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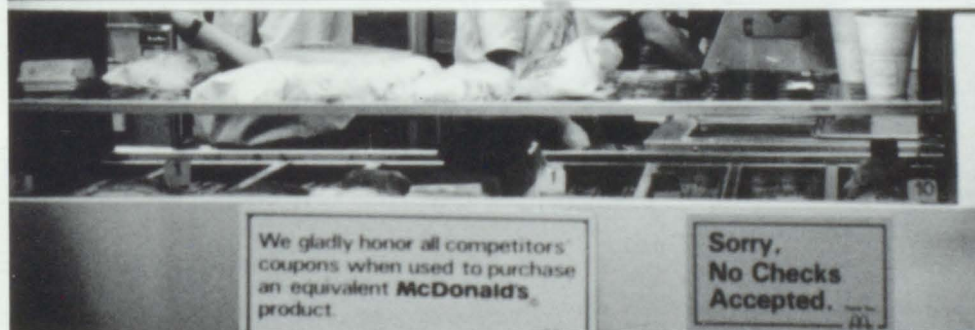
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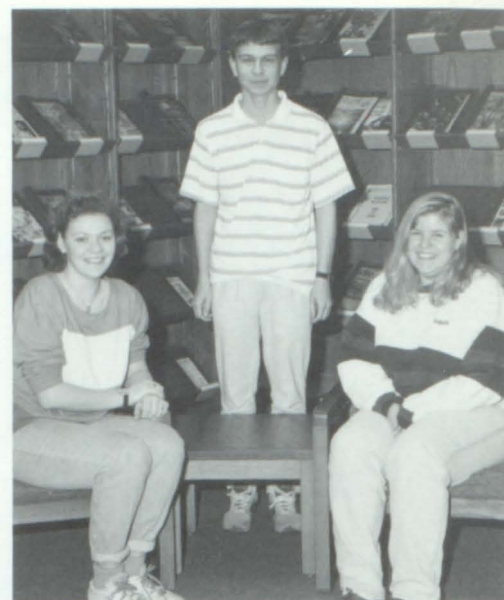

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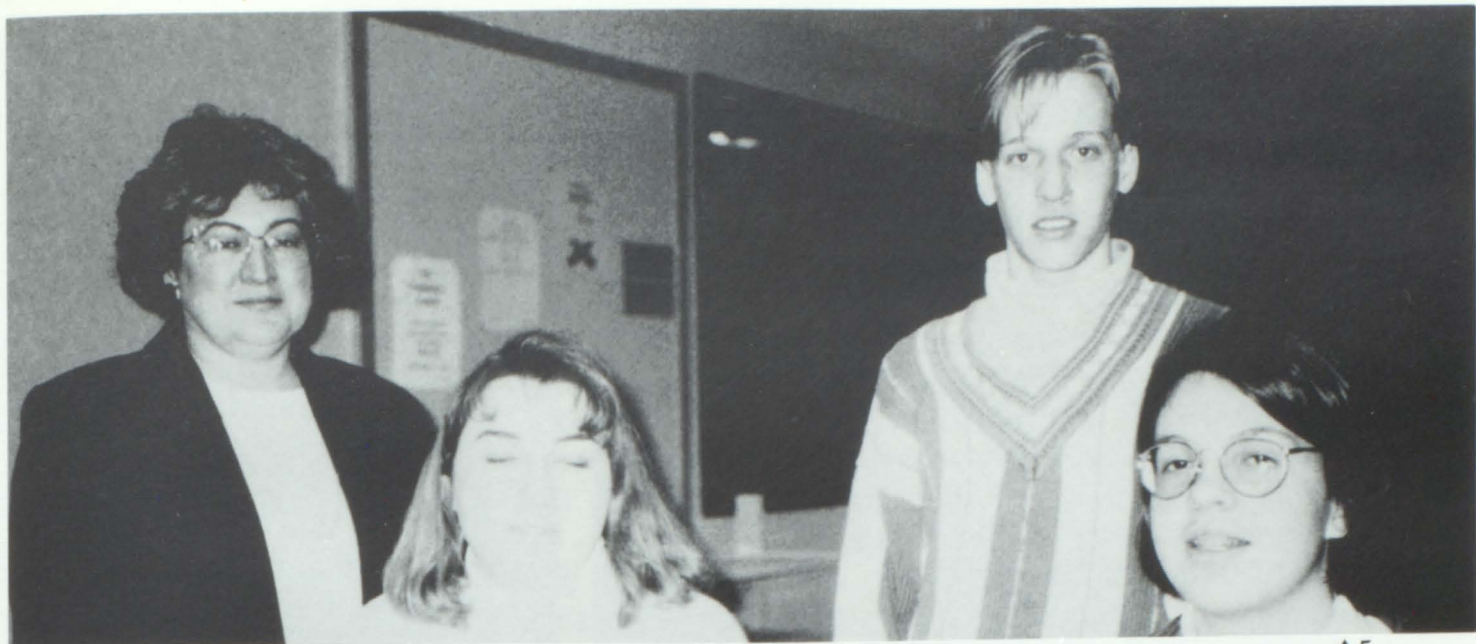

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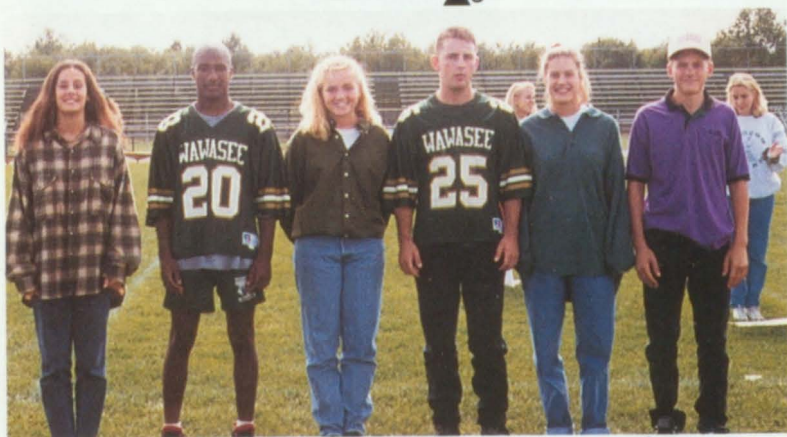

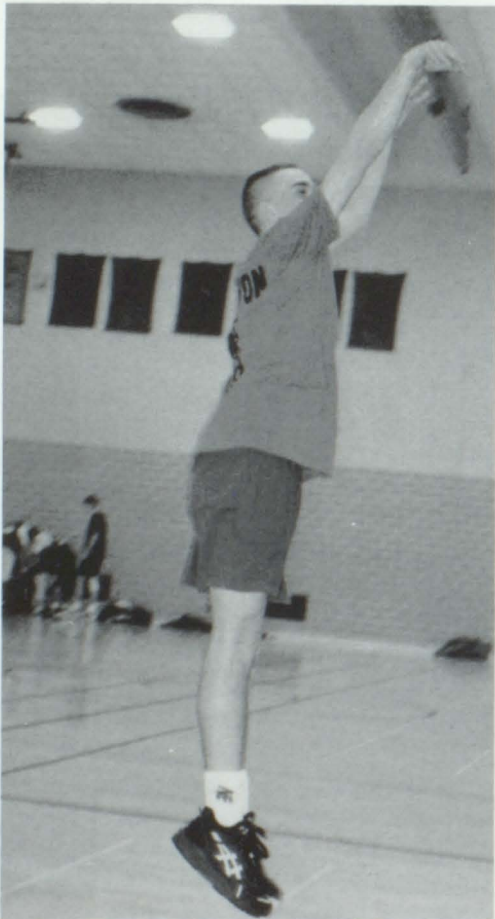

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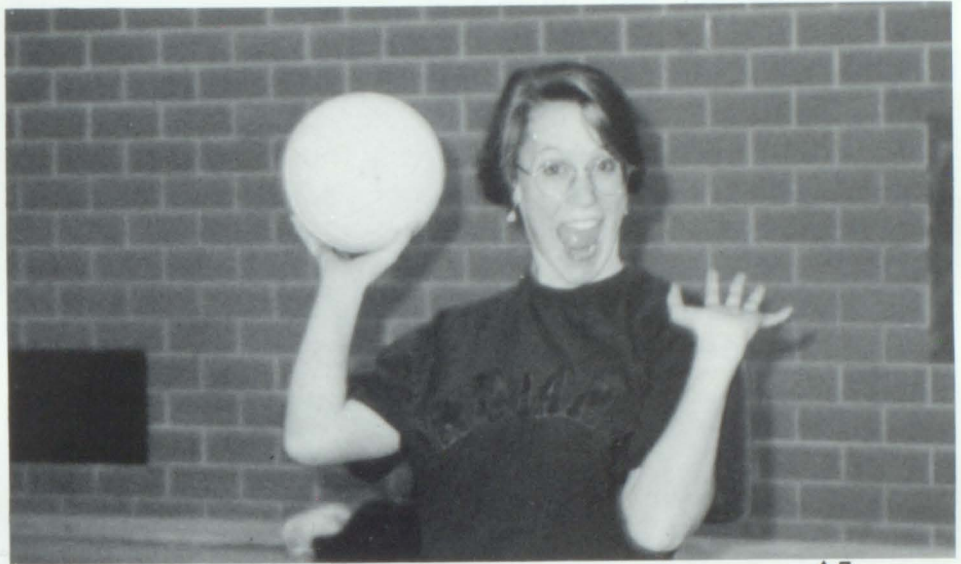
The action is HOT

"At 7:00 on those two Saturday mornings, I hated it, but now that they are made up I'm glad it's done," commented Mrs. Harkleroad.

