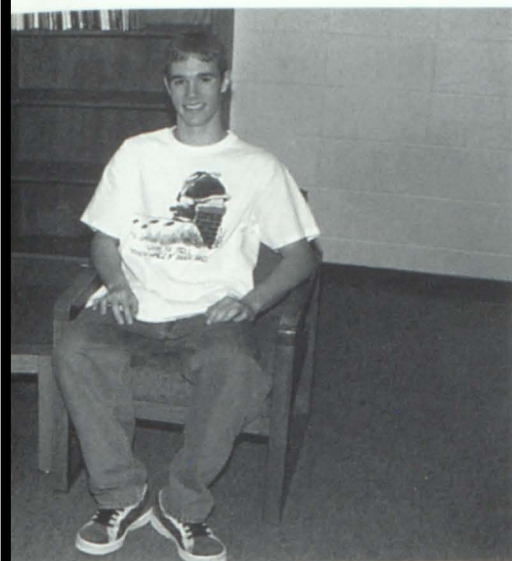

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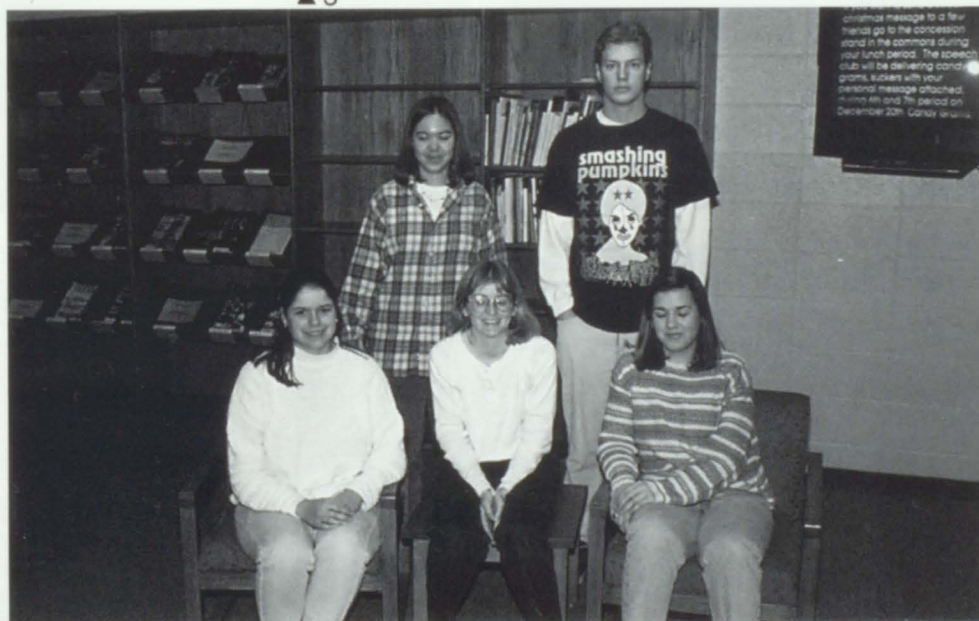

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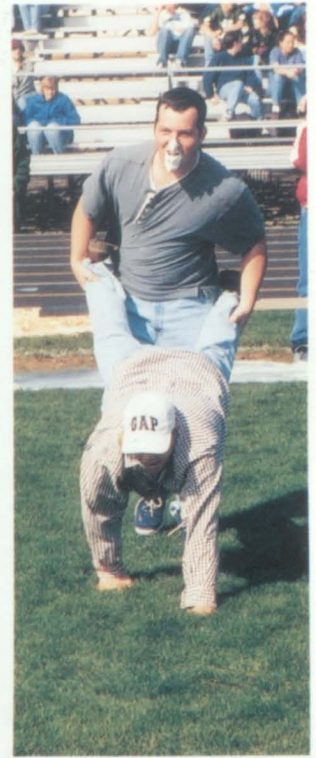

