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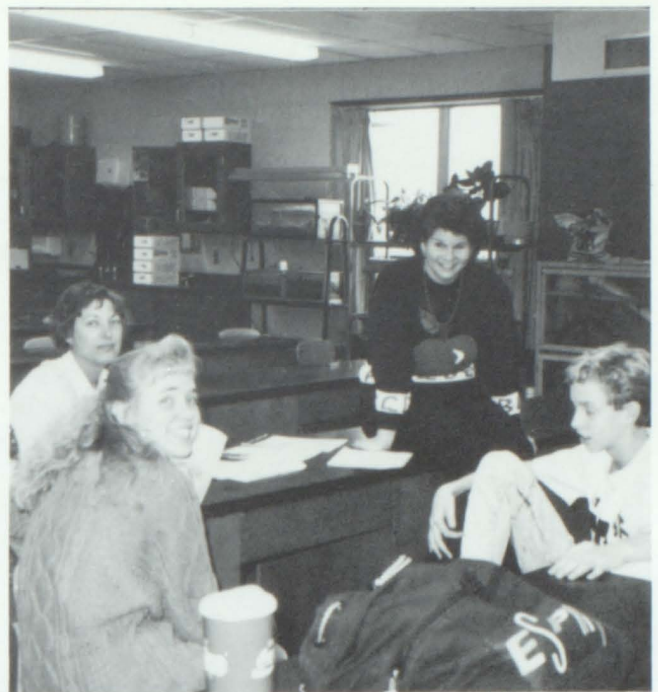

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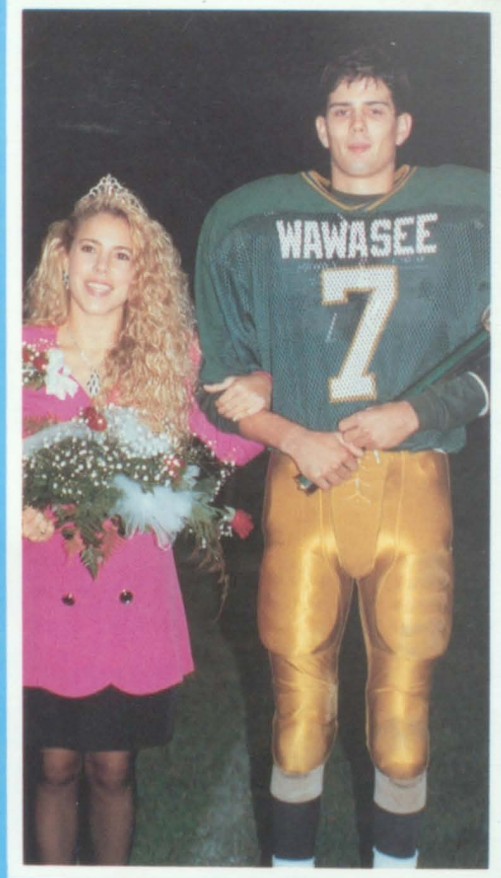


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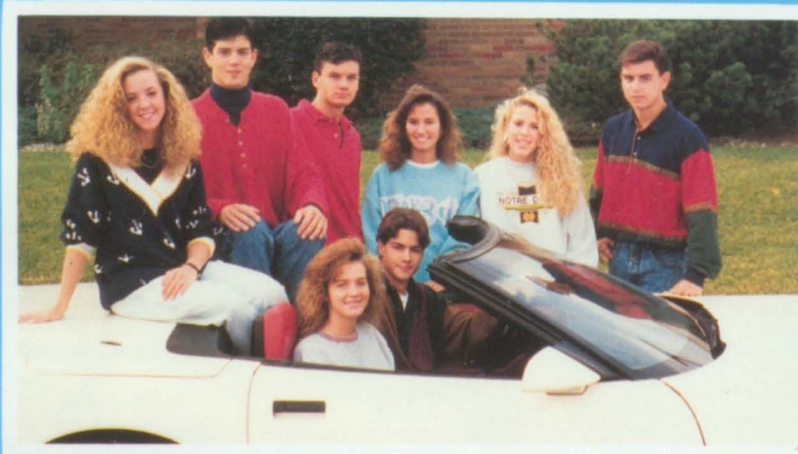
Rockin' thru the ages

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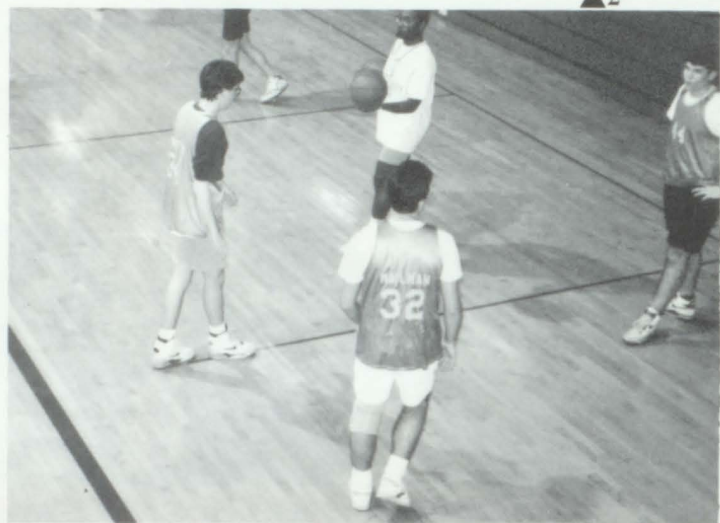
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Rough and tough games

Throughout the year the administration scheduled speakers and groups of people to speak to the student body on all types of different subjects. 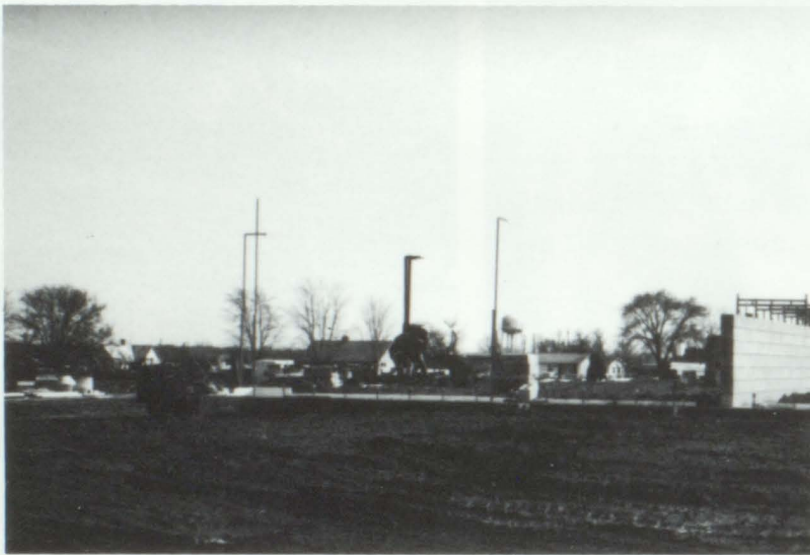
Here we grow again

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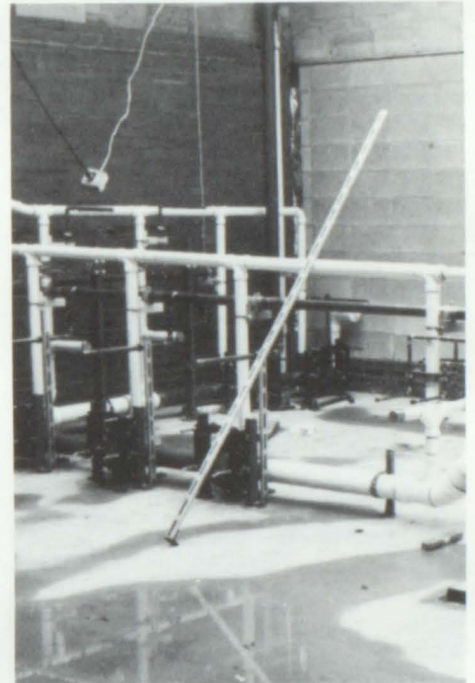

