


Be True To Your School




Special Breaks From Class



Seniors Pull Through


















Band Receives a 1st at District Contest

















Math "Adds" A New Teacher

















Almost Half of Warriors Speak Foreign Languages















Let's Get Social


















Many New Faces





















Conditioning On Every Level







Hi-Tech Industrialists

This year the Industrial Technology Department offered six areas of technological experience. The manufacturing class had fun working in metals, welding, and designing a product that could be produced and sold. The small engine class learned how to fix engines for items from lawn mowers to boats. In communications, students produced commercial ads, filmed their own advertisements, learned about the world of photography and did skits in class that students wrote and acted out themselves. The design class worked along the lines of drawing, sketching, architectural and machine design. They also got to use the CAD system (computer aided design). The construction class built storage sheds, dog houses, and made models for bridges and tunnels to show how they were built. Furniture class and cabinetry class concentrated on the construction of fine furniture and cabinets.

The Rhino robots were also a big part of Industrial Technology. Things such as spray painting, pick and place, and welding were done with robots; parts production was programmed on a computer and then machined on a CNC lathe and milling machine.






Administration Helps Out


Guidance Is Always Busy



















Showing True Colors


Two Hard Fought Seasons




An Undefeated Season for the Boys' Cross Country















Home Run Hits

















Lady Warriors Finish Well




They Made It Work


Warrior Jazz

Measles Outbreak

On February 22, for the first time in WHS history, the Indiana State Board of Health nurses immunized the entire student body for rubeola, a specific type of measles, after one confirmed case in the corporation. Approximately 750 students at WHS were vaccinated in a remarkably short period of time: one hour and fifteen minutes. The immunization took place in the gym with student and faculty volunteers helping the nurses. The immunizations were done using an air gun for quickness and to prevent the transferring of diseases in the process. Students who had already been immunized or those with special health conditions were not vaccinated. Three weeks later the health emergency was over with three cases of measles confirmed.



















Friends From Afar





Creating a LEGEND

Volume 22 of the LEGEND was published by Herff Jones, Incorporated on 80 gloss paper. The first sixteen pages were printed on white textured paper. The color senior pictures were printed on paper with a special high gloss finish.

Once again each student in Commercial Design submitted a cover design for the yearbook. The designs were voted on by the staff. The design chosen was by Chantel Drake

The type style chosen for the book was Serif Gothic Light. All headlines were in 30 point type. The body copy was printed in 10 point type. The picture idents were put in 8 point type.

Graphic Accents were used throughout the book for visual imagery and impact. Spot coloring was used to highlight certain pages. Process magenta HJ930, process yellow HJ920, and process cyan HJ940 were the spot colors used.

The number of books printed was 500. The cost per copy was \$15.00. An additional \$1.50 was added for seniors who wished to have their names stamped on the cover of their yearbooks.