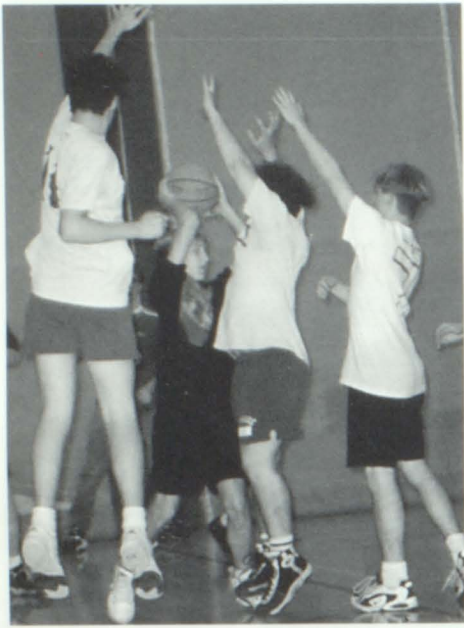

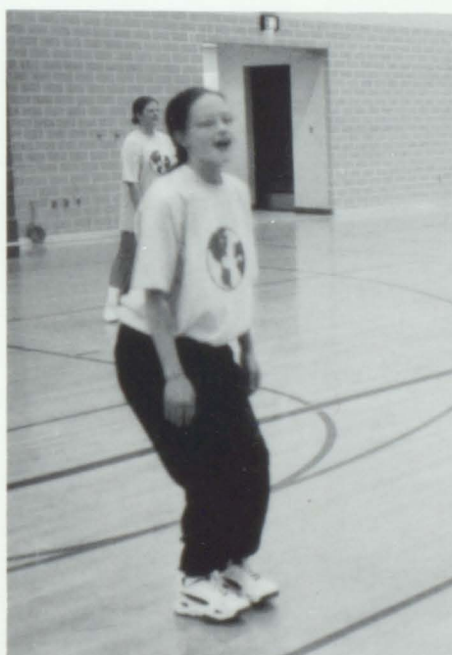

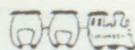
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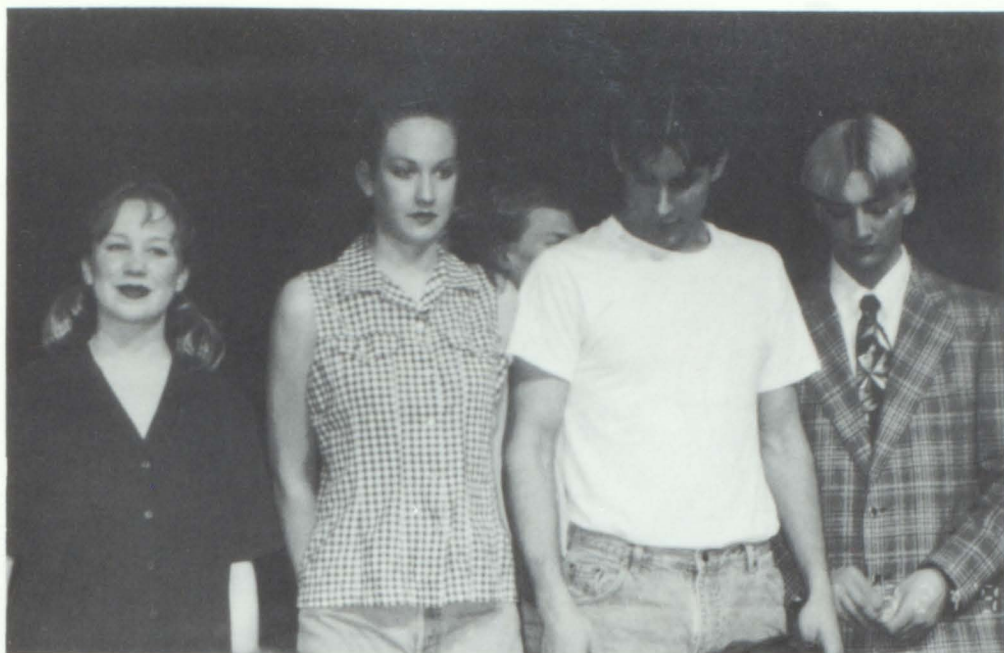

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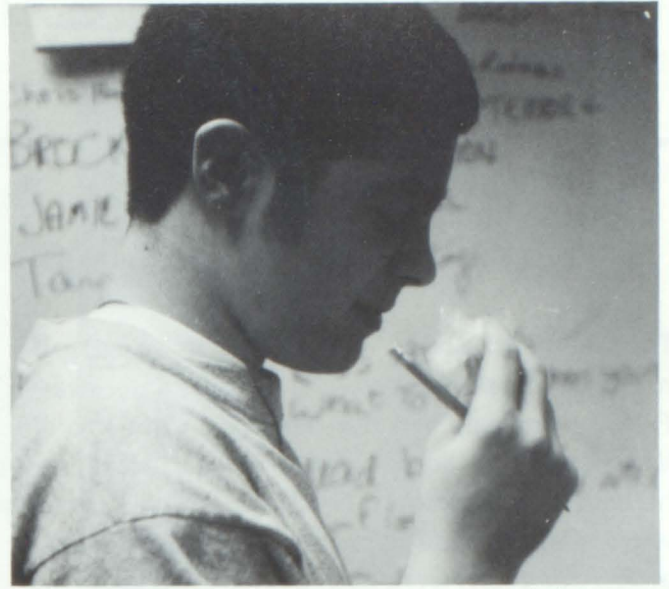

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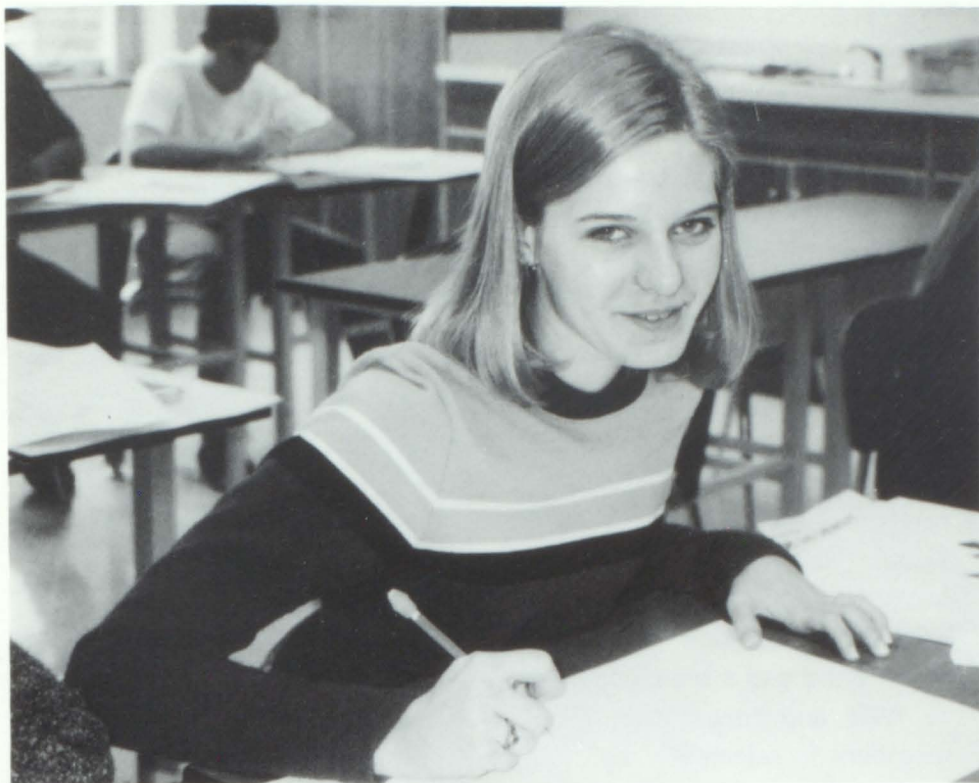

