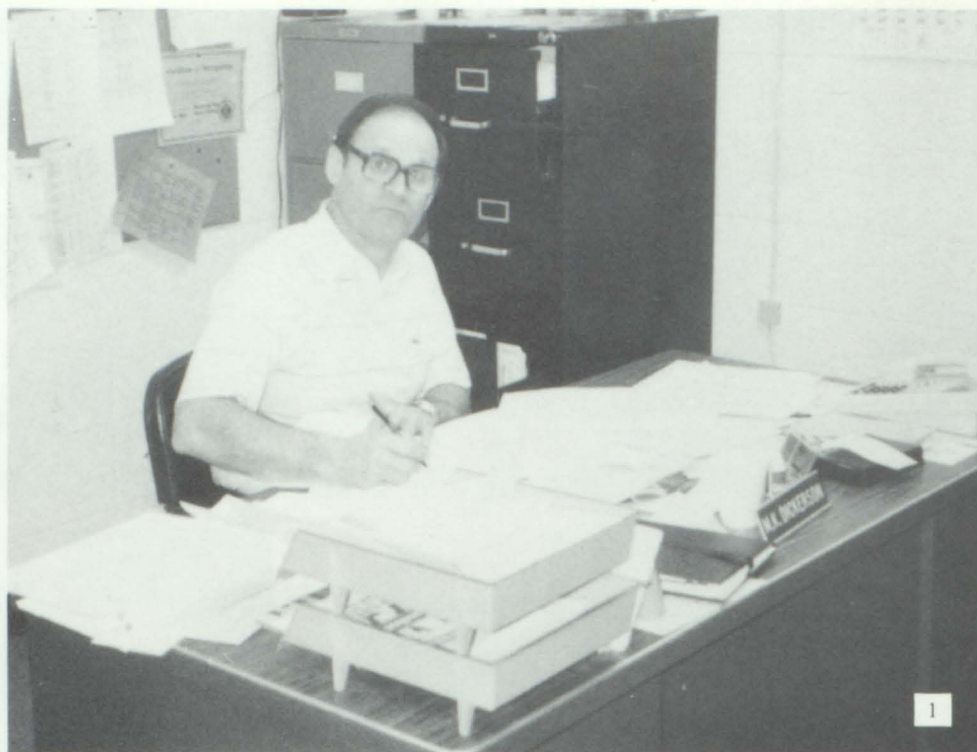


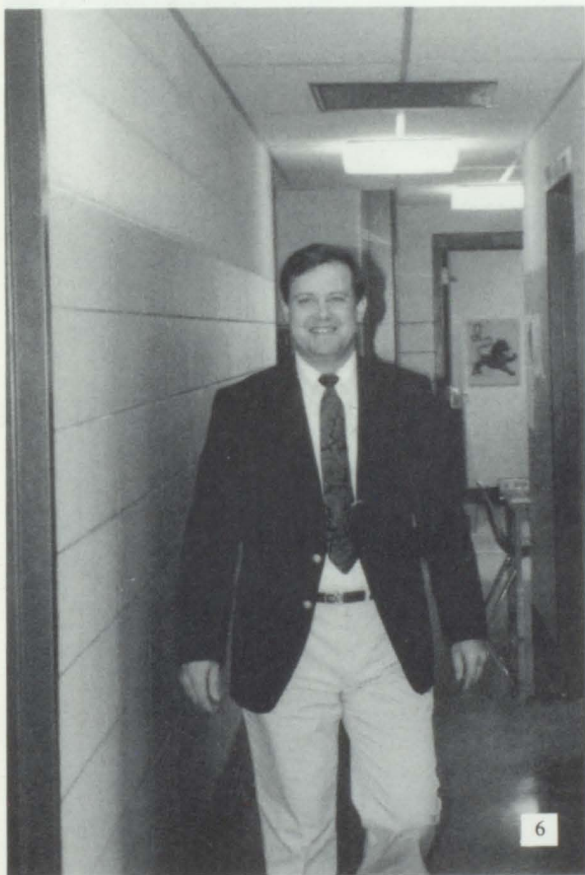


Administrators Keep Busy

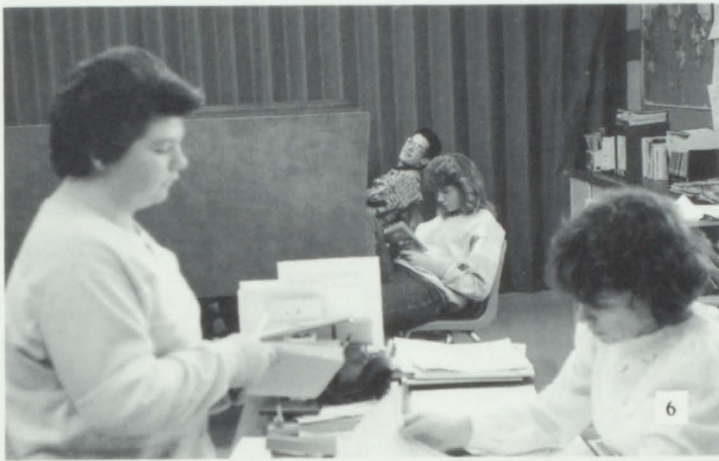