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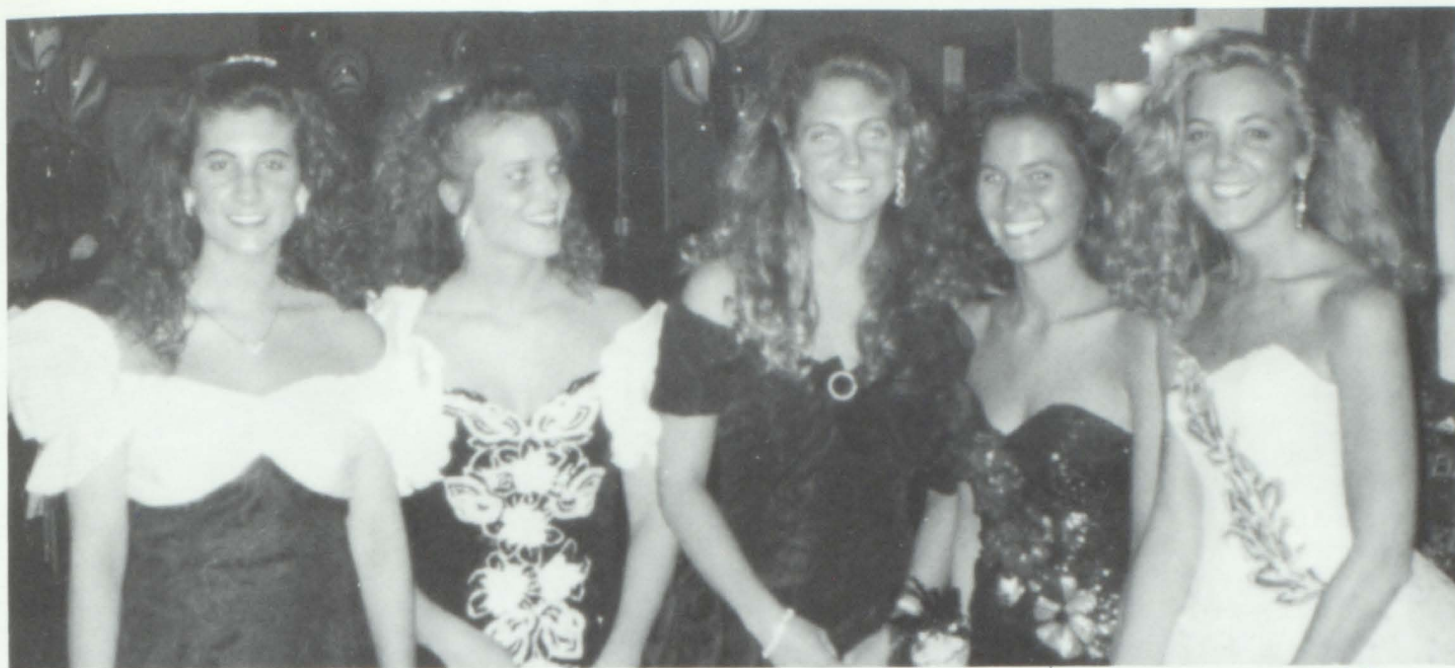

The road to success begins

On Sunday afternoon, May 31, 178 seniors marched into the gymnasium for the last time as students of Wawasee High School. One hour and fifteen minutes later, they were graduates of the class of 1992. Successful year in art

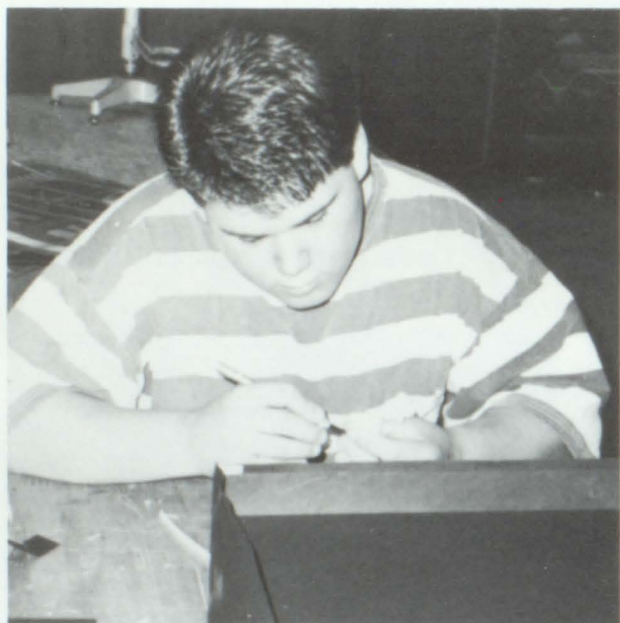
The art department had several different classes to offer to the student body: basic art, crafts, oil painting, water color, acrylic painting, drawing, and commercial design.