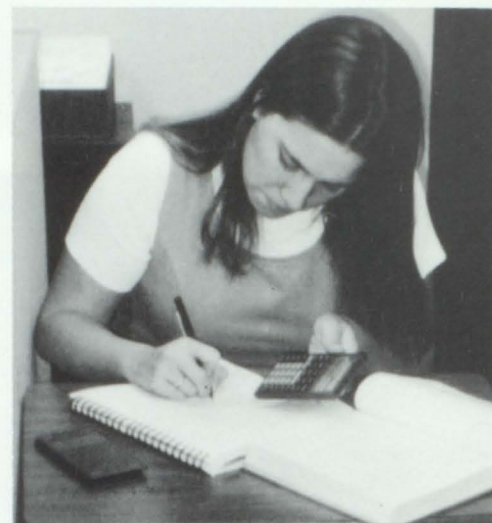
FACES CHANGES

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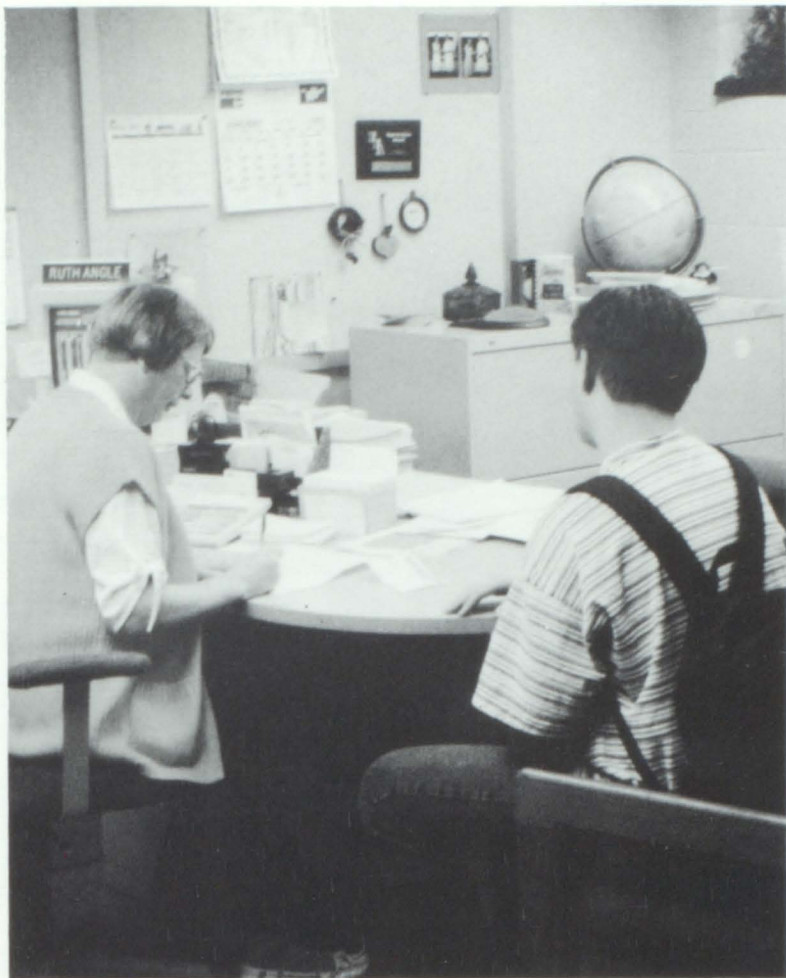

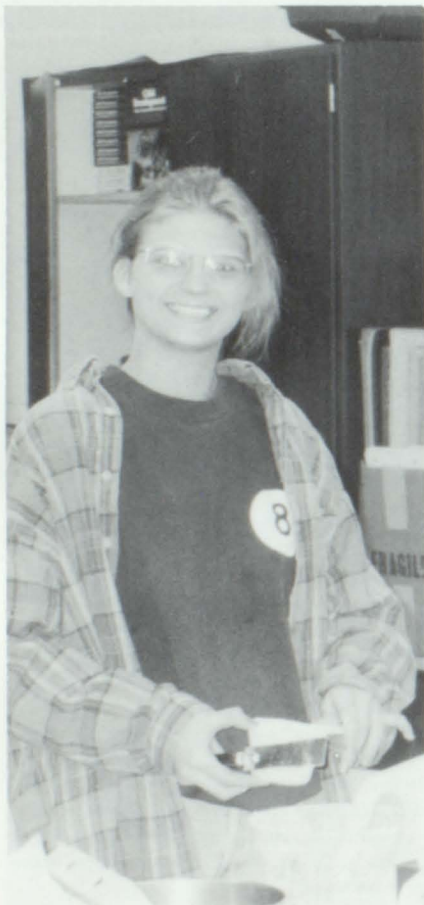
WHAT'S COOKIN'?