Working Towards Education

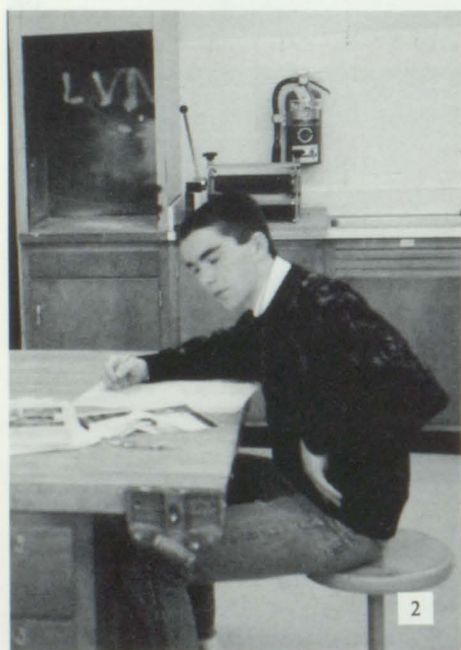


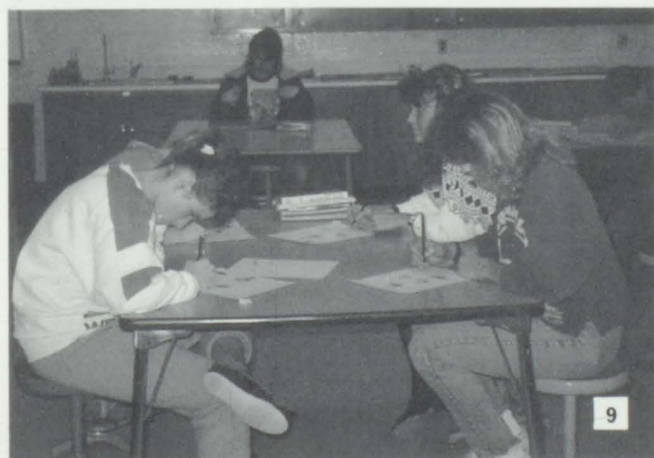
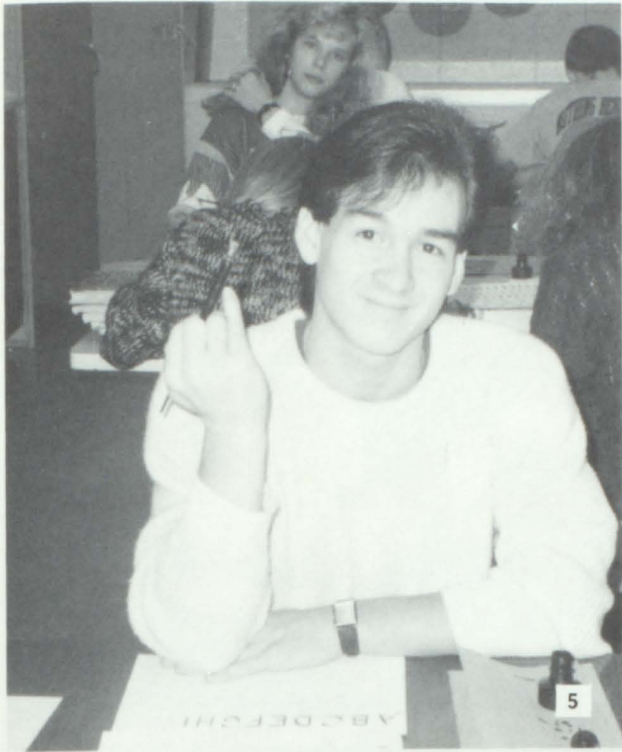