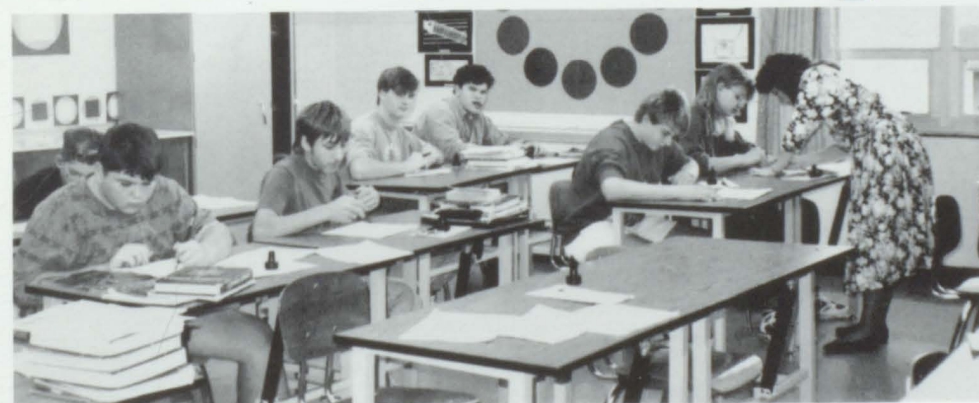

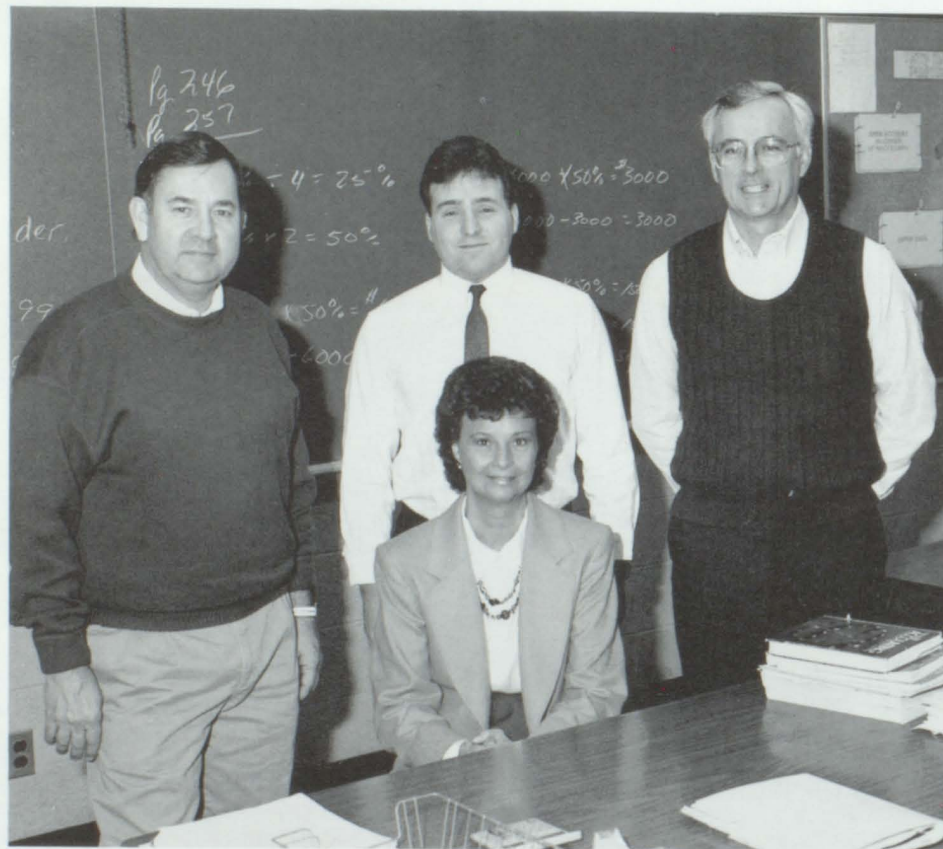
The world of business

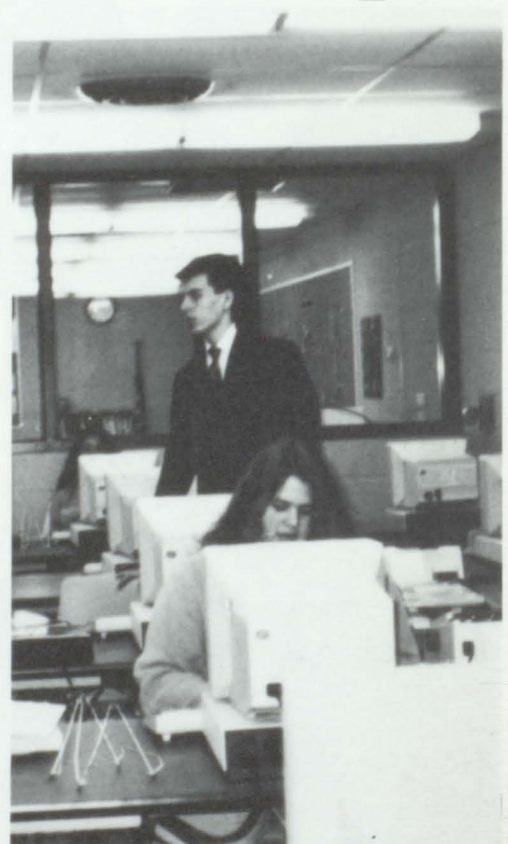
Marketing taught the students how to organize, build, and work in retail business, giving them a basic understanding of the free enterprise system.



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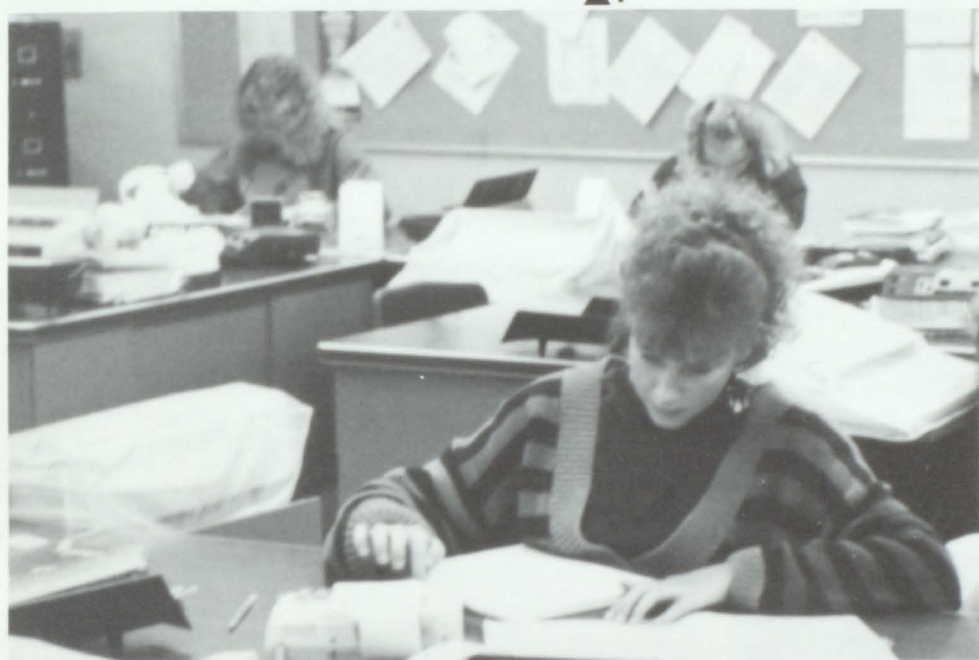
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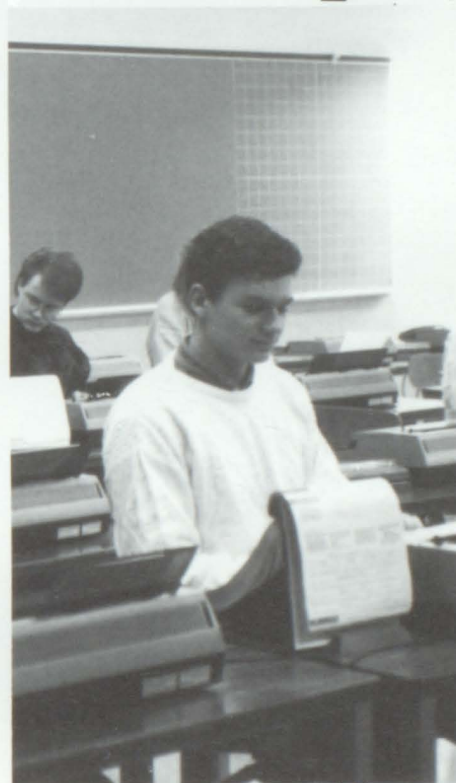
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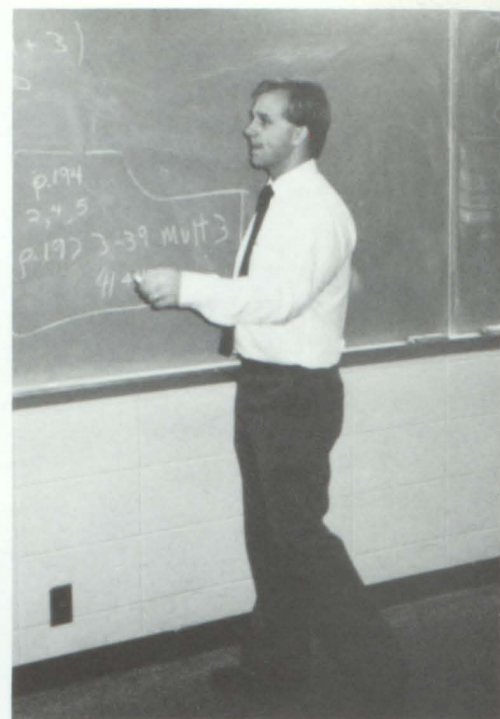

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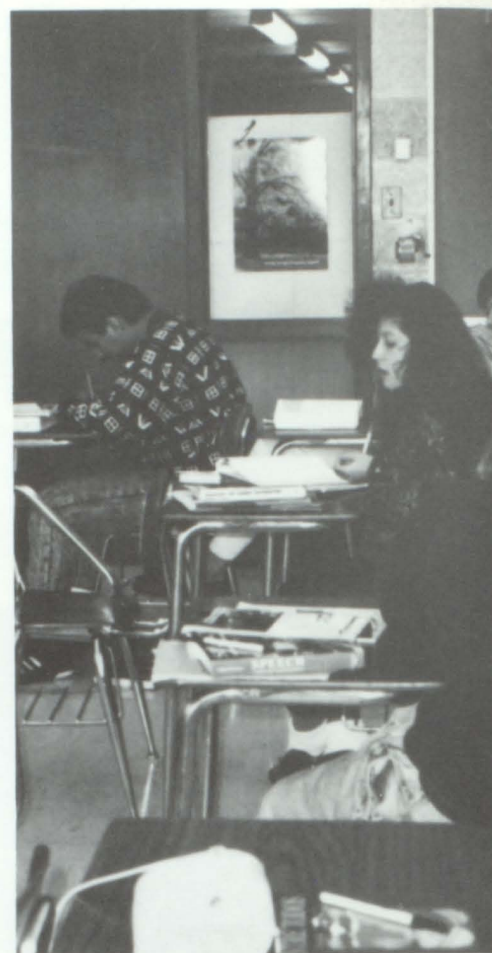

