Mrs. Thomas, library aide, graduated in 1977. During high school she was involved in athletics such as volleyball, basketball, and tennis.



Most graduates keep on going when they finish their senior year, but some DO return.















# The environment in the '80's and '90's






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### Choirs sound great




## Sophomores keep on going and going...


#### The pack is back

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

### A rough start



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














### DECA competes at district in South Bend












# Yearbook staff meets the deadline









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
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
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




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
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
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# The Legend continues...
