






## Students hoop it up






## Surpassing the goal


### Business excels







## LRC continues to look to the future




## PE introduces new classes


### Tennis keeps trying




#### Wrestlers go to state










### Hands on computers


#### The future is DECA




# FFA earns high honors










## **Smoking Signals**


## Speech team goes to several tournaments



printed in color. The contract price with Herff Jones was \$16,579.62 for 500 copies. although 625 copies were ordered. The school's representative was Julie Taylor from Herff Jones. There were many different jobs that had to be completed by the end of the year such as the layouts that needed to be drawn, copy that had to be written, and pictures that needed to be taken and cropped. All of this took a lot of time and patience. especially since the network down during deadlines.