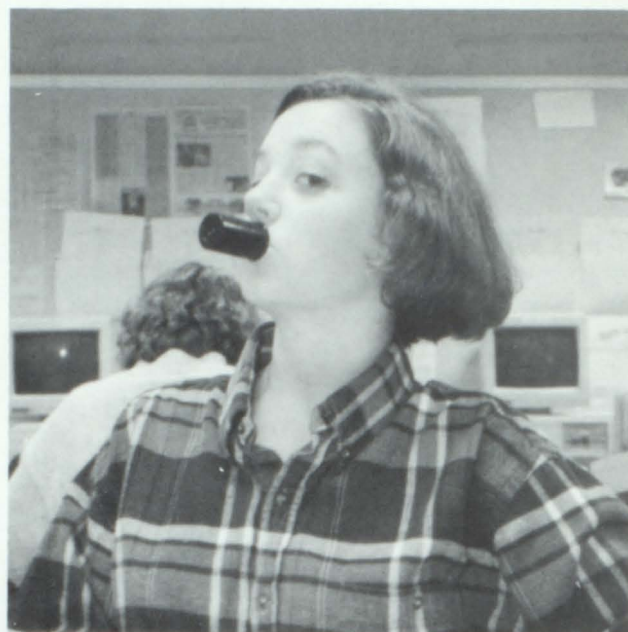
Mrs. Lant said, "We had class as usual. Most students were in attendance--I had about two absent each period."

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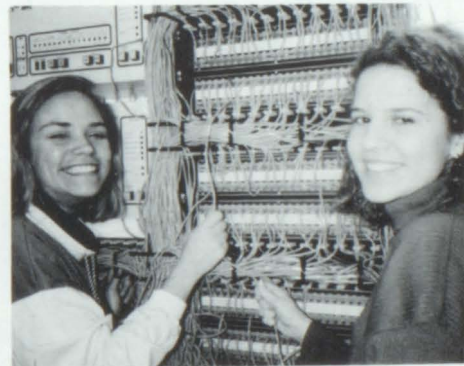

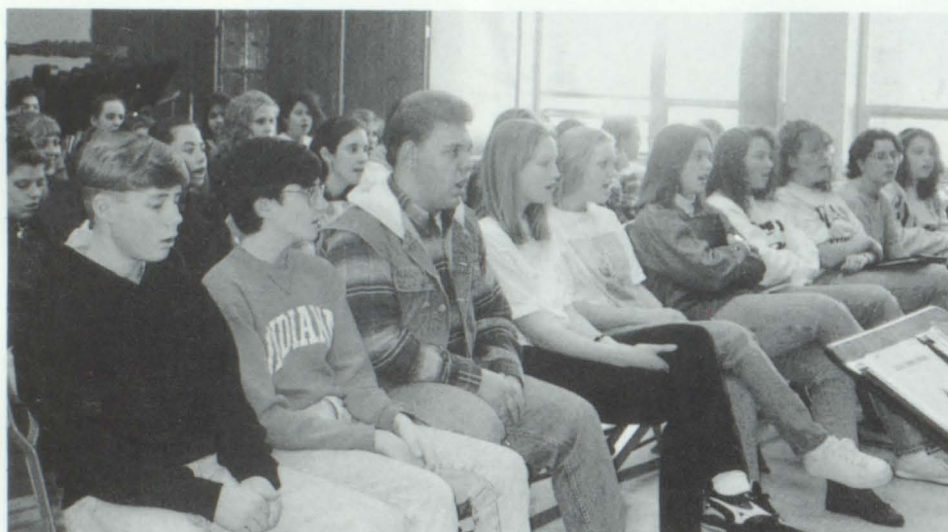
Singing away

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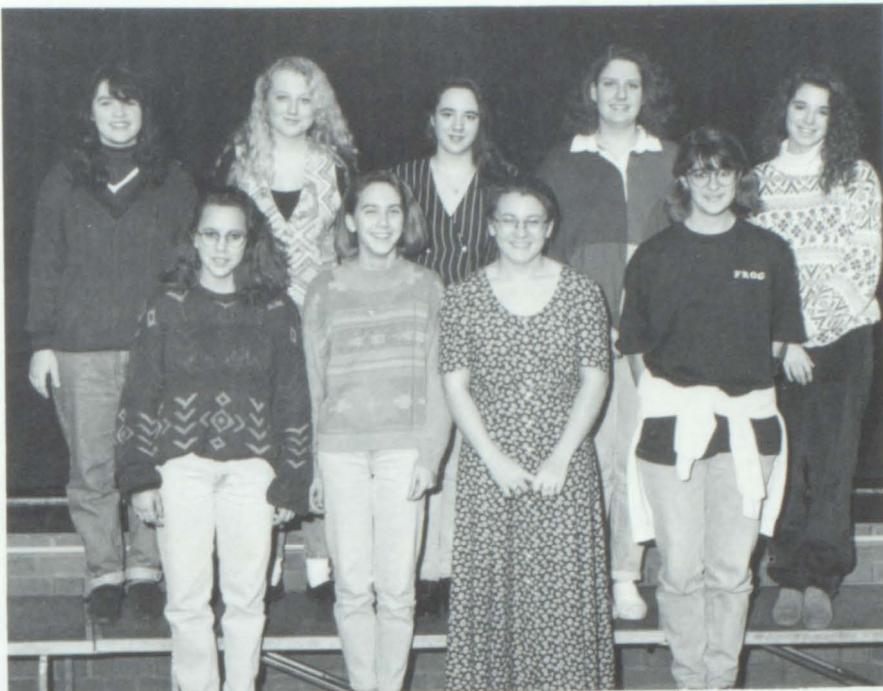

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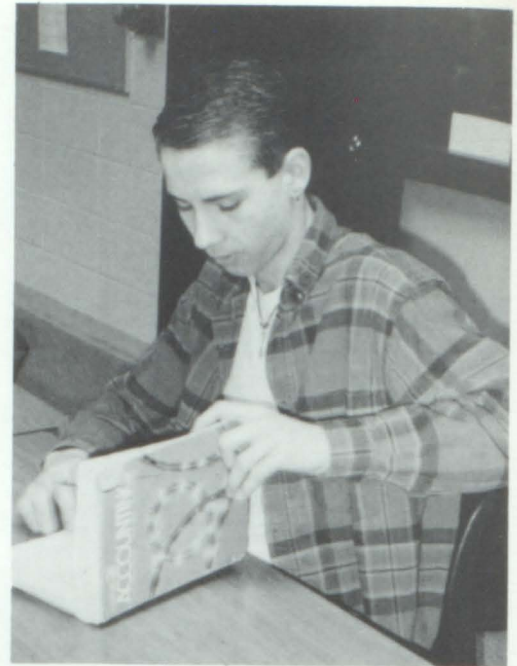