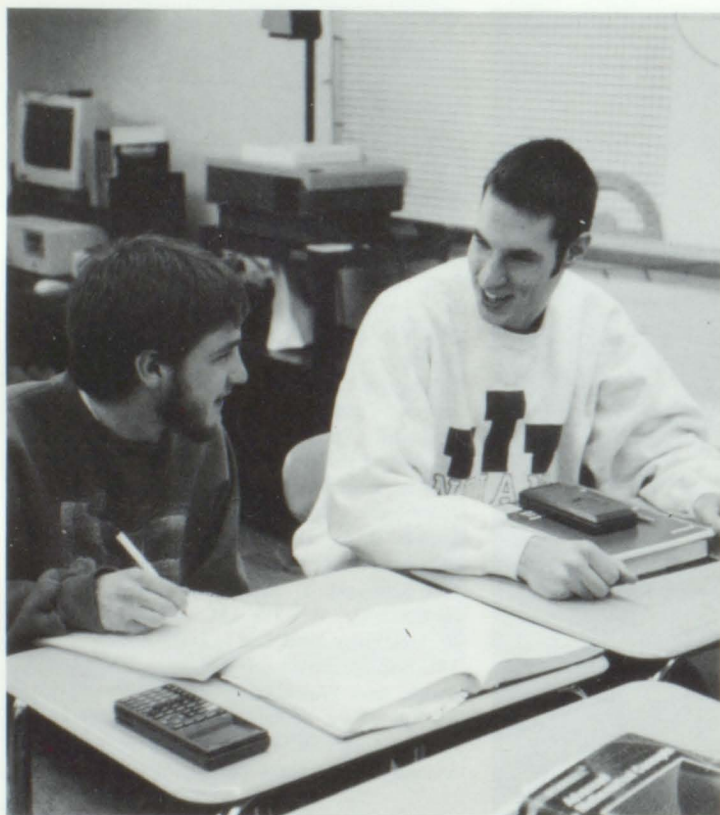
FOR TAKE OFF

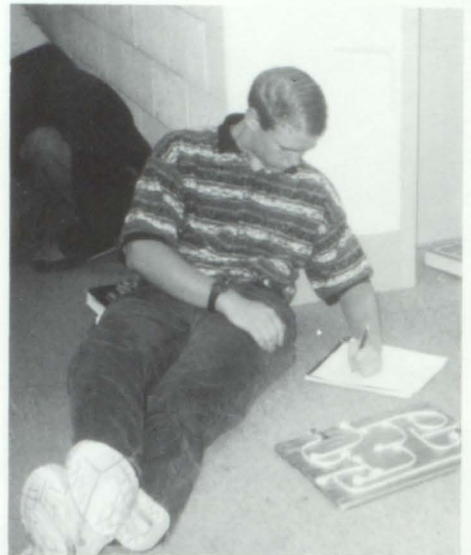
HERE AND NOW

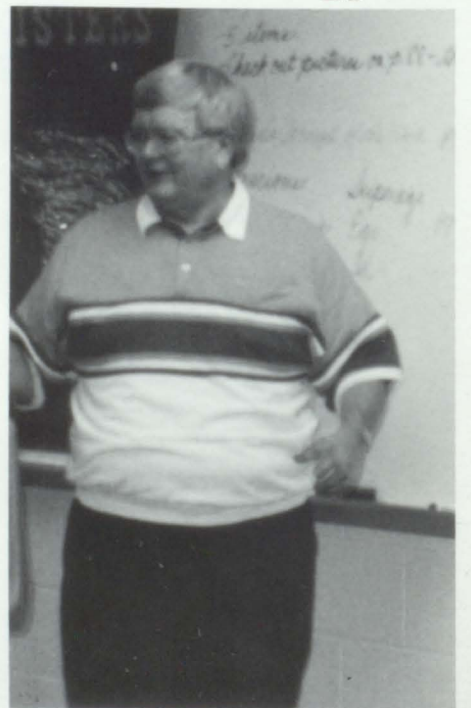
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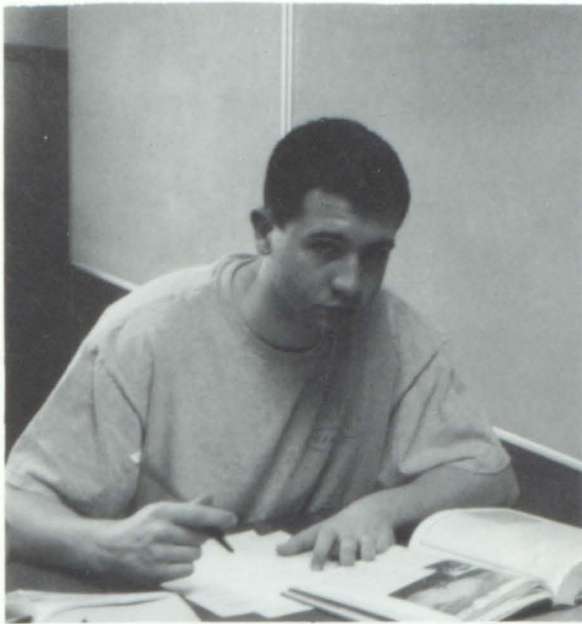

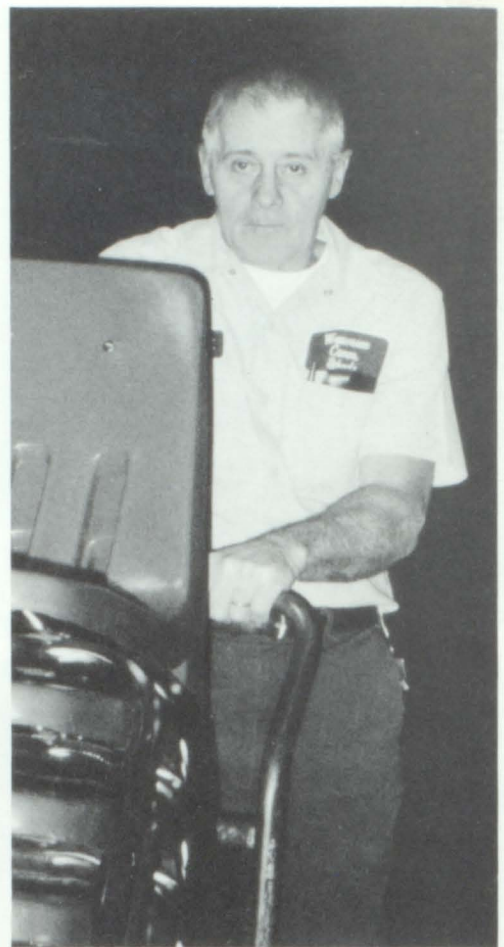
ALWAYS WORKIN'