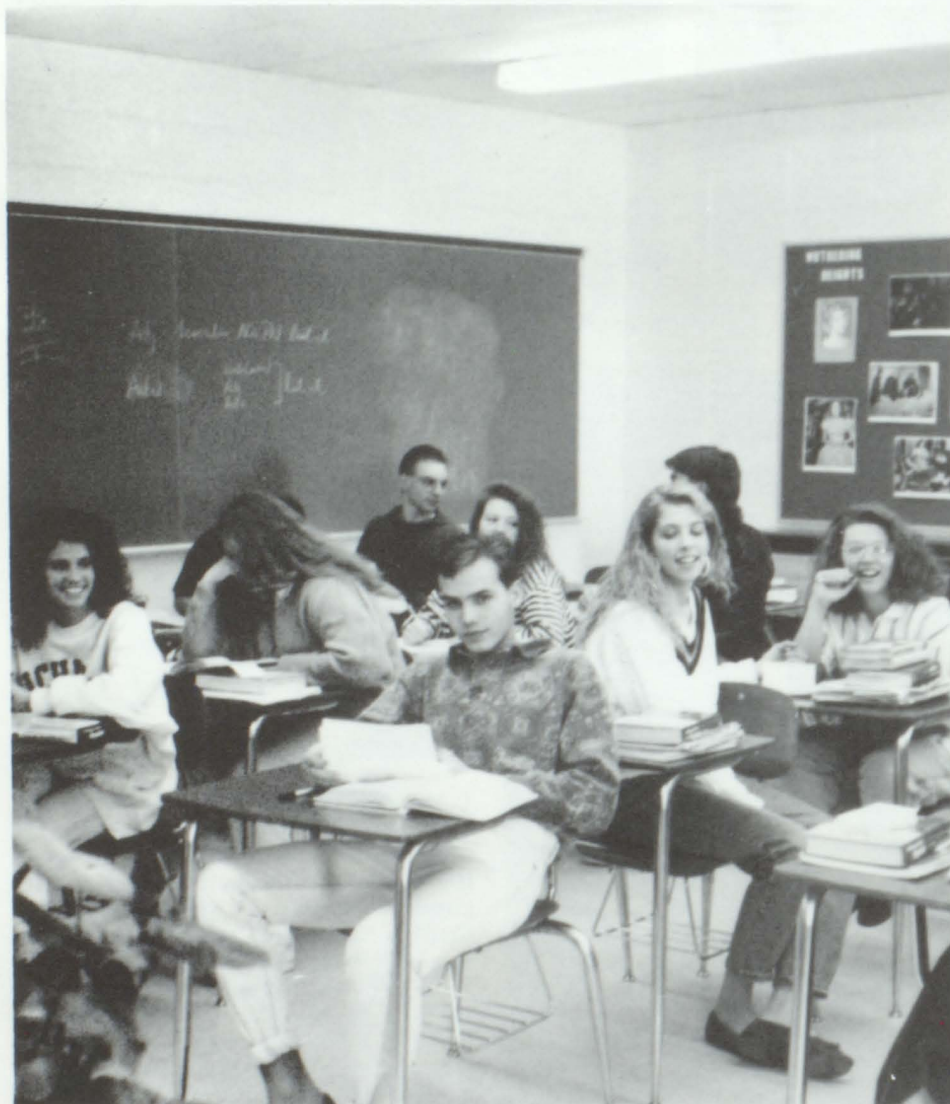
A year of many changes

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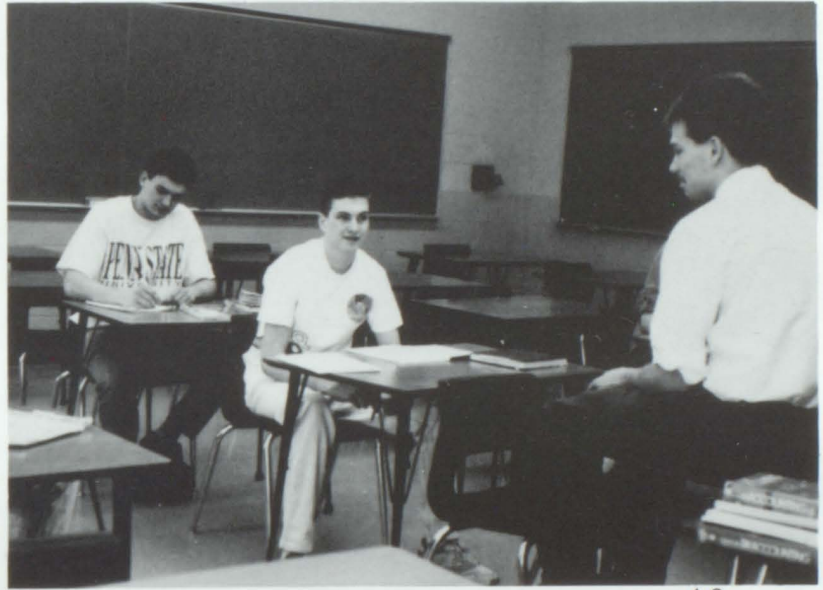

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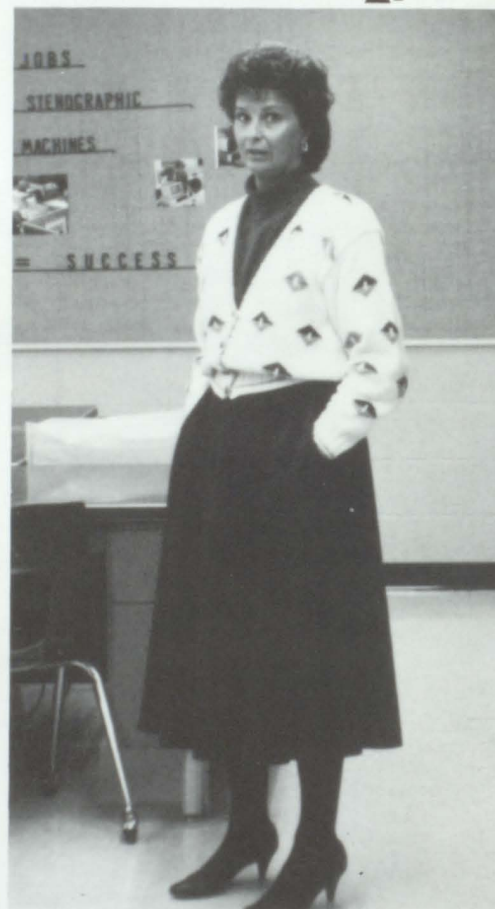

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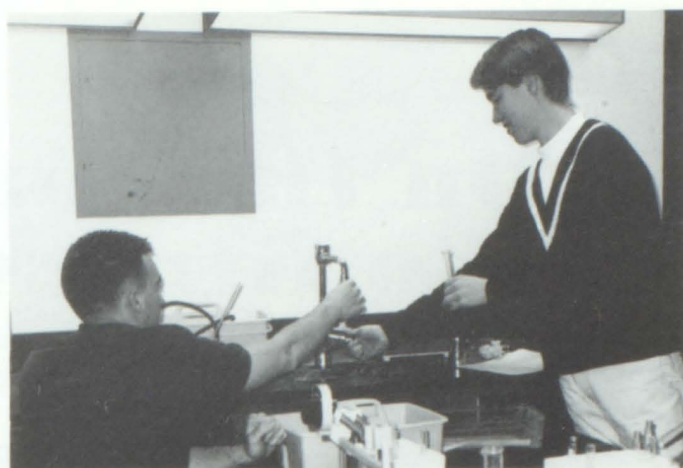

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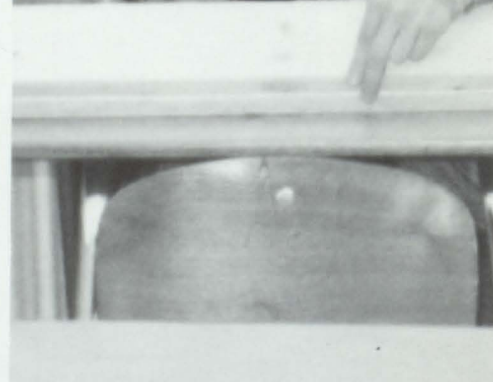

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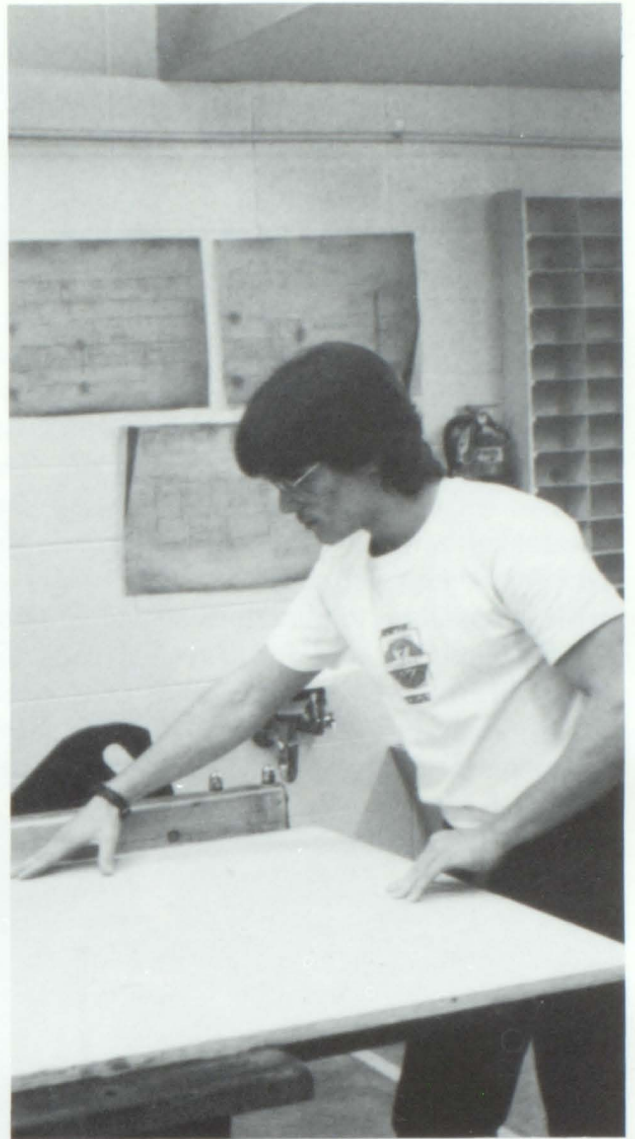
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New materials in the LRC