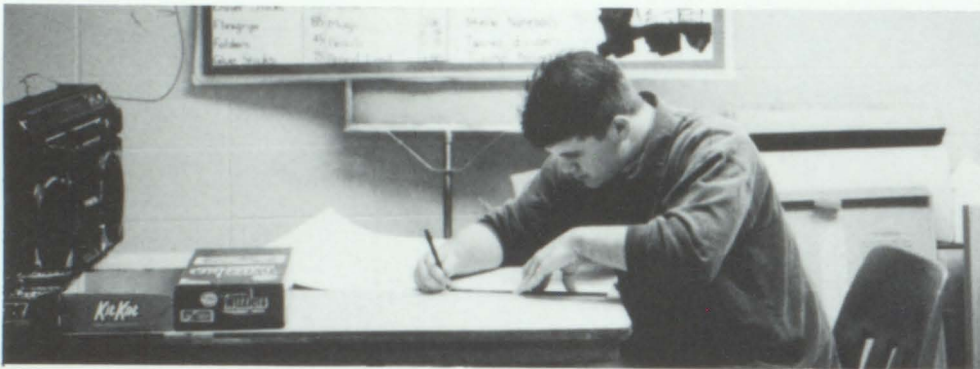
Let's get down to business

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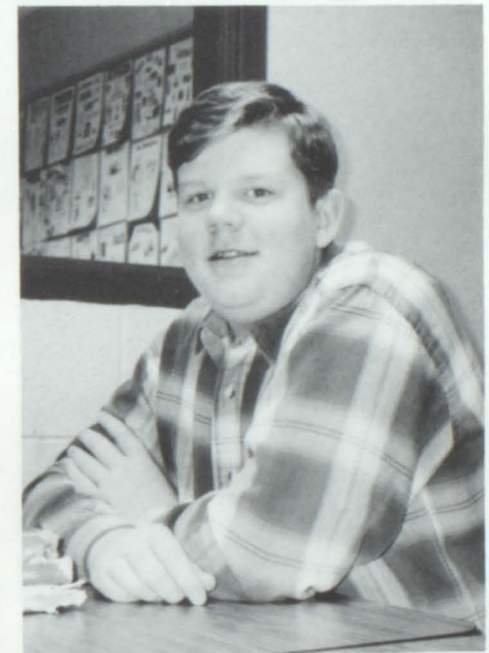
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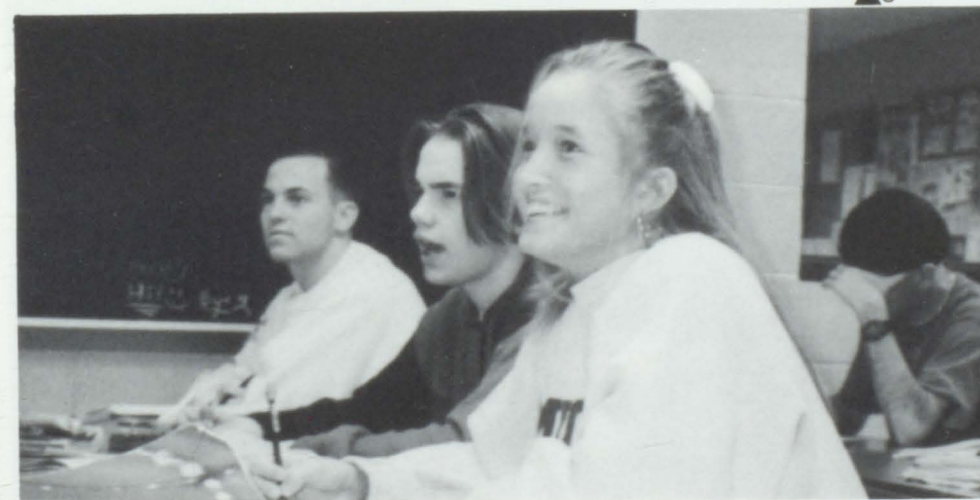

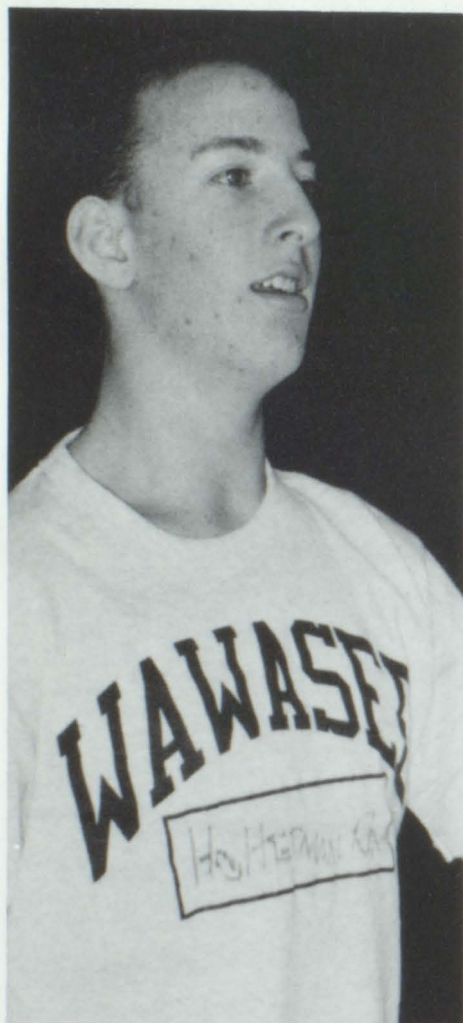
PE is heart pounding excitement

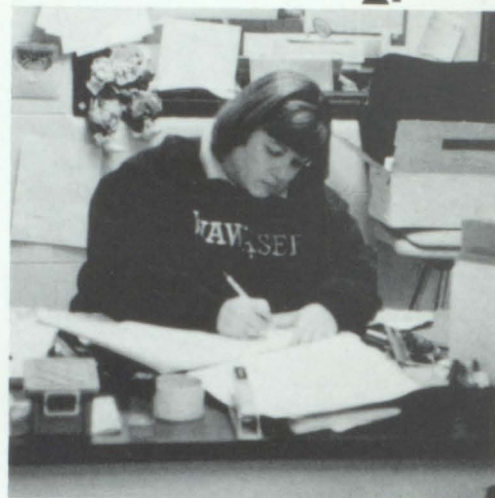
Language arts expands its boundaries

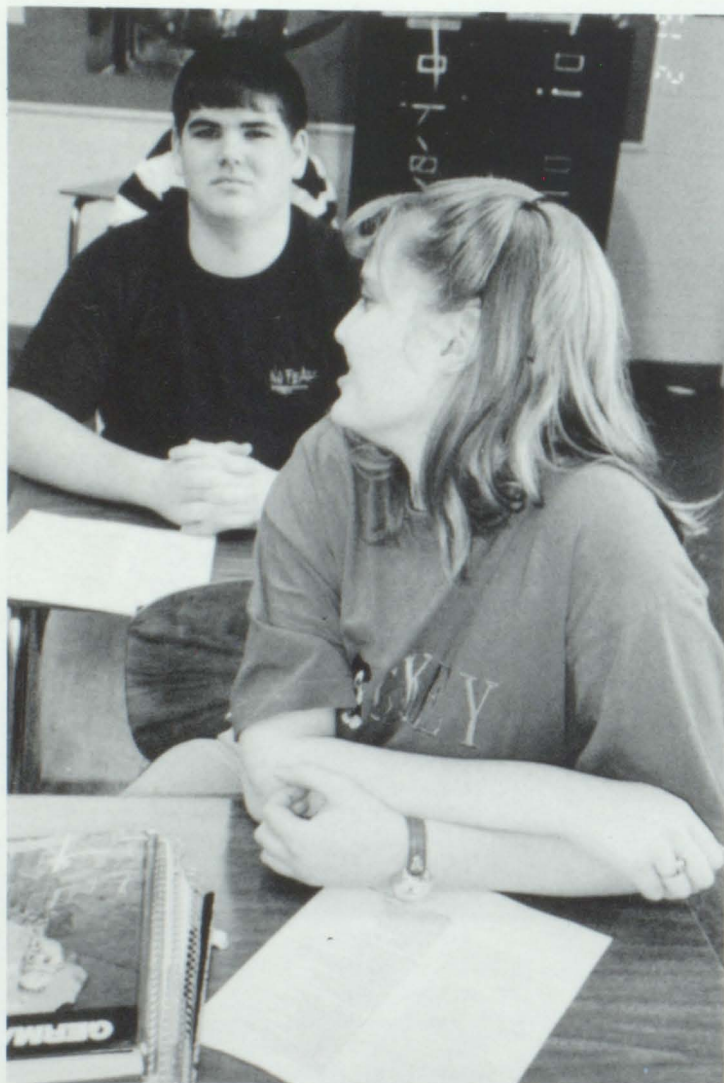
Talking with a new accent!