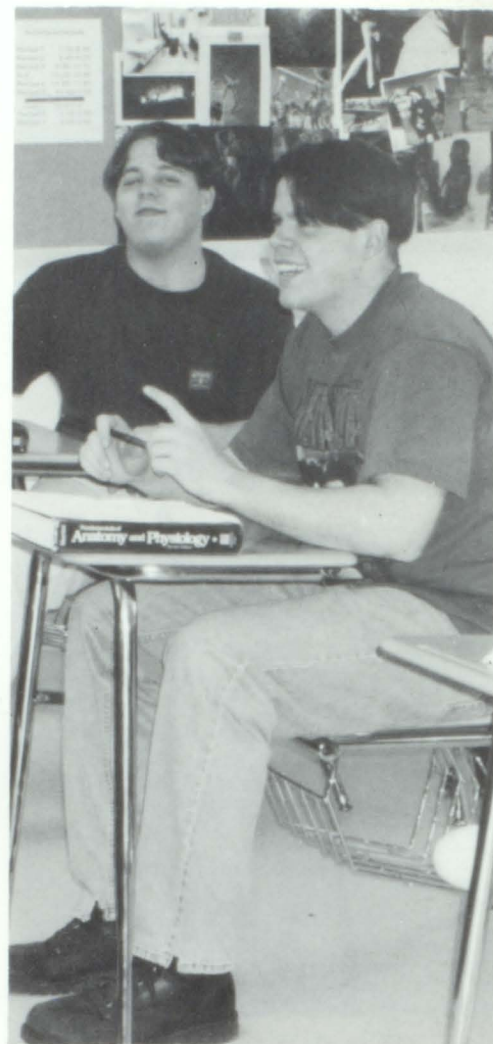

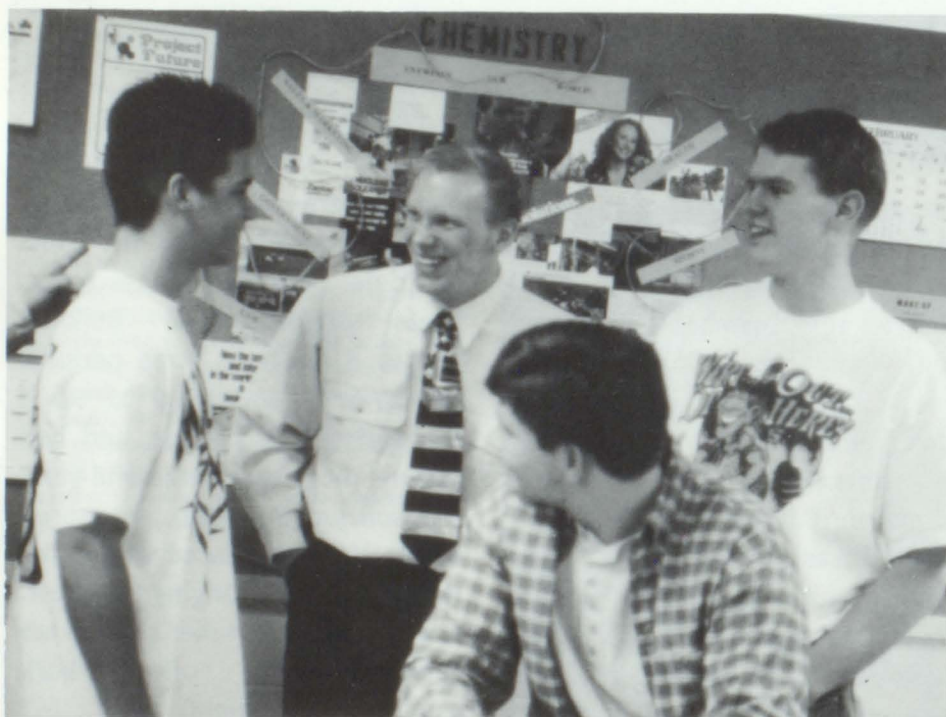
EXCELS AGAIN

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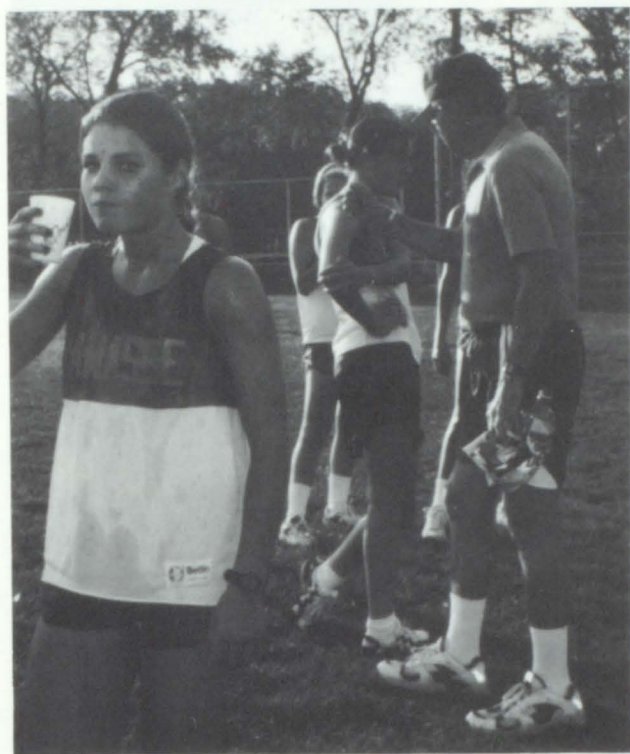

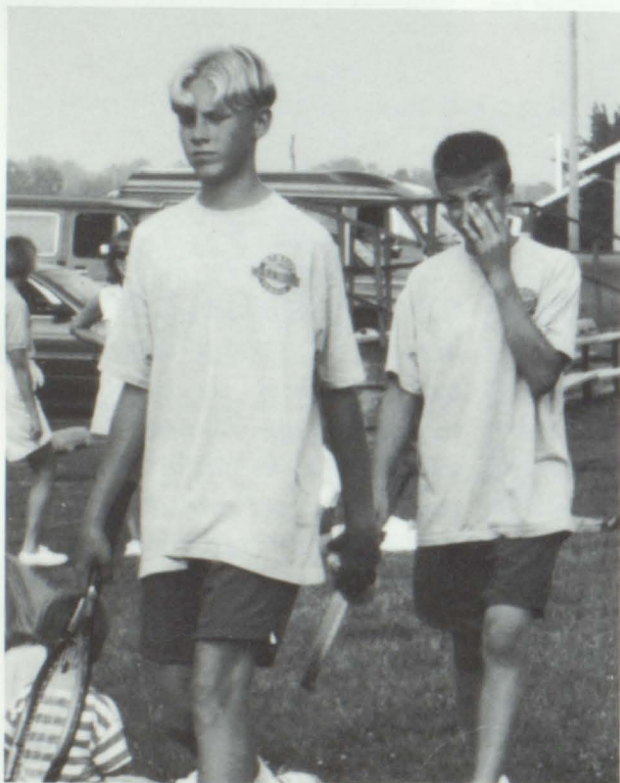
LOOKING GOOD

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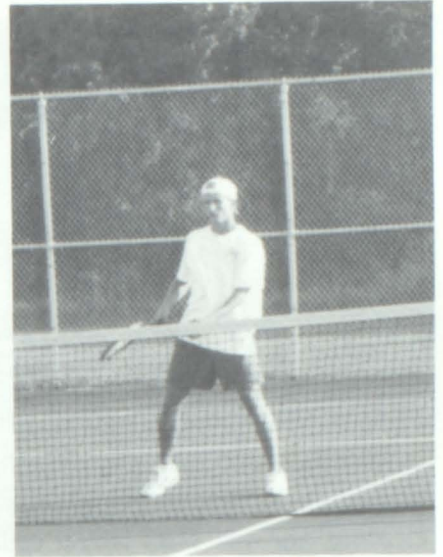