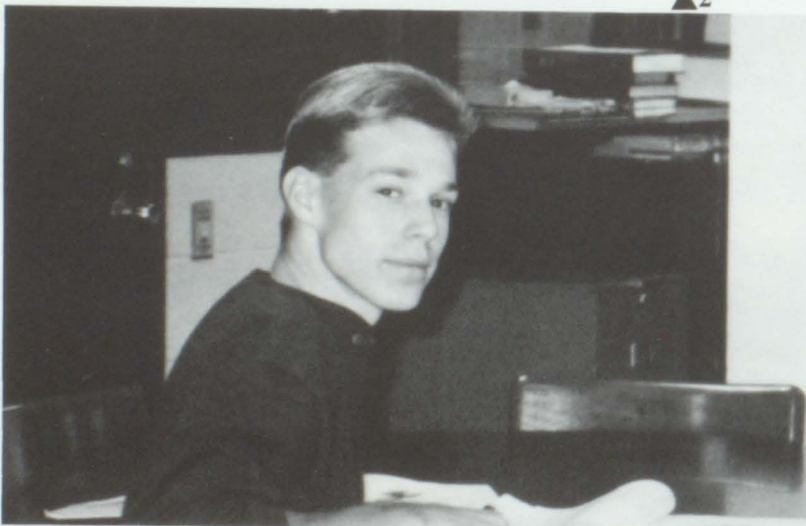

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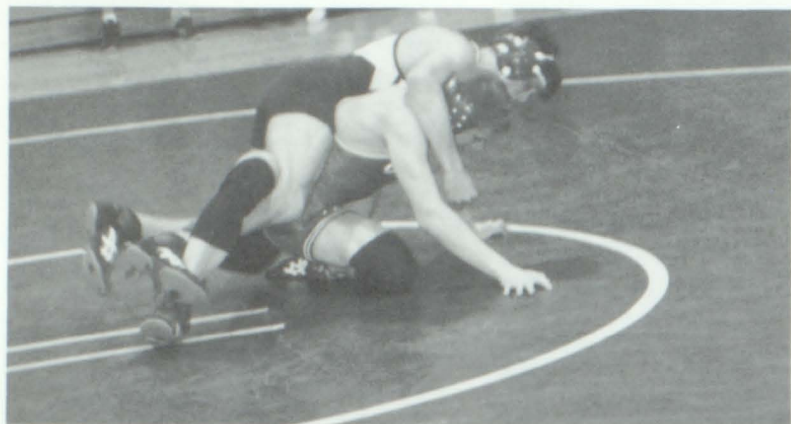

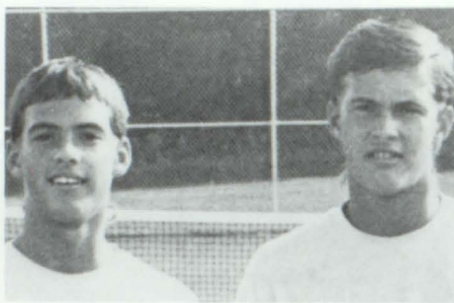
Warriors shut out opponents

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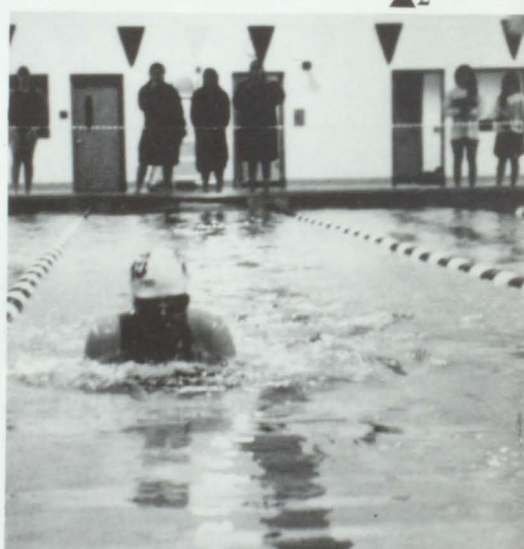

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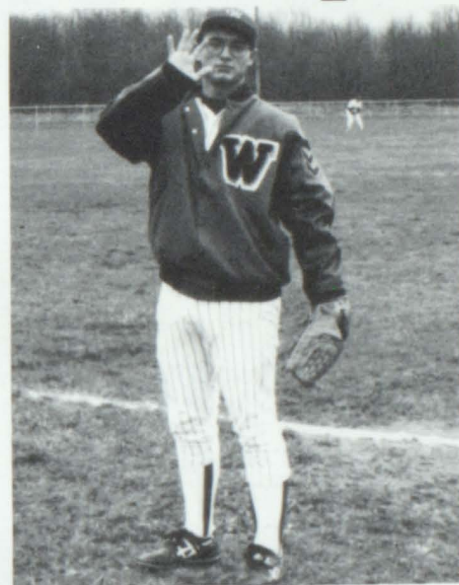

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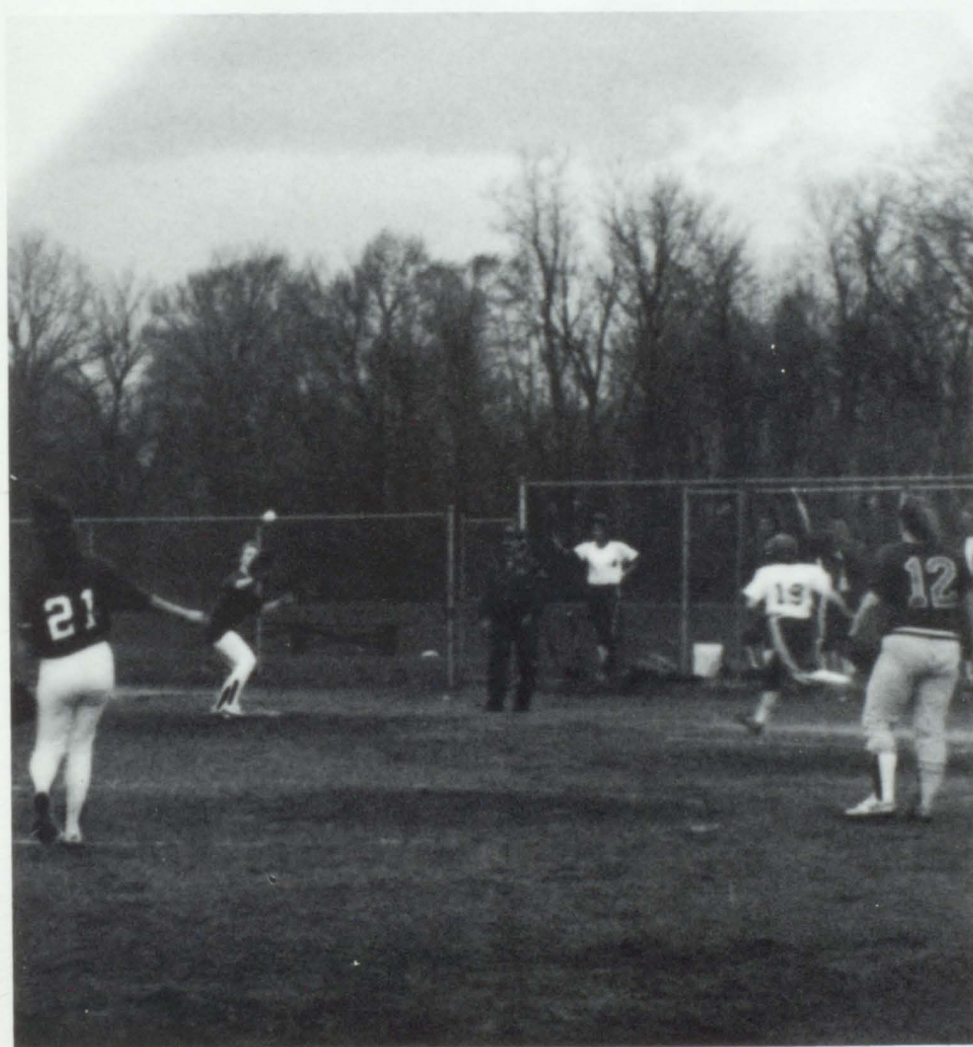