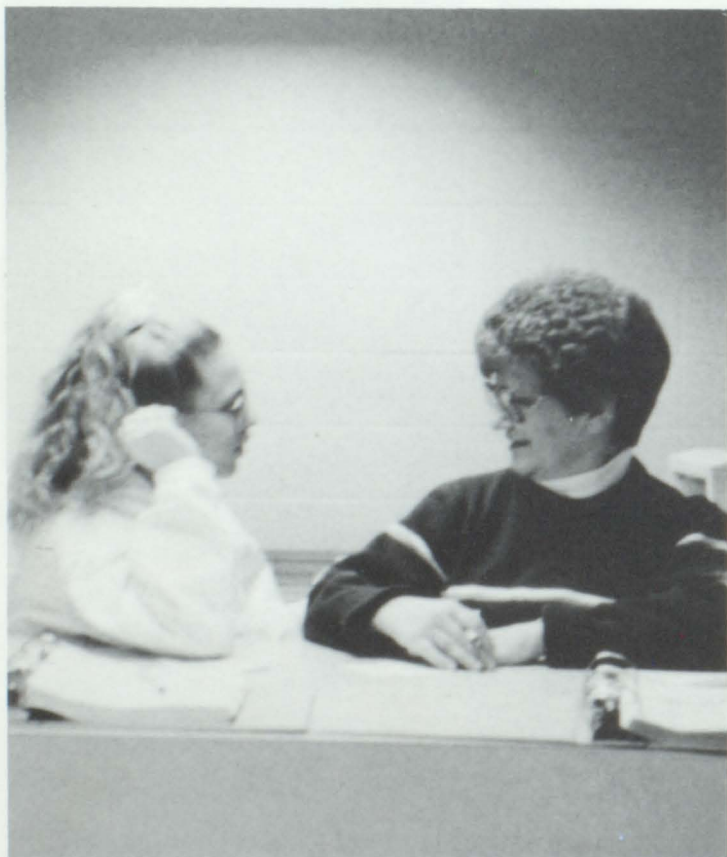
Keeping up with changing technology

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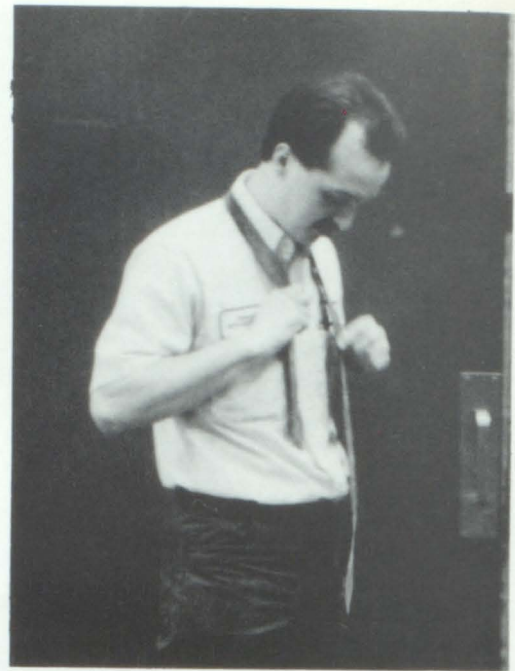

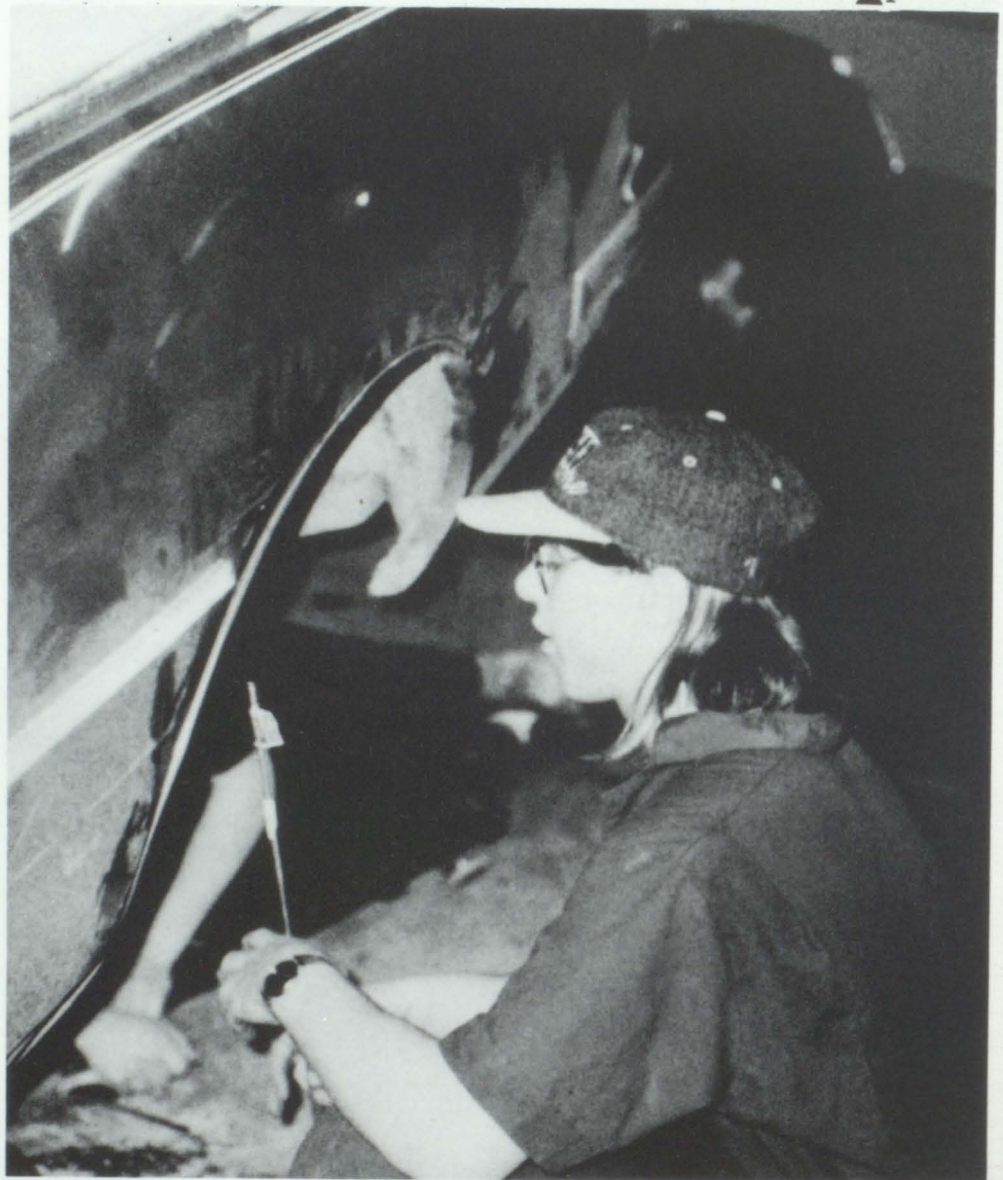

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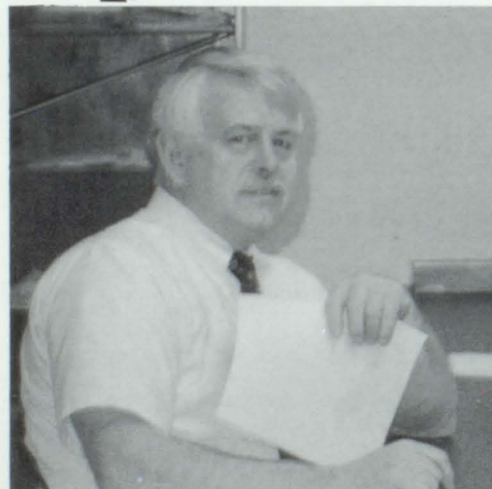