A Show of Colors

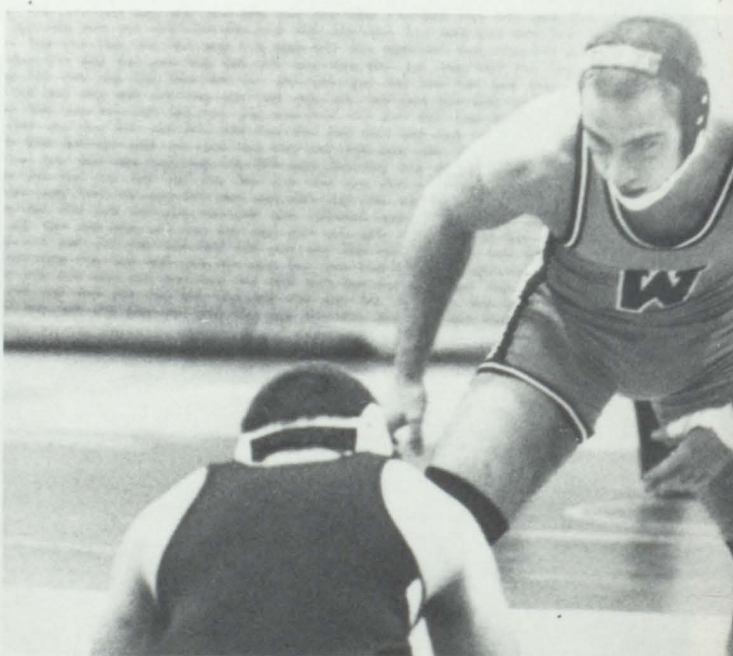
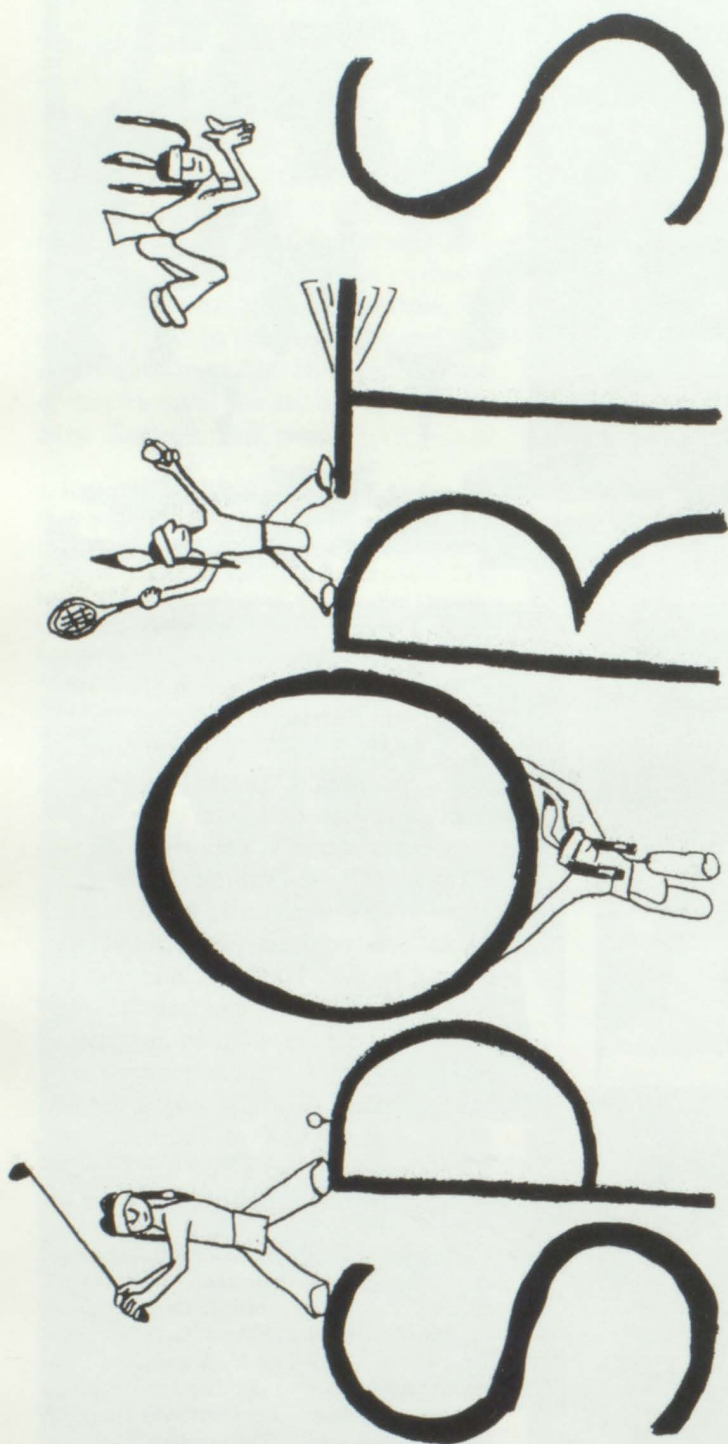
Stringing Up Some Music