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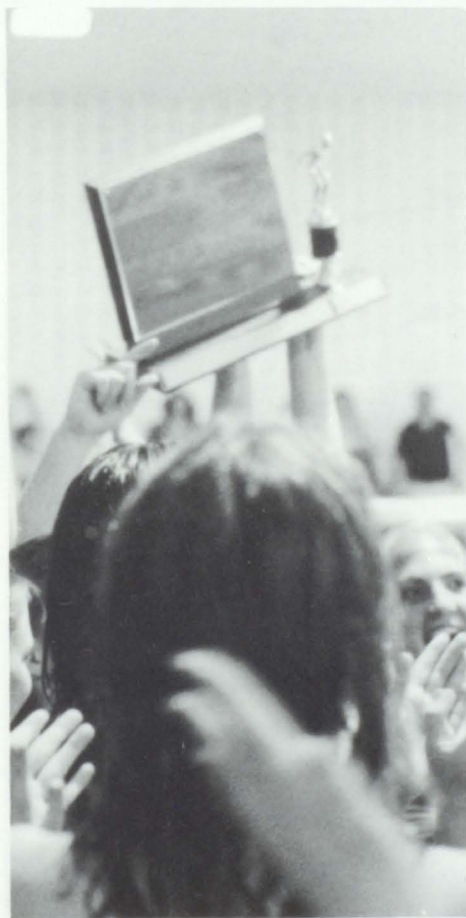

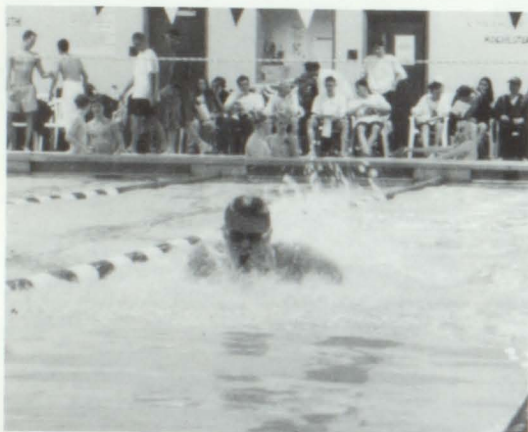
10TH AT STATE

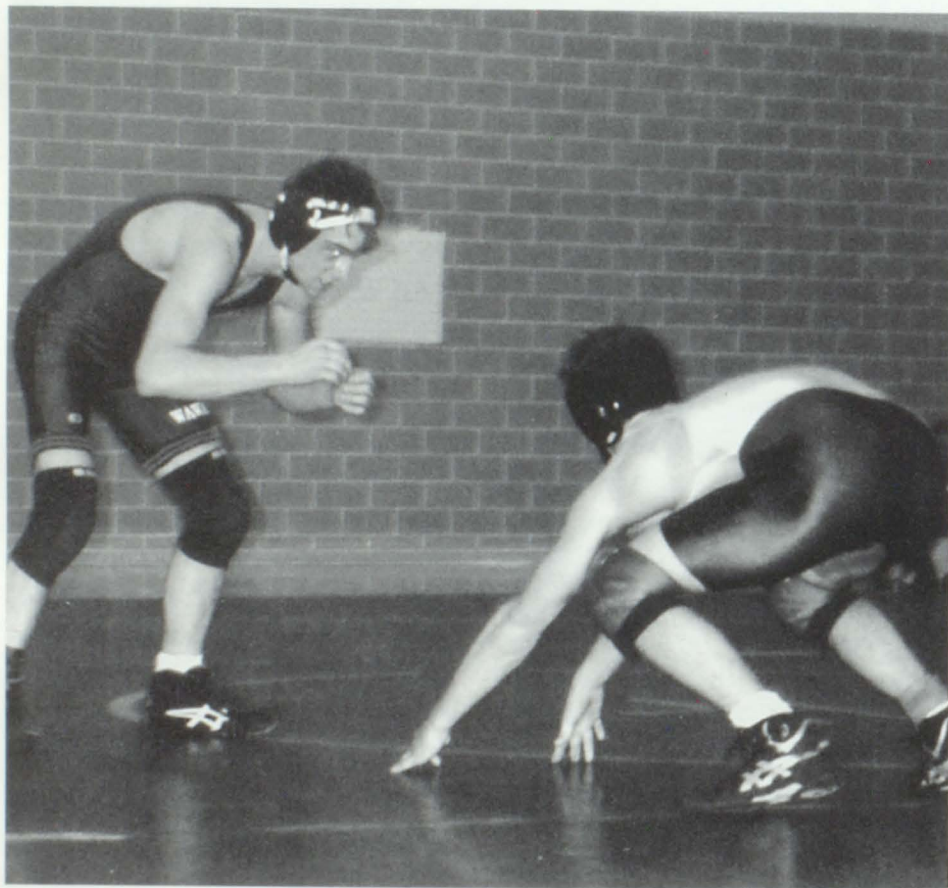
TOTAL TEAM EFFORT

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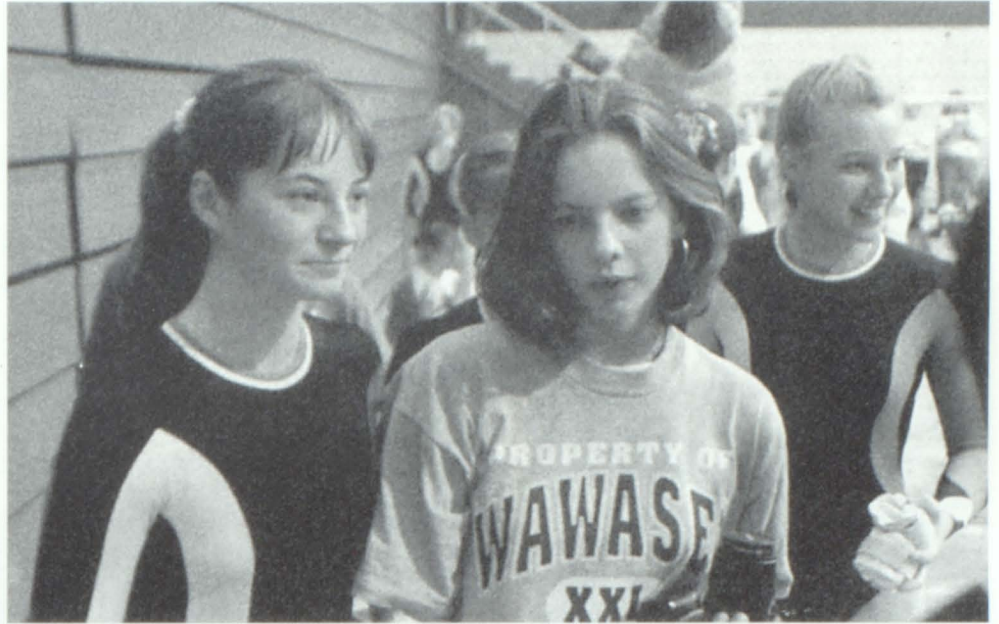