Working with the arts of industry

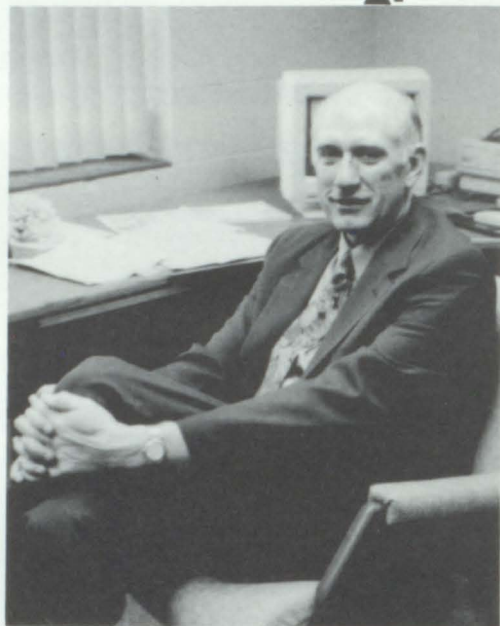
Administration keeps it going

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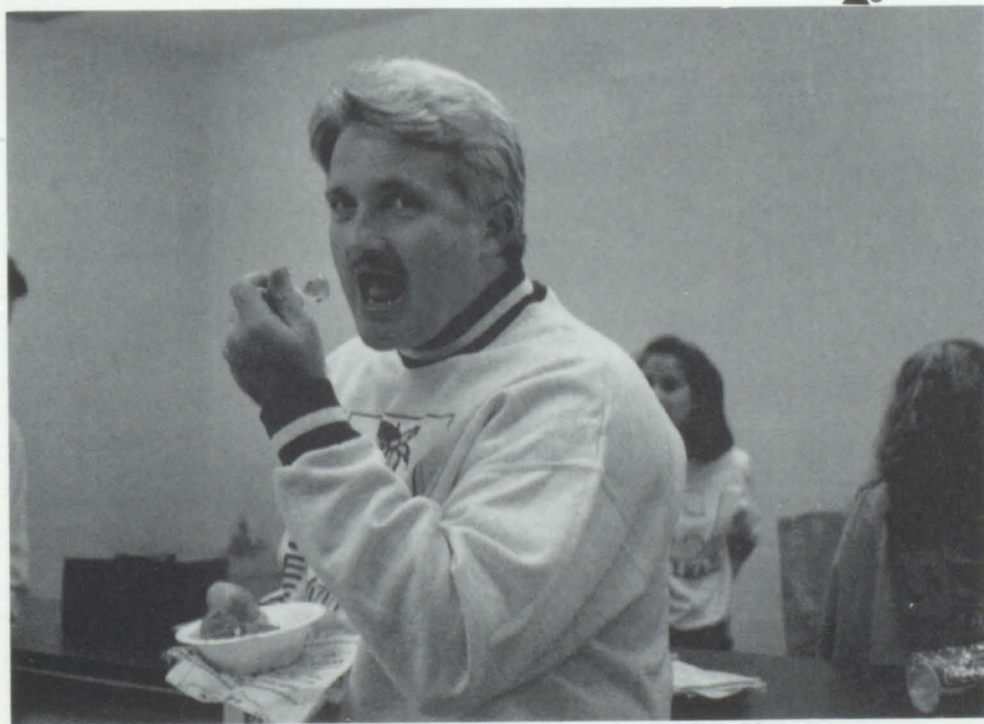
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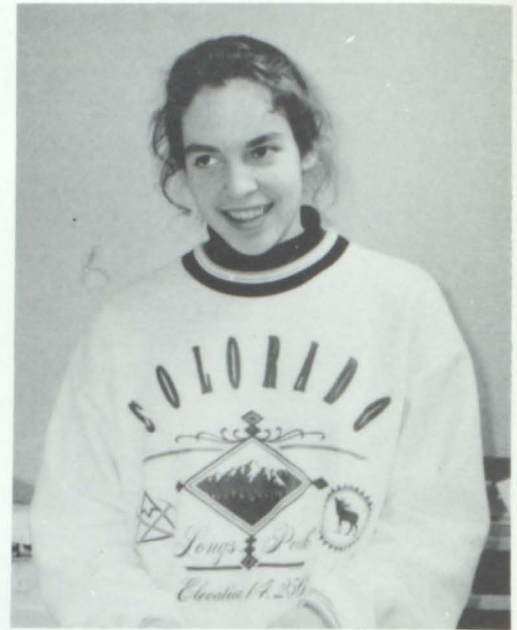

Looking ahead

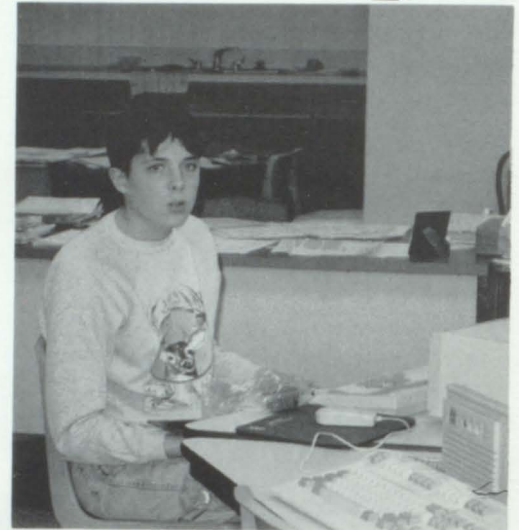

Special needs was a class that helped emotionally or mentally handicapped

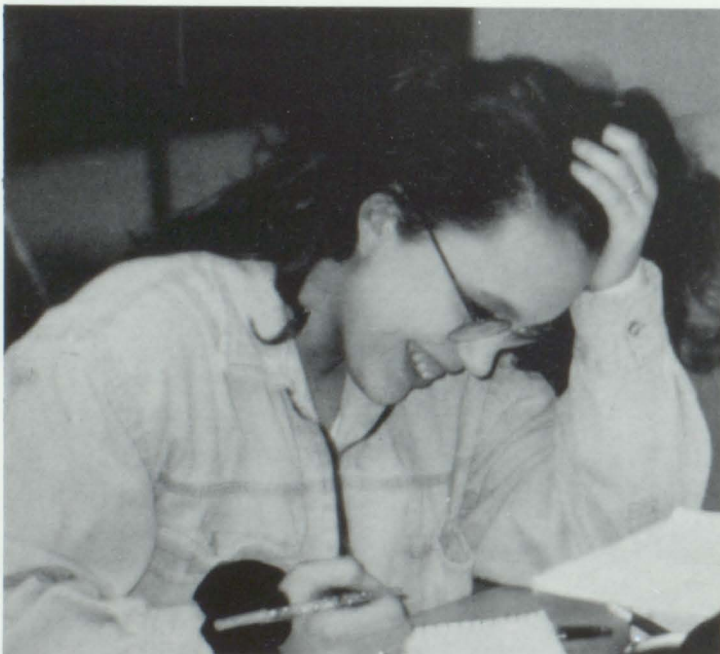

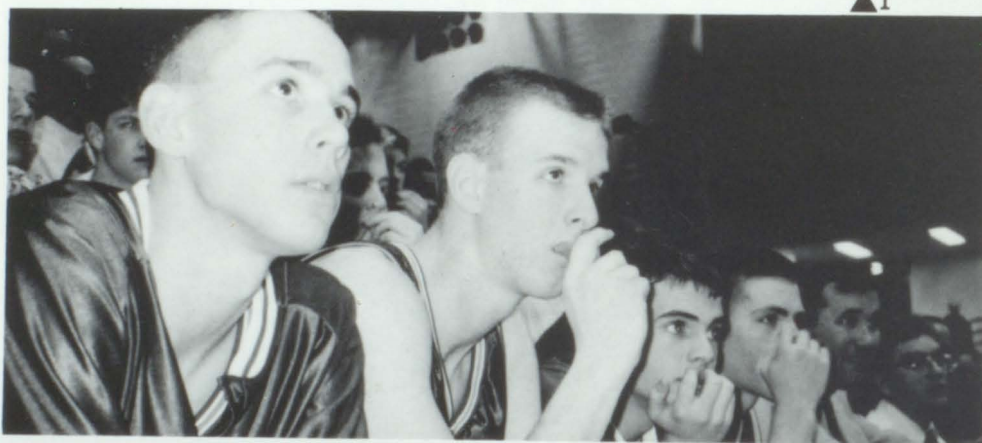

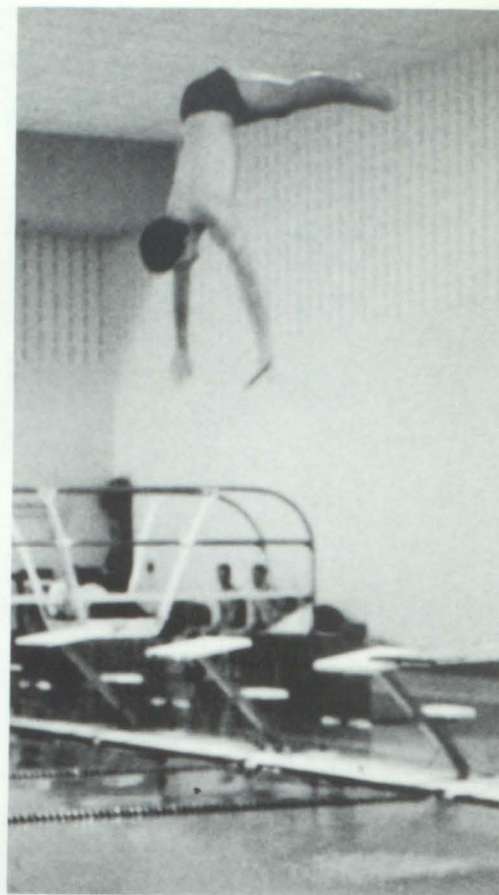


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Great at State!