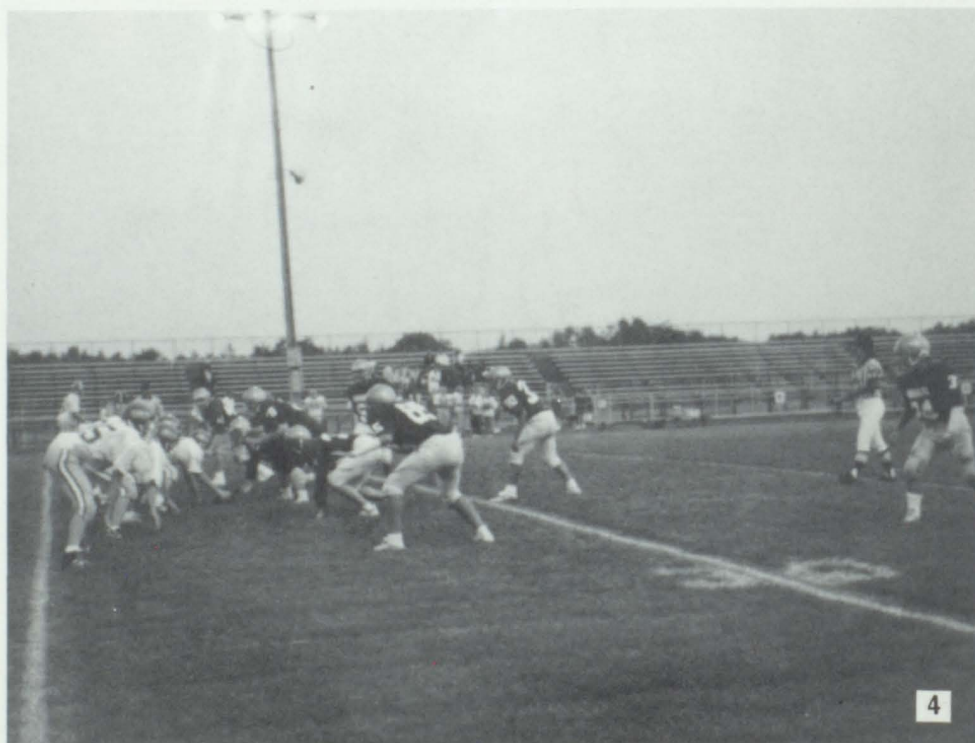
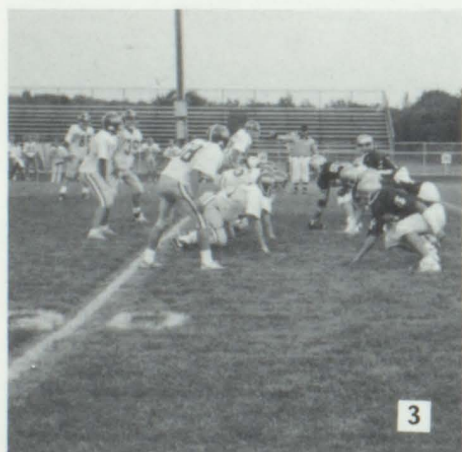
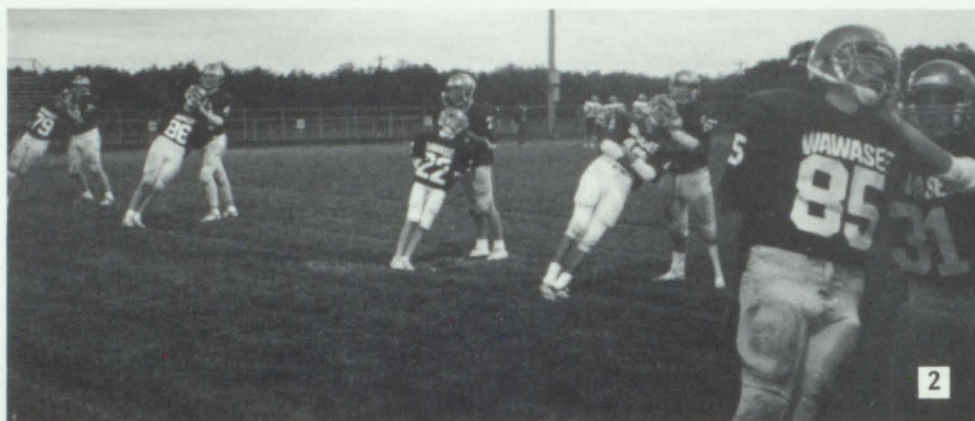
Struggle to The End

