




After Hours





HARVEY Highlights



WHS Supports Desert Storm

This school year was very different from others in that all students were affected in one way or another by the Gulf War. The war was a result of Iraq's invasion of Kuwait in August 1990. The U.S. and its allies then began a build up of forces in Saudi Arabia to stop Saddam Hussein from becoming another Adolph Hitler. The United Nations gave Saddam until January 15th to pull out of Kuwait or else face a declaration of war. Hussein did not pull out, so on January 16th the air war began. Approximately a month later, the ground war started. The U.S. and Allied forces literally destroyed Iraq's forces. Near the end of February, Iraq pulled out of Kuwait.

Throughout the Gulf War, members of WHS showed their support in numerous ways. Fans at a home basketball game, aided by Mrs. Leach and Chris Thornton, created a cardboard flag. Yeager Photography took pictures and sent each graduate serving in the Gulf a copy. The student body dressed up in red, white and blue on designated days, and they also wore yellow ribbons especially made for Wawasee. A showcase was set up with addresses and pictures of all the former students serving in the war. Many used this opportunity to write to service men or women to raise their spirits. On March 28, the A.P. history class and student council combined to present a convocation in recognition of our troops. The convocation included members of the student body portraying outstanding Americans in history with slides of America shown. The band, Varsity Singers and Dream Company performed patriotic songs. At the end of the convocation, a plaque was presented to Mr. Fox with the names of those WHS former students who served in the Gulf War. Through out the war, students and faculty showed their love for and dedication to their country.






Singing a Salute


English for Everyday

Social Times




Students Working for the Future


Learning To Farm

Once again each student in commercial design submitted a cover design for the yearbook. The designs were voted on by the staff, and the design chosen was drawn by Neal Bell.

The type style chosen for the book was Lydian Bold. All headlines were in 30 point type; the body copy was printed in 10 point type; the picture idents were put in 8 point type.

Graphic Accents were used throughout the book for visual imagery and impact, and spot color was used to highlight certain pages.

This year a different computer program was used. It was called Copy Express, typed on an Apple IIe computer, and was much like Appleworks. The entire ad section was done on a Macintosh computer by staff members.

The number of books printed was 450. The cost to the student per copy was \$20.00. An additional \$2.00 was added for seniors who wished to have their names stamped on the cover of their yearbooks.