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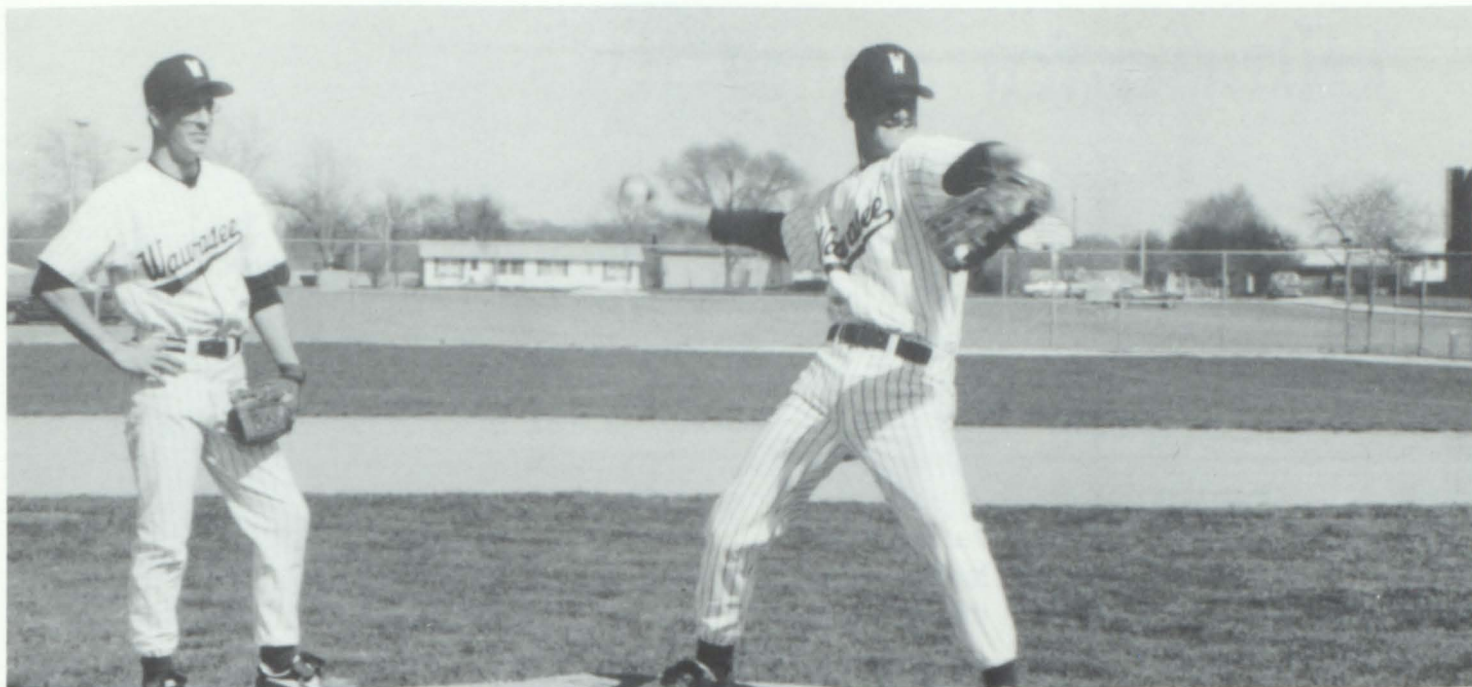

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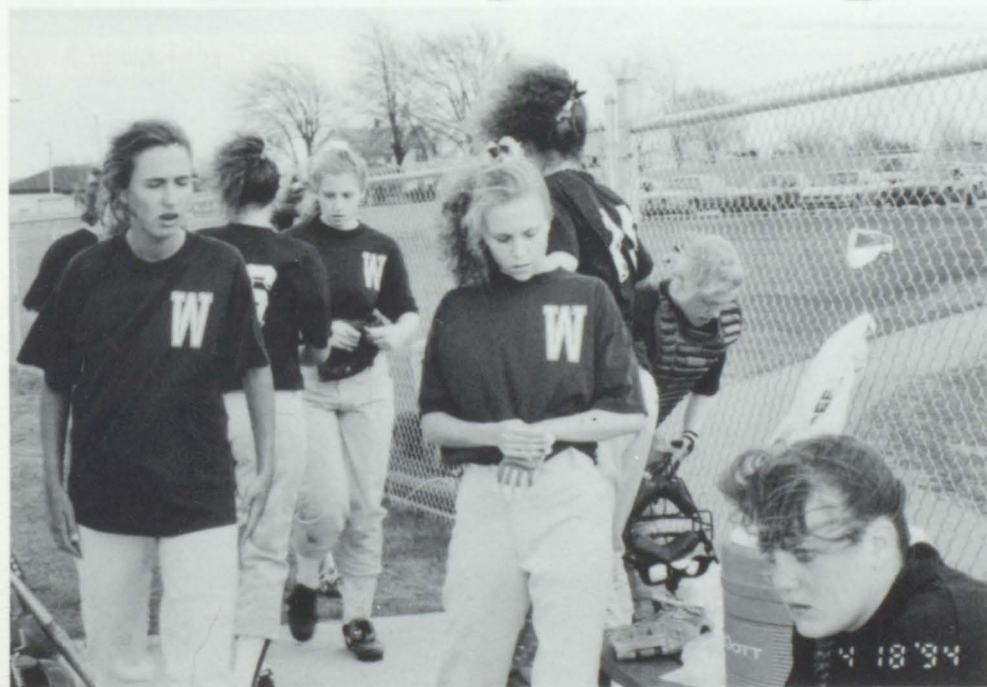

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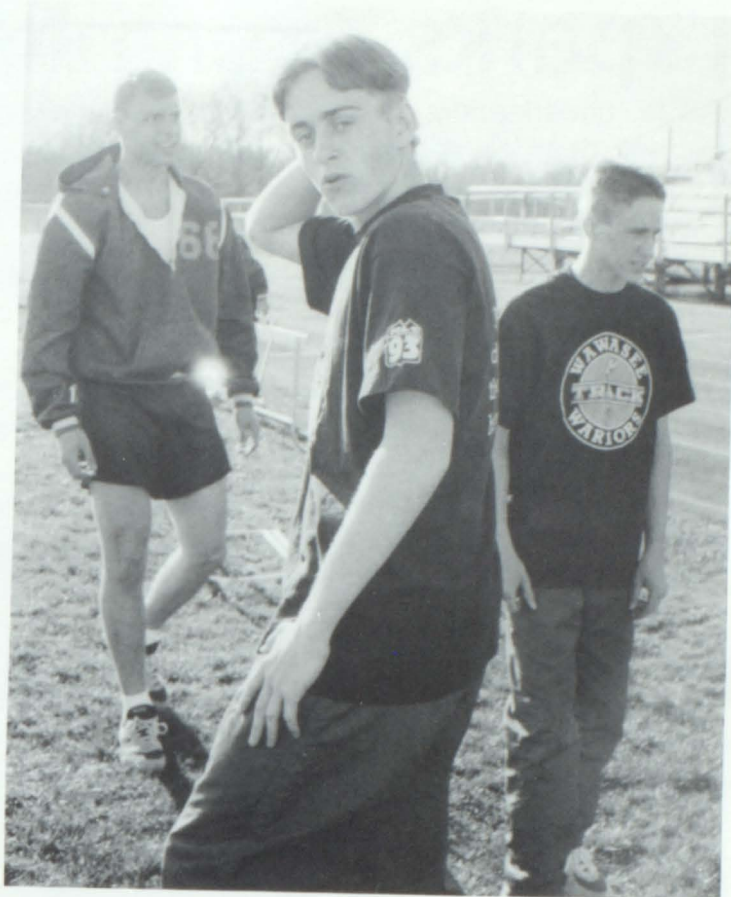
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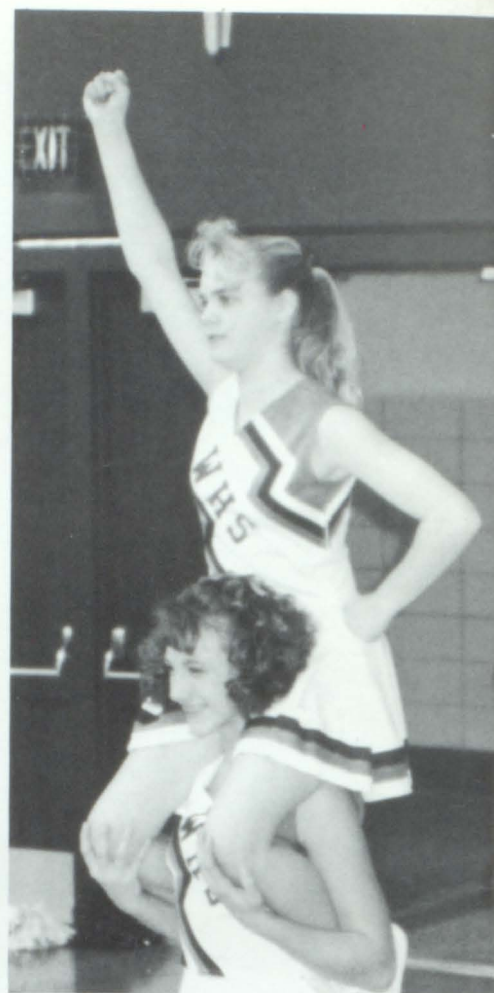