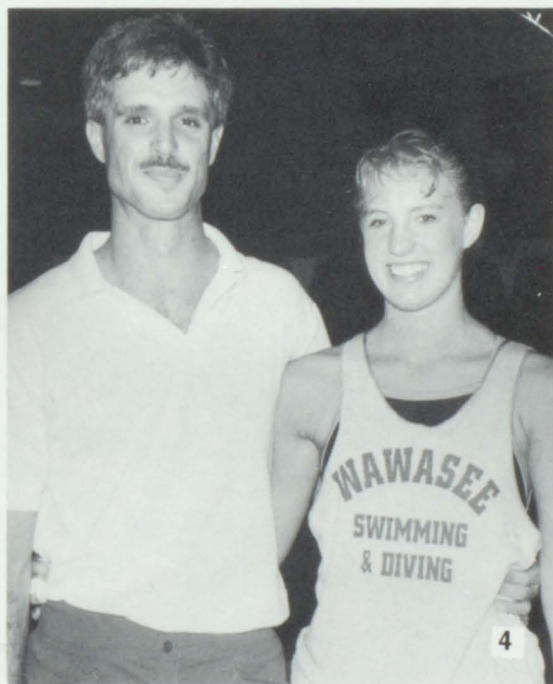
Girl Swimmers Splash to the Top

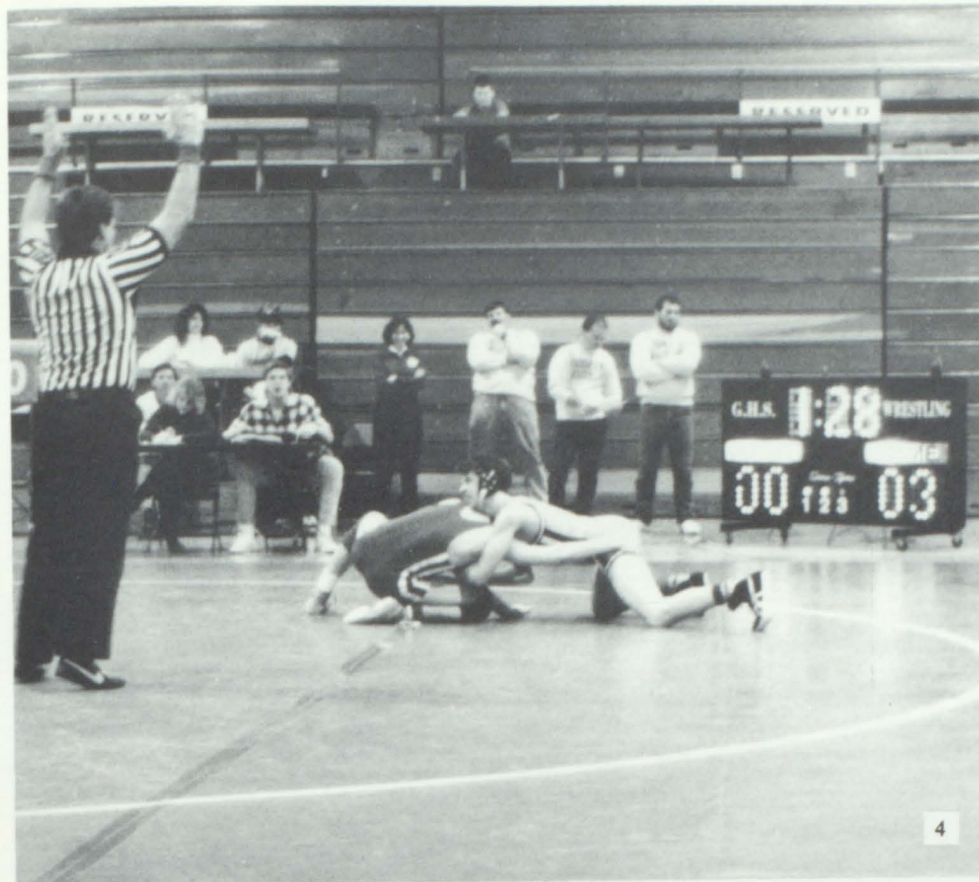
Grapplers Are Sectional Champs

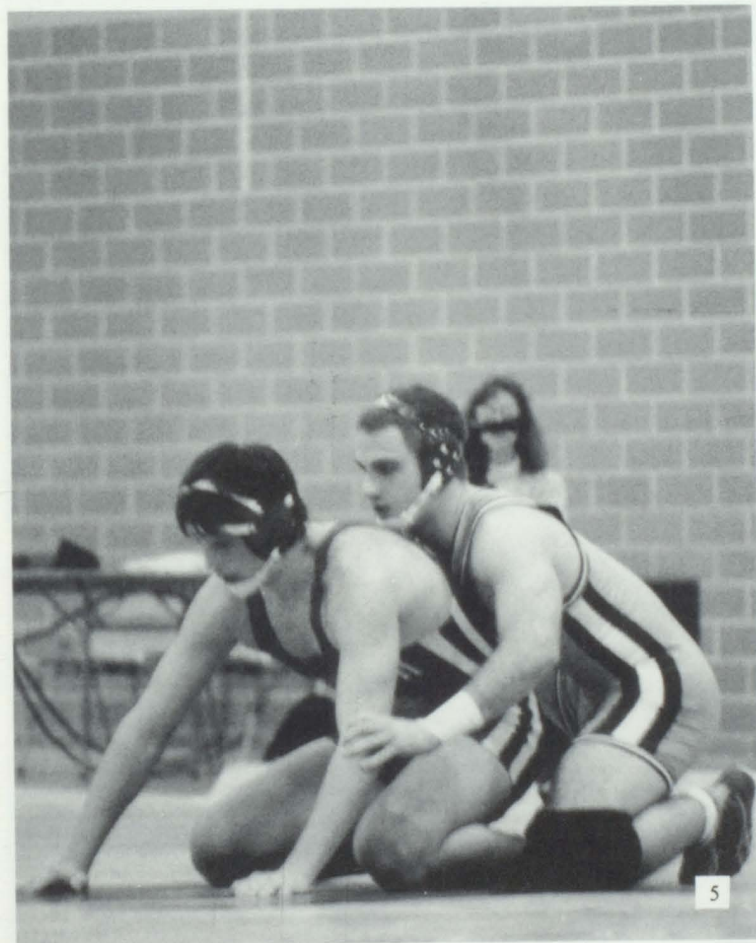