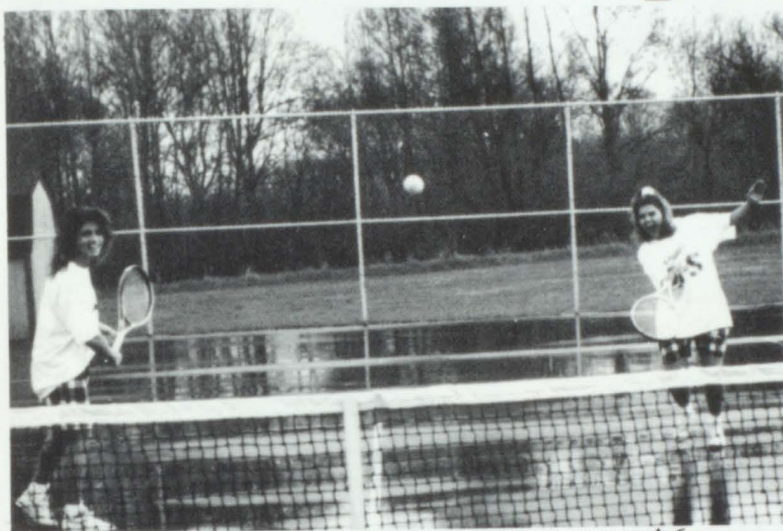
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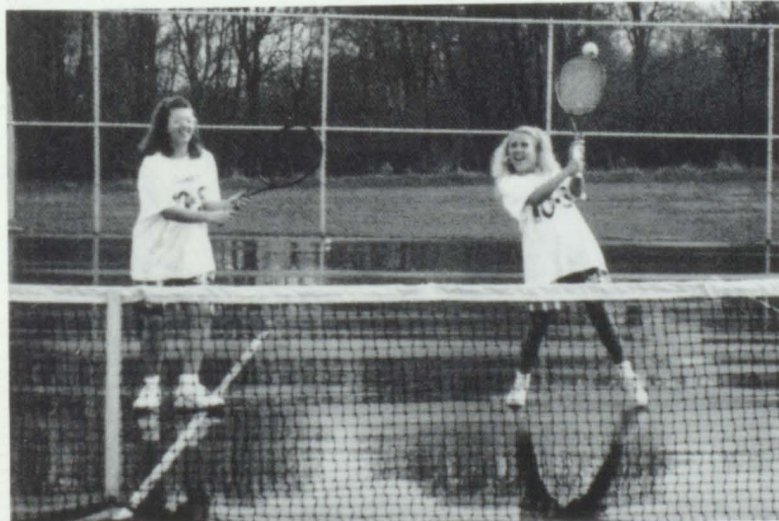
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Staying on track

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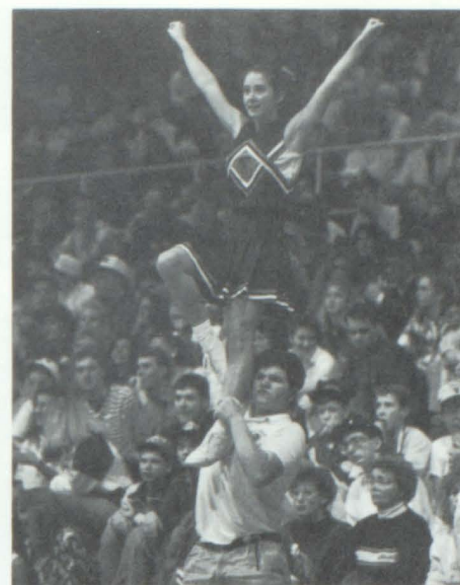

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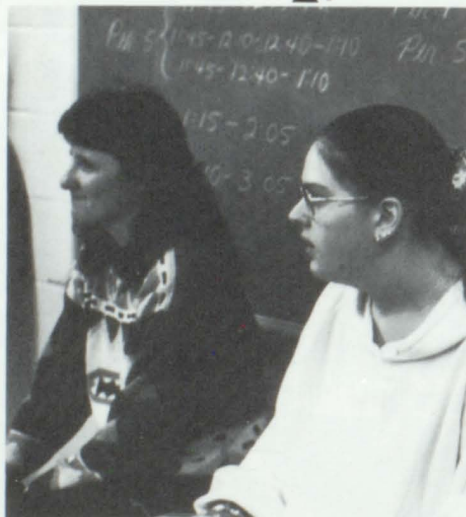