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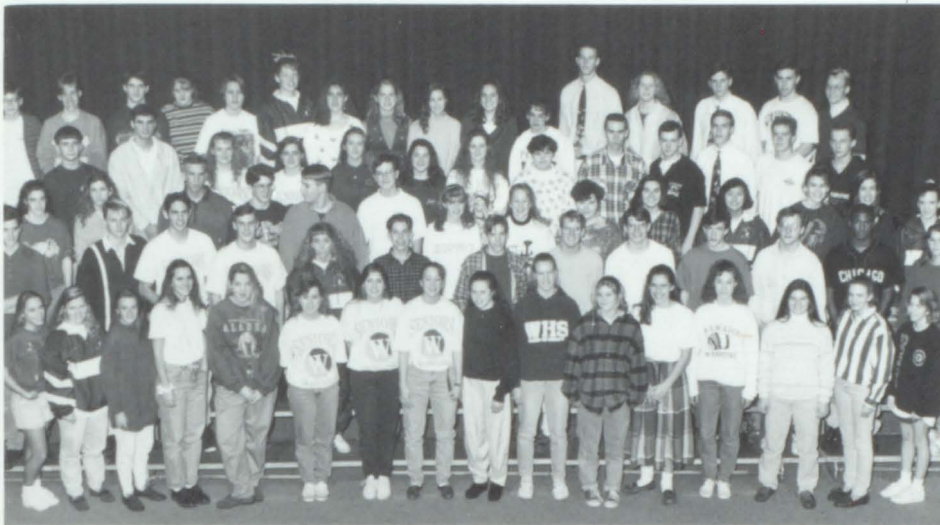


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FCA helps others

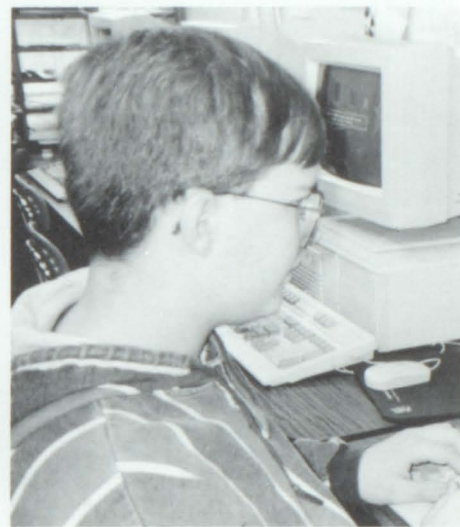

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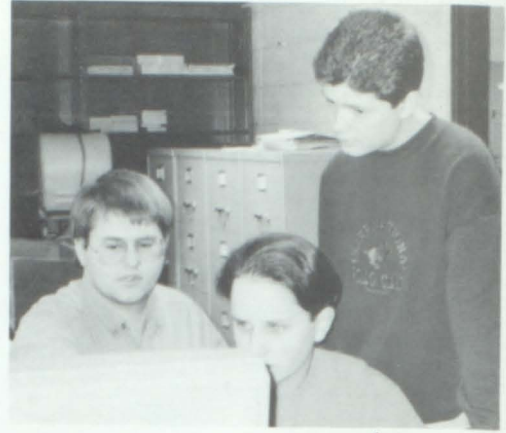

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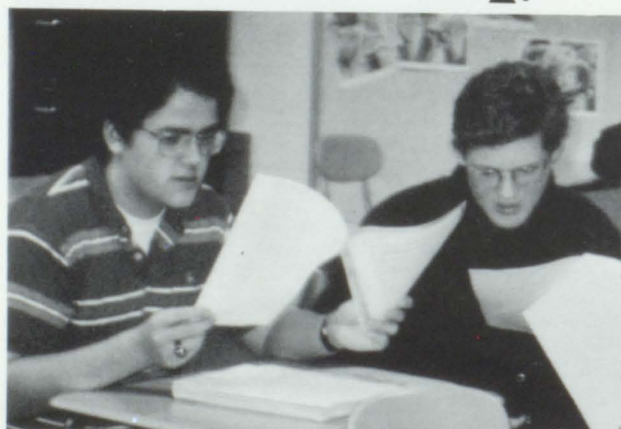

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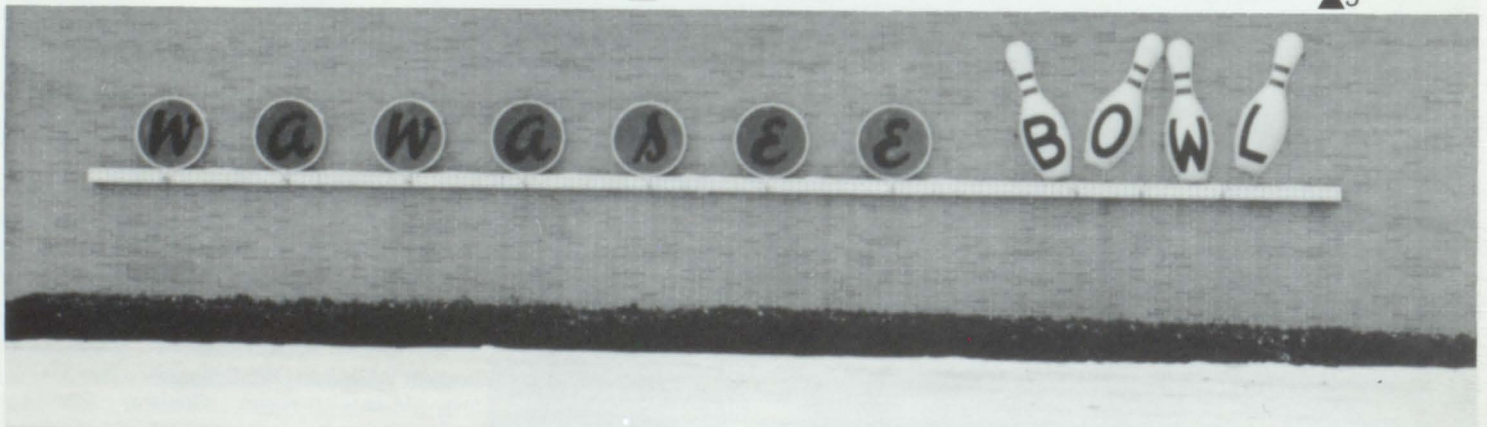
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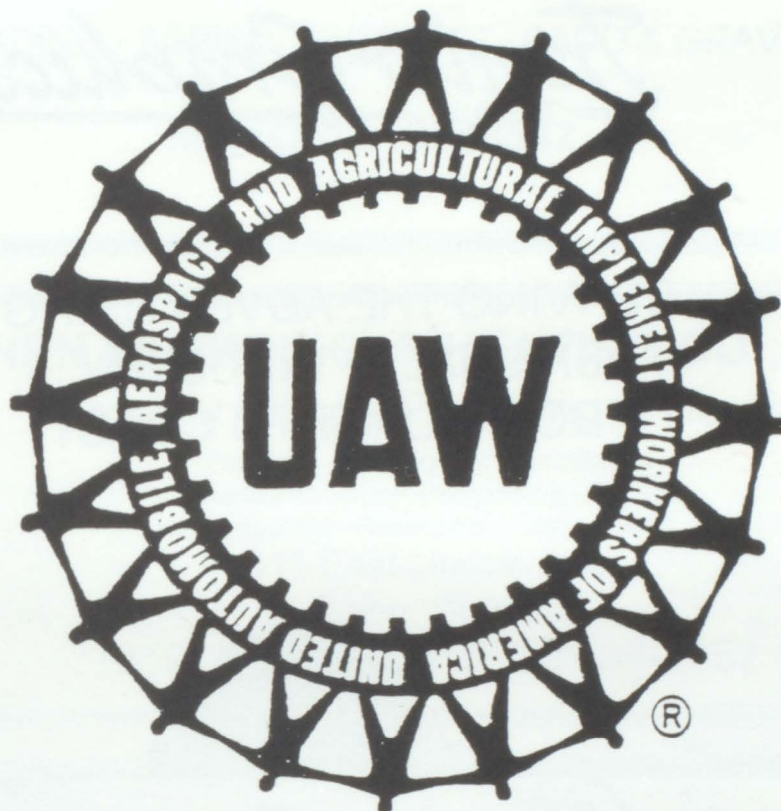
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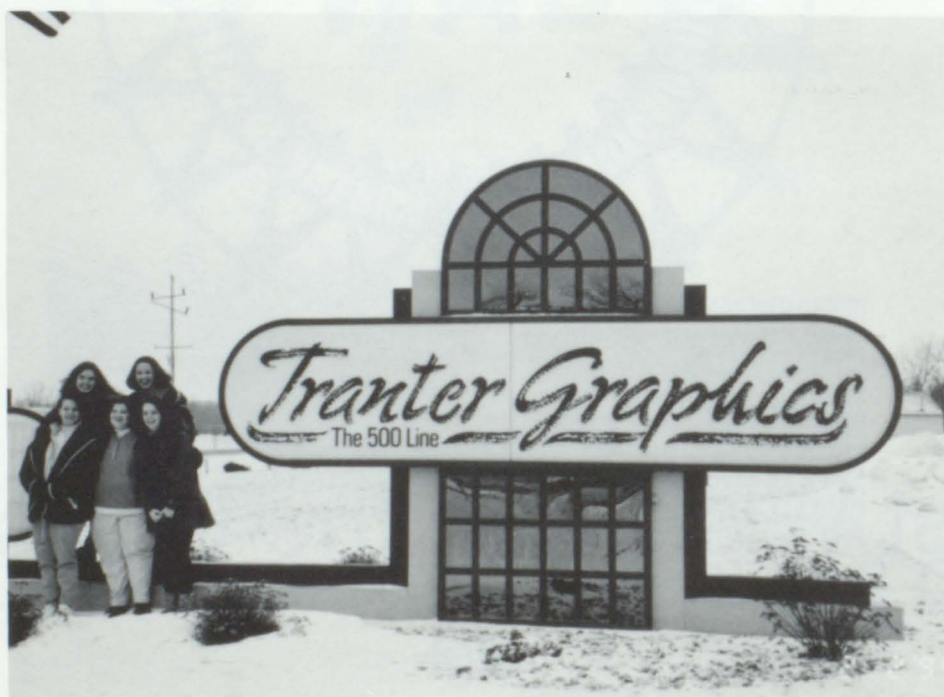
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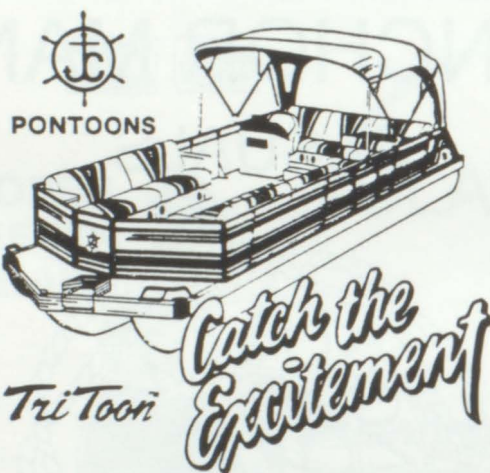
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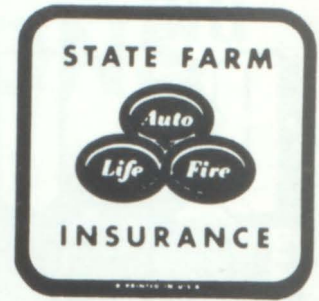
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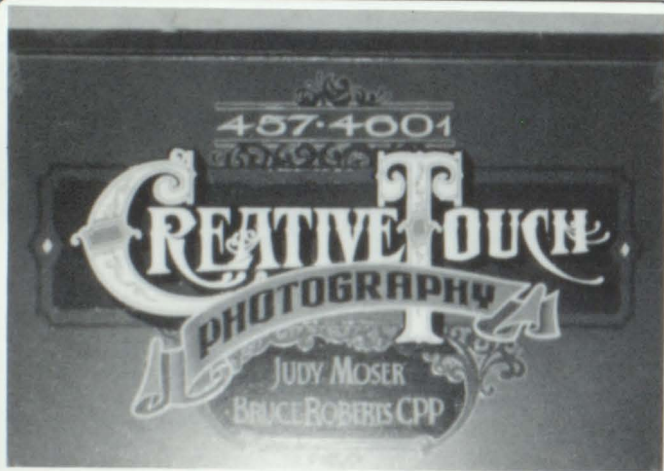
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The Legend