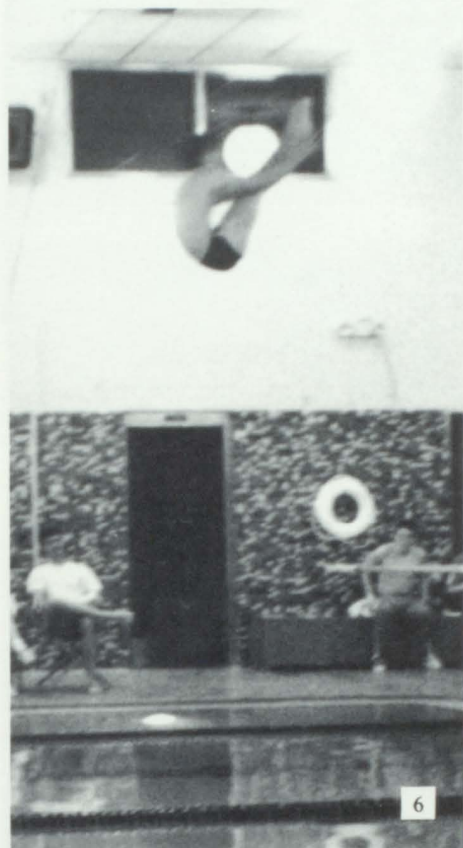

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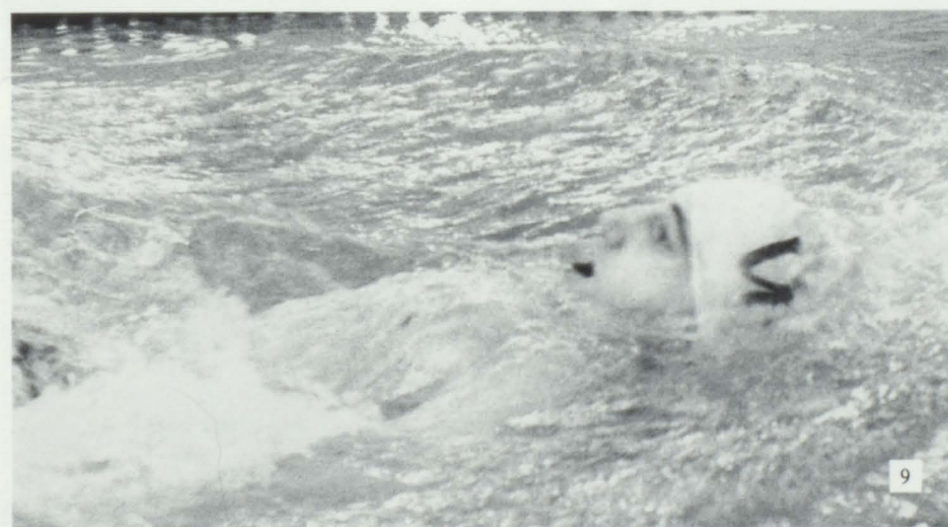
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Tumblers Named Sectional Champs