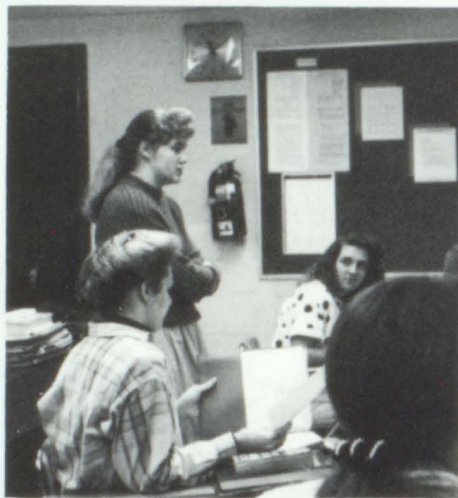

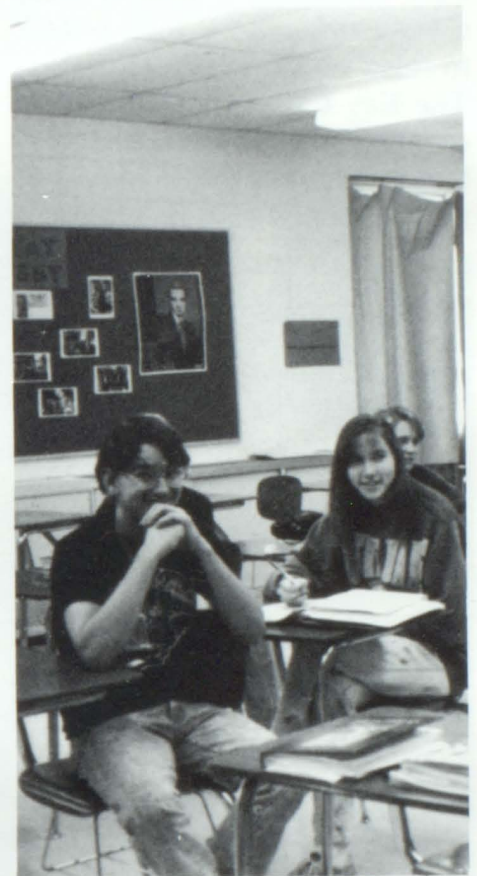

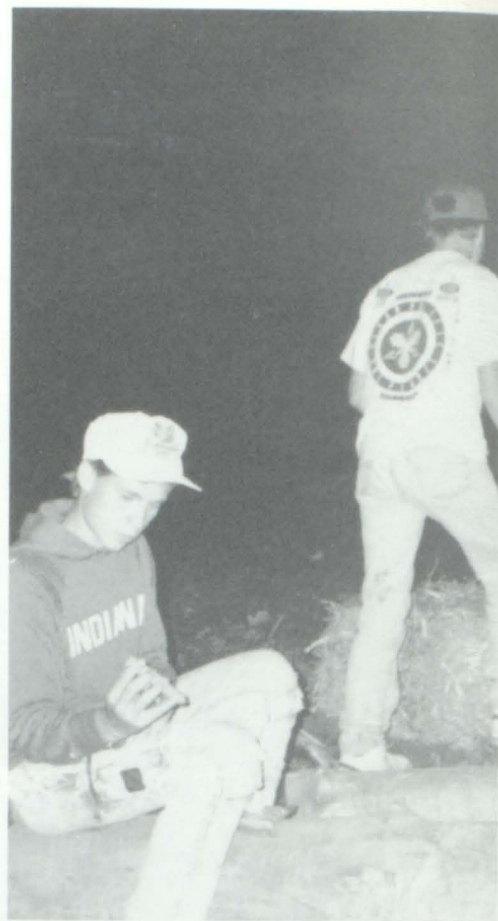
Winning with farming

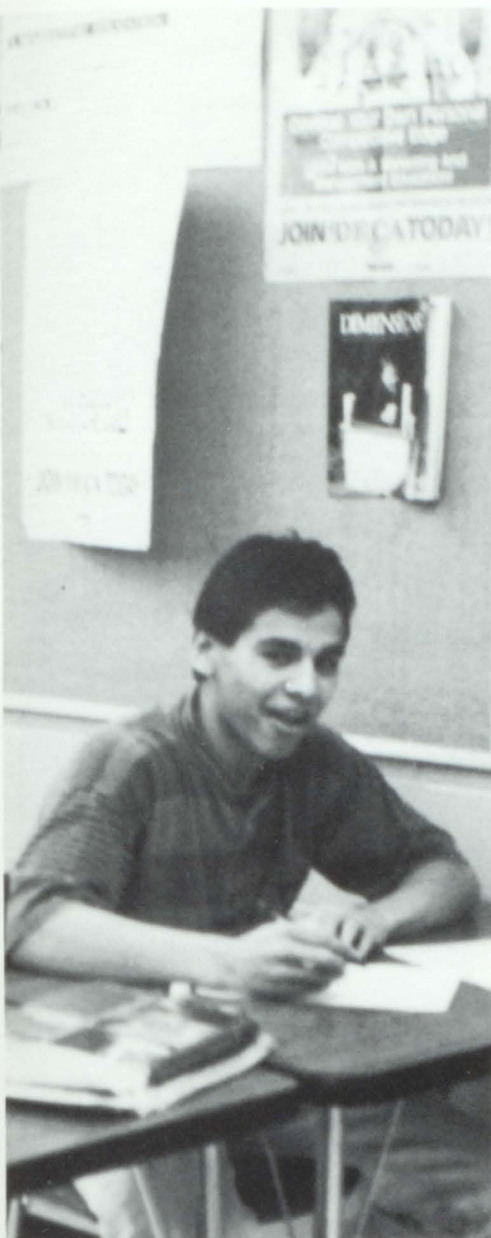


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DECA means business

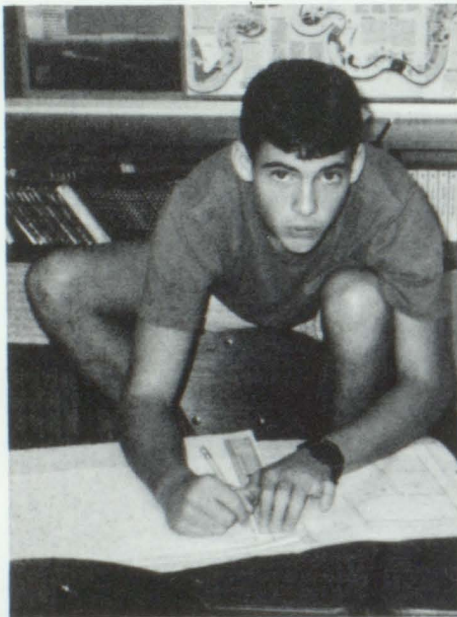
Creating a Legend

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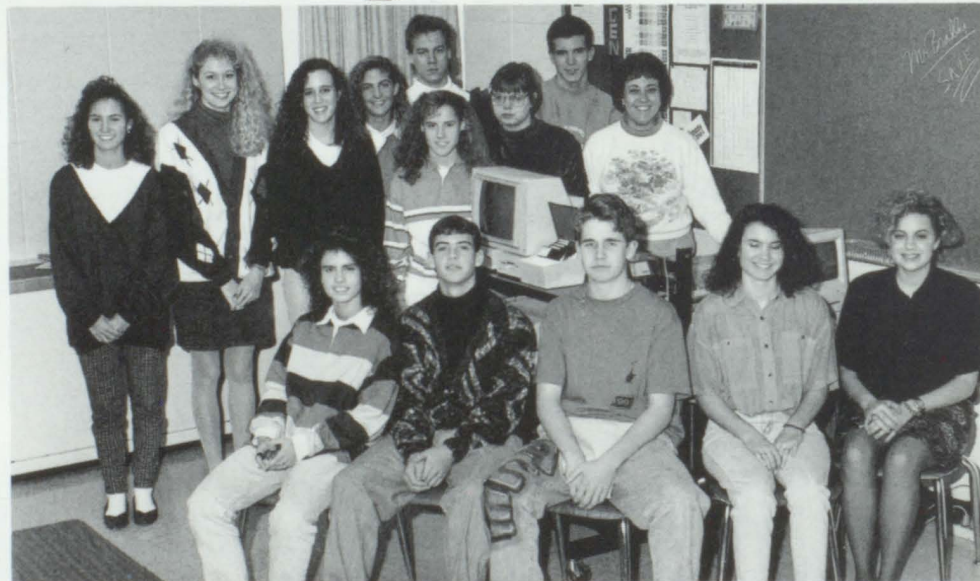

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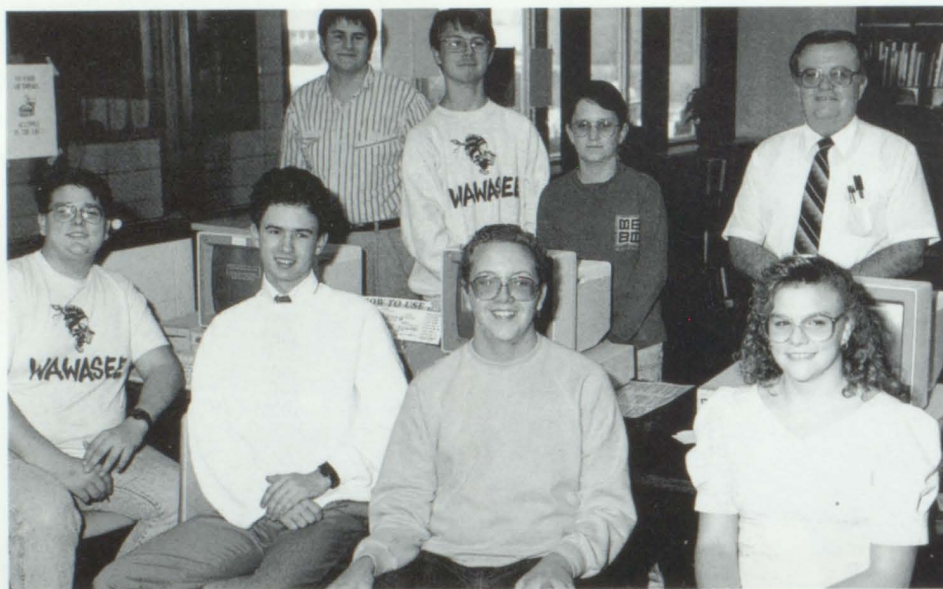

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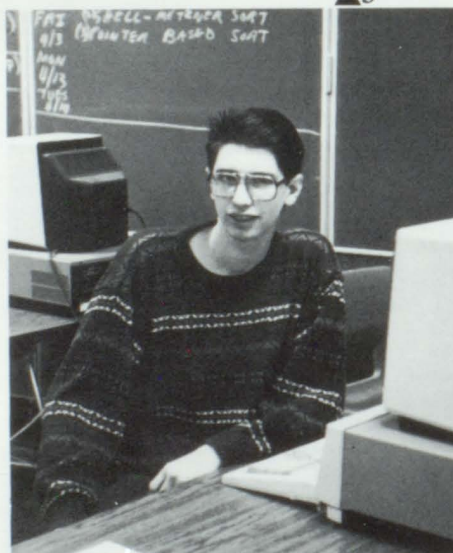

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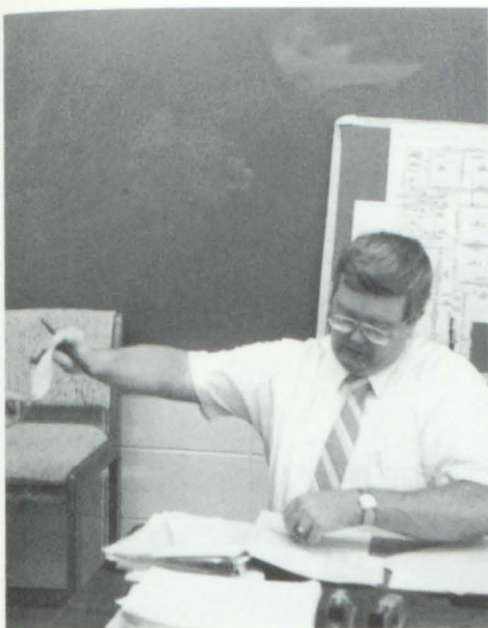