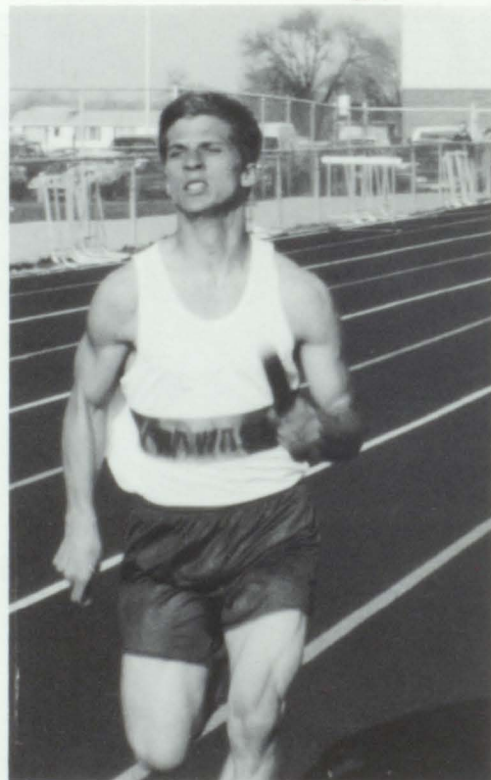
NEW ATTITUDE

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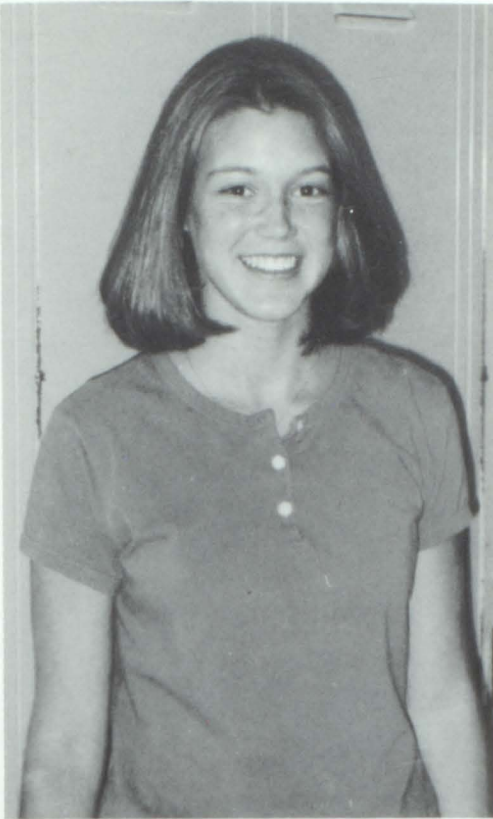

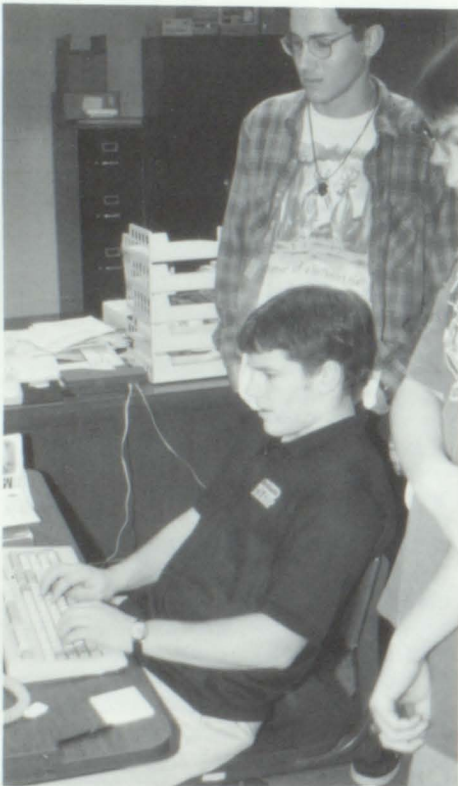
GOES ONLINE

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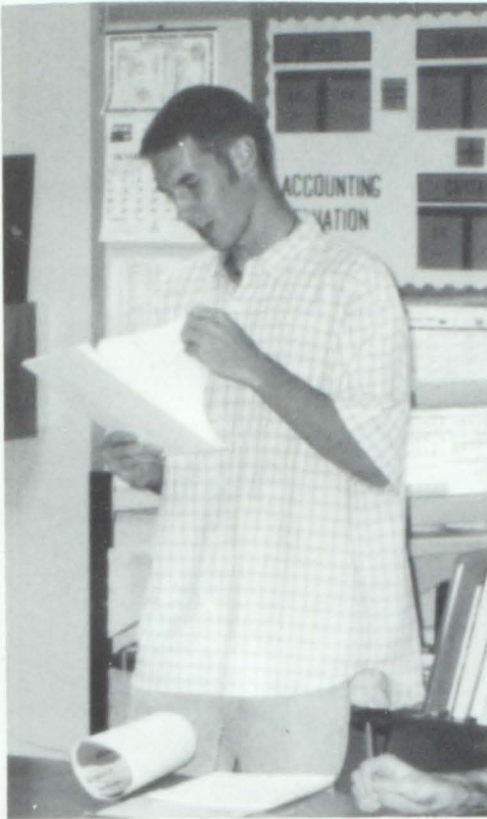