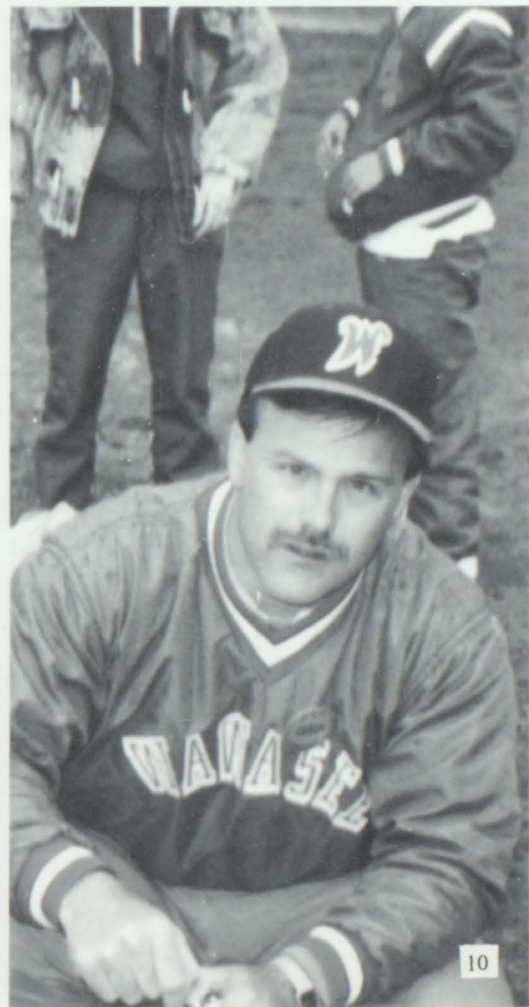


Warrior Girls Race to the Top

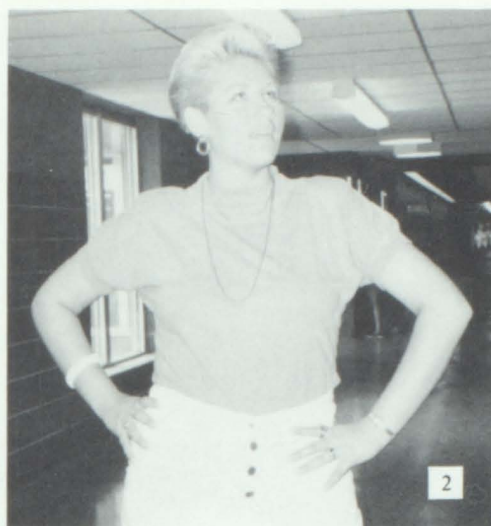

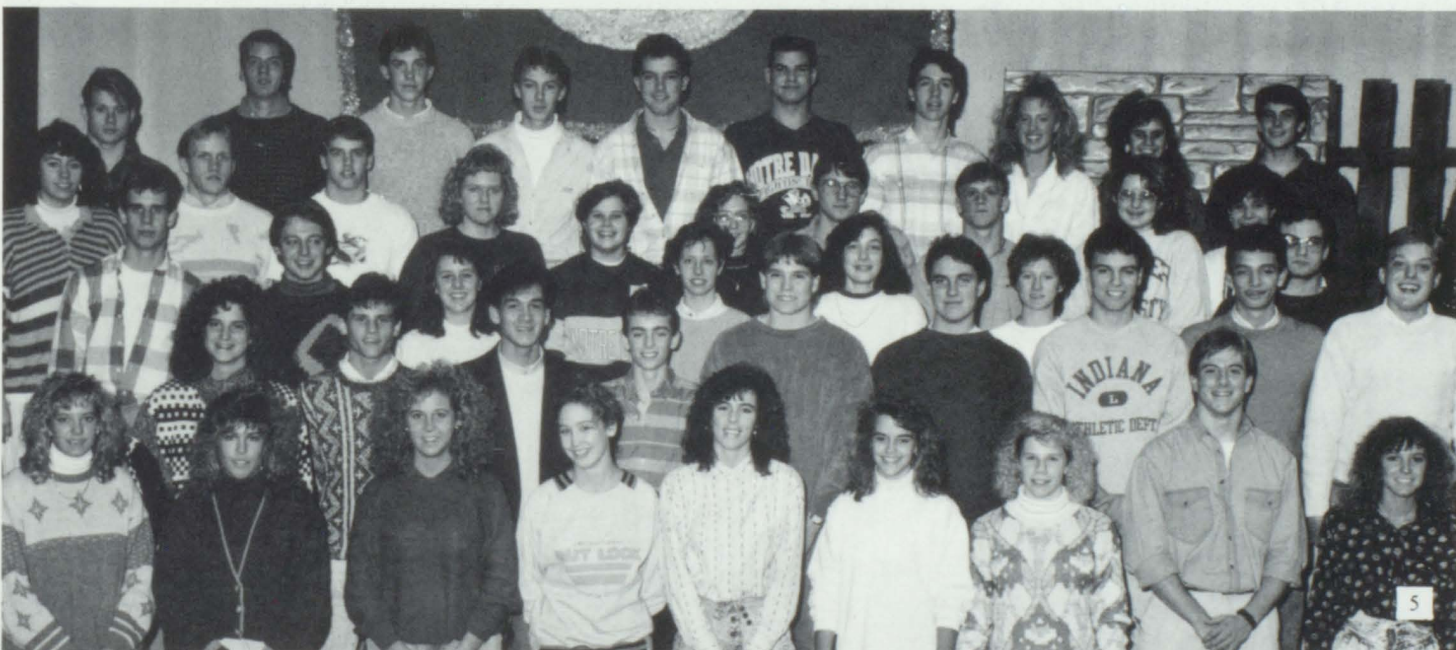

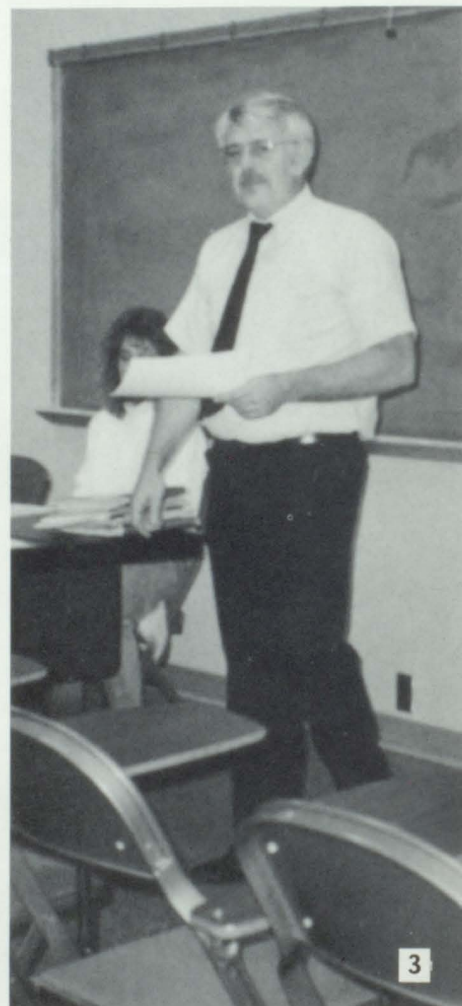

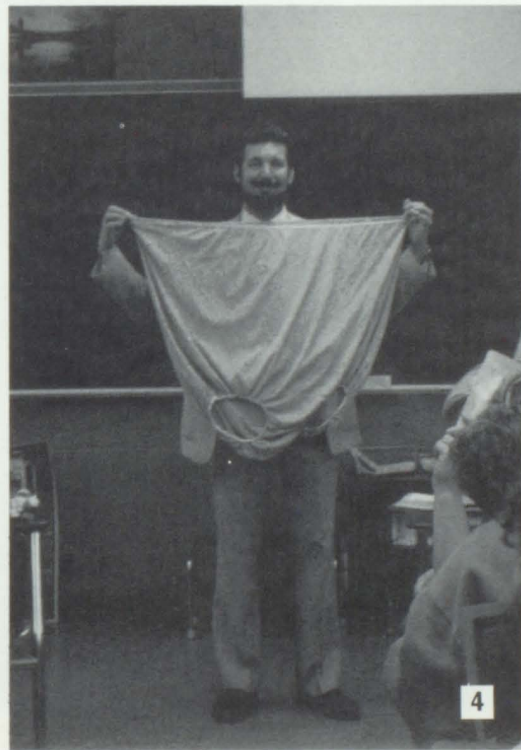