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FEA learns to teach

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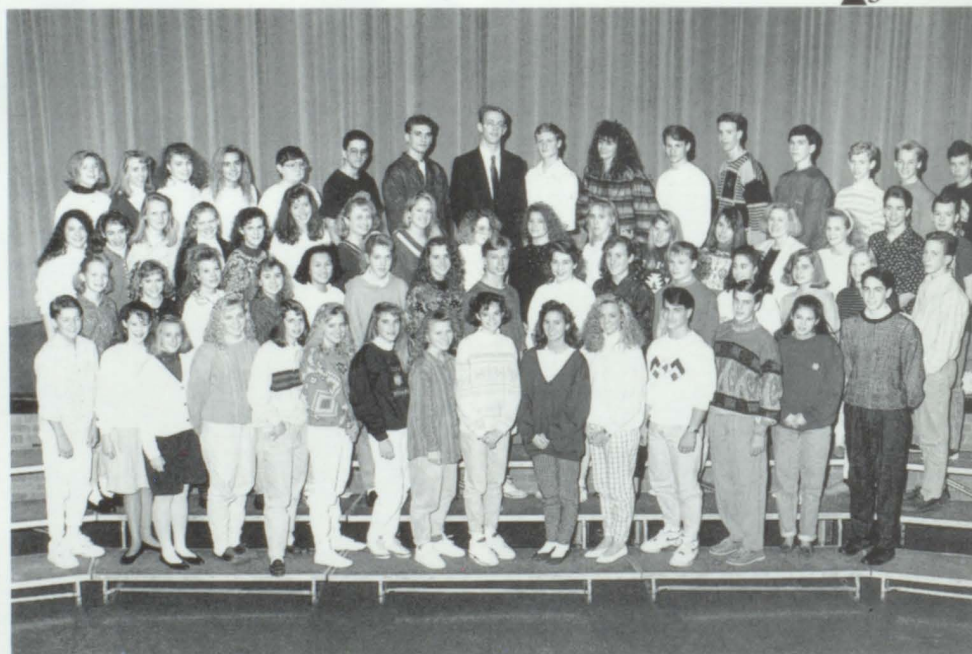

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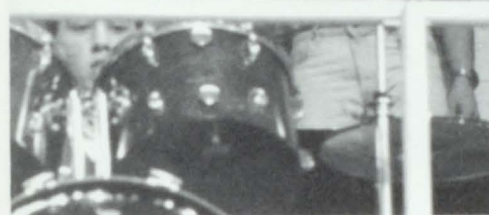
Jazzing it up

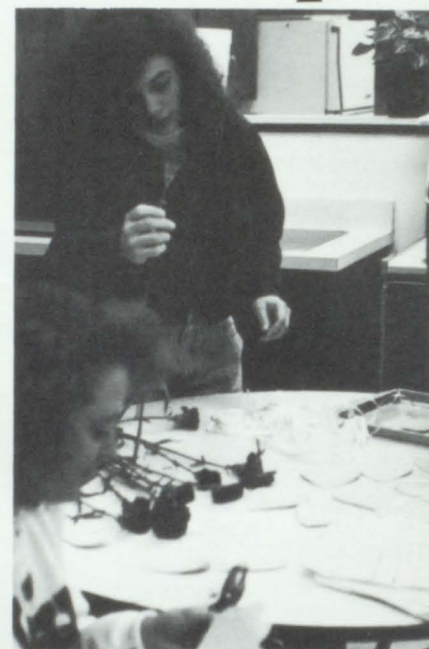

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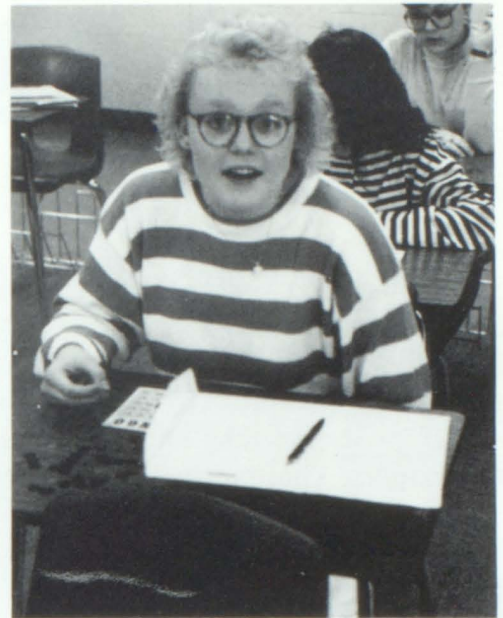

The paper used was Bordeaux 80# gloss which was cut into 8 1/2 x 11 inch pages. The binding was Smyth sewn. The

cover of the book was created by senior Sam Huffer, and all division pages were drawn by senior Mike Beezley.

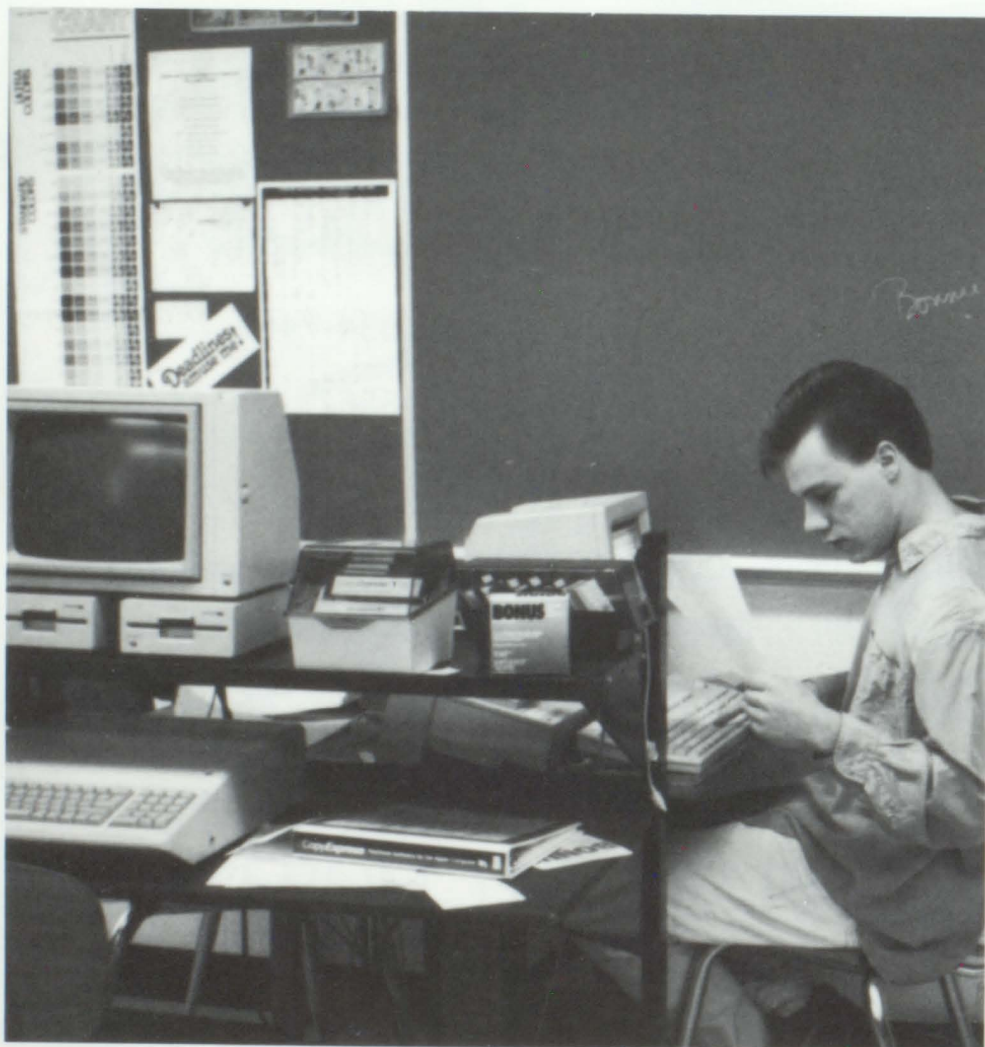