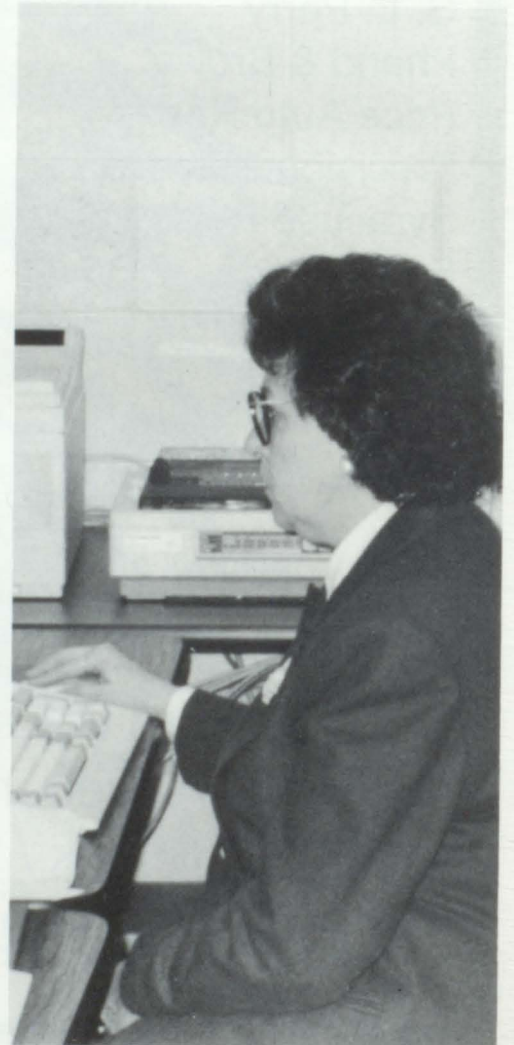

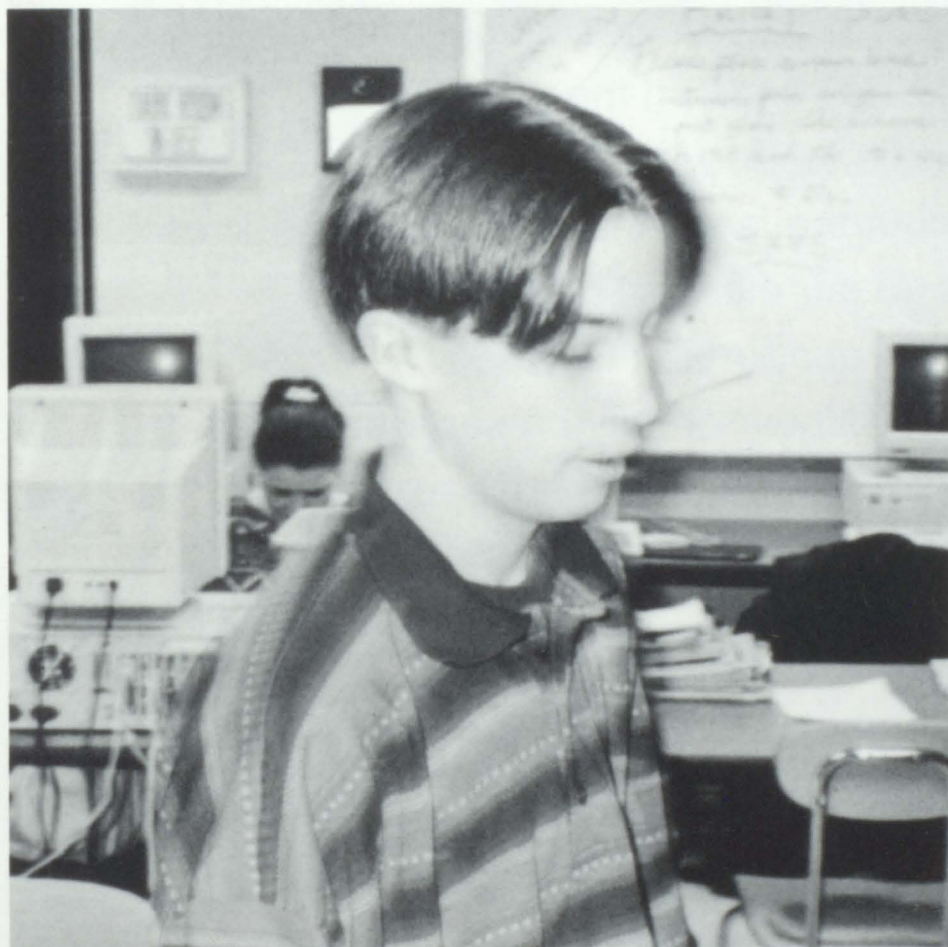


