These four men were placed there for their historical importance, but also important are the men and women of the staff who have been a part of 25 years of Wawasee history. 

The plays were held at Syracuse Junior High, lunches consisted of a brown bag, and our first home basketball game was not played until January 3, 1969. Since then there have been three major rennovations with the addition of the social studies circle and the p.e. gym; cafeteria annex and vocational building; and the 24 new rooms completed in 1993. Along with the expansion of the building, came expanding enrollment. In 1968-1969, 765 students were enrolled: since then the number of students has swollen to over one thousand. 








## Sentimental Journey






# Graditional prayer remains


Due to a 1992 Supreme Court ruling, the tradition of both an invocation and benediction at the 25th graduation ceremonies was very much an issue for this class. The WCSC school board voted to allow the senior class to decide the matter for themselves, neither condemning nor condoning the prayer. WHS was very much the center of media attention over a three week period. Local TV stations were here interviewing class officers and taping classes. Some area school boards did not allow their seniors the same amount of freedom in the decision making process, and WHS was definitely the envy of many area graduating classes. After a presentation from the corporation lawyer and a homeroom meeting filled with open debate, the class of 1993 voted overwhelmingly to include prayer in their ceremony. In another homeroom meeting all seniors wishing to present the prayers were given a chance to explain why to their classmates. Mary Neterer was then chosen to give the invocation and Matt Wilkinson the benediction.

After all this, graduation was held on Sunday afternoon, June 6. One hundred and ninety-three seniors received their diplomas after listening to a variety of well given speeches. Dr. Thornton

welcomed the audience on behalf of the school corporation, and Senior class president Angie Garner welcomed family and friends on behalf of the graduates. The seniors, with the girls wearing silver robes to commemorate the silver anniversary year, marched in to the gym to the traditional "Pomp and Circumstance" performed by the symphony orchestra and Mrs. Betty Appenzeller on the organ. Stacey Coy, salutatorian, spoke to those present about the challenges that lie ahead: Jenny Beer, valedictorian, recalled some special memories from her high school vears. Before his address on four key ingredients to success, Mr. Nyle Fox, principal, presented special awards to three administrators who were involved with the first graduation exercises 25 years ago: former superintendent Don Arnold: former principal Henry Smith; and former vice-principal Donn Kesler. After the presentation of diplomas and the tassles were turned, the candlelighting ceremony was held during which the commencement choir sang "Like an Eagle." The seniors then marched out and began a new tradition; on the front parking lot hats were tossed into the air to celebrate the end of their high school ca-






## Language arts department has a memorable year


## Speaking with foreign tongues


The first temporary group of students was from Costa Rica. They came for three weeks in January. The nine students enjoyed the time they spent in the United States, and some did not want to go home.




### Socially accepted


# Opportunities for the future



#### What's new in science?






### Just "old" computers for industrial technology



# New equipment makes research easier

Not only nine new computers. but also a new video distribution system, which was used for still videos, regular VHS and laser disc, were two parts of the new technological equipment that the LRC received during 1993. A microfiche printer and a CD tower were also part of the new hardware this year. The printer could make copies from the microfiche monitor, which wasn't possible last year. Once the 7 CD tower was installed, there were several new programs for students' use, including an encyclopedia and SIRS. The new technology gave Wawasee students the possibility of doing almost all of their








## Administration has two new members




### Swinging into action






# Warrior wrestling still on a roll!






# Writing up a storm!




# Yearbook travels to St. Francis




# Computer technology changes things

# The LEGEND continues...