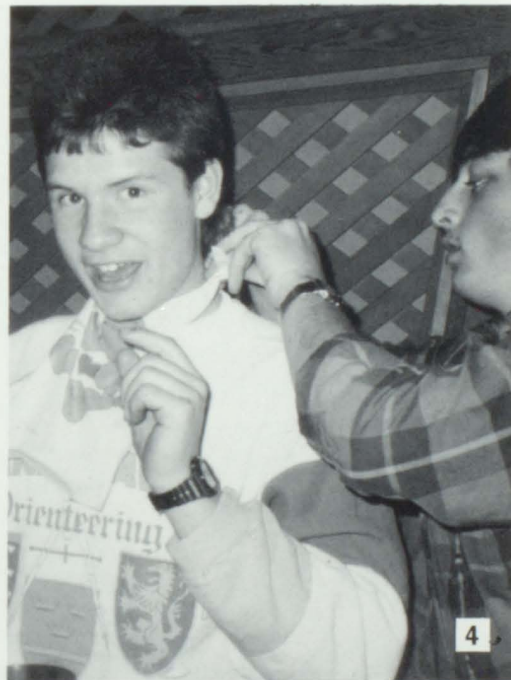


Farming is Dedication

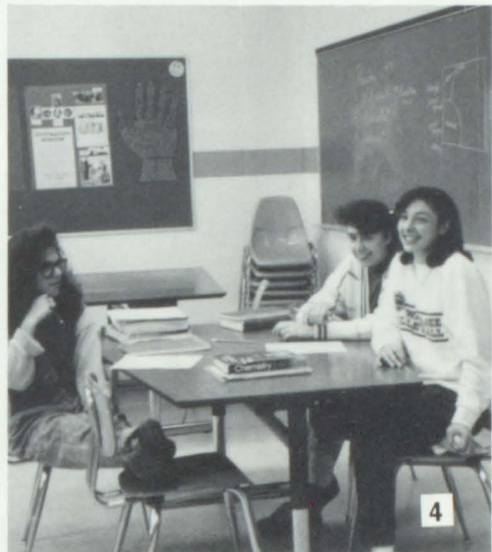


Computer Club Sets Up Bulletin Board

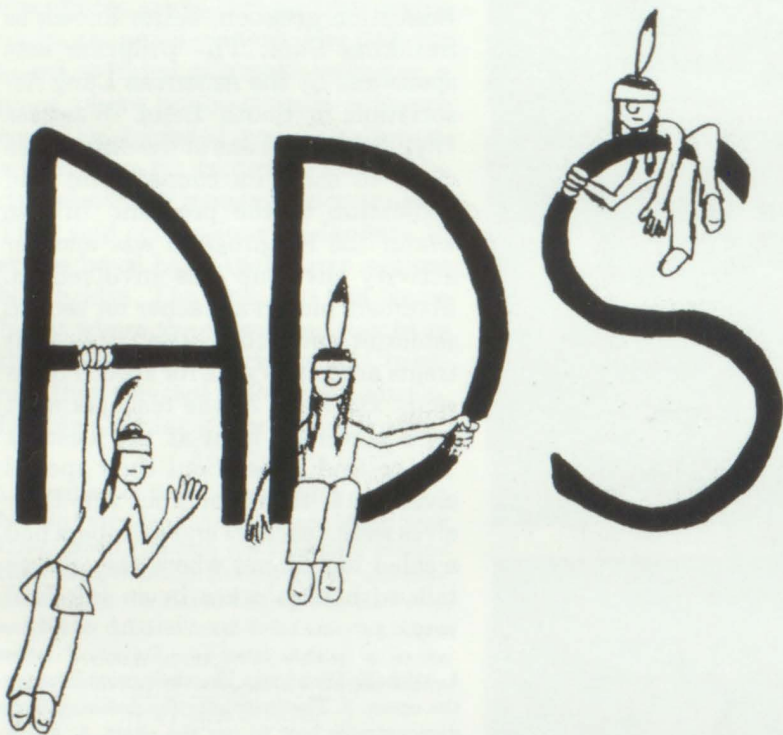




Teachers in the Future