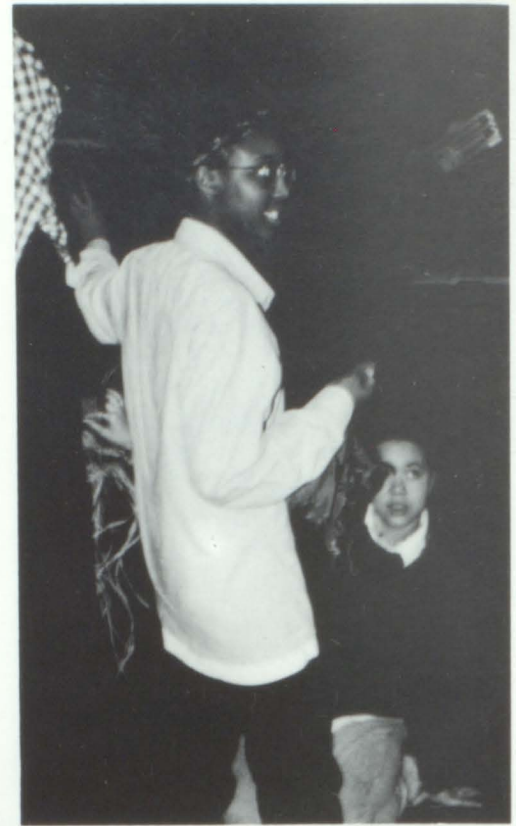

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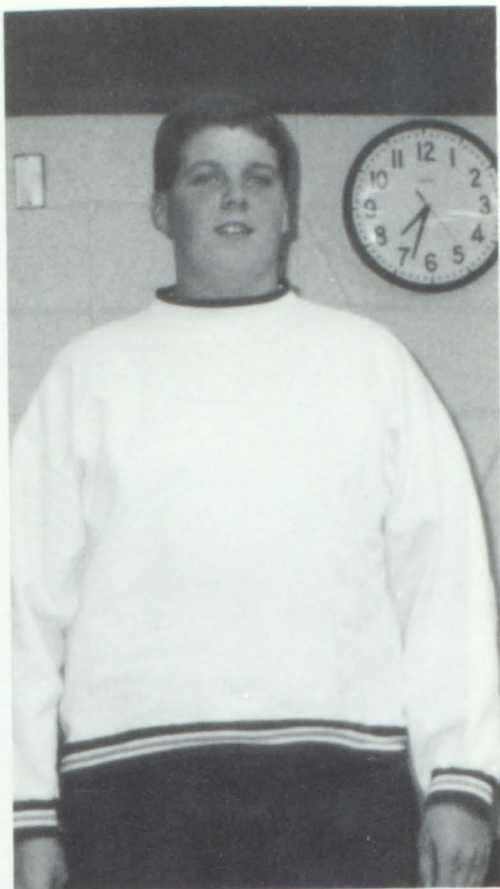

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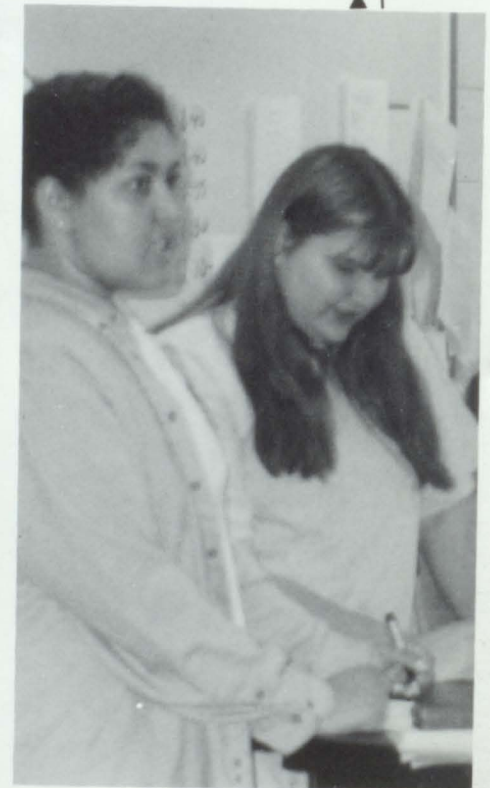

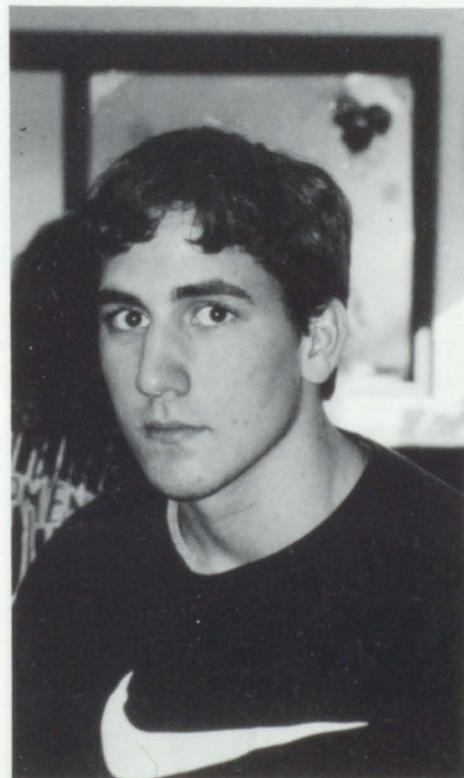

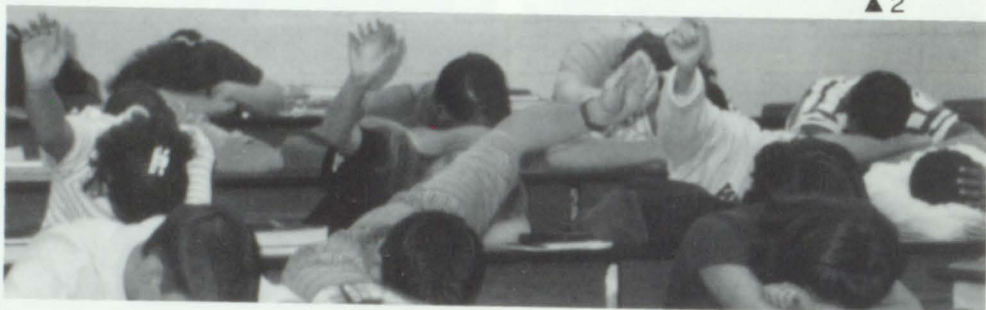

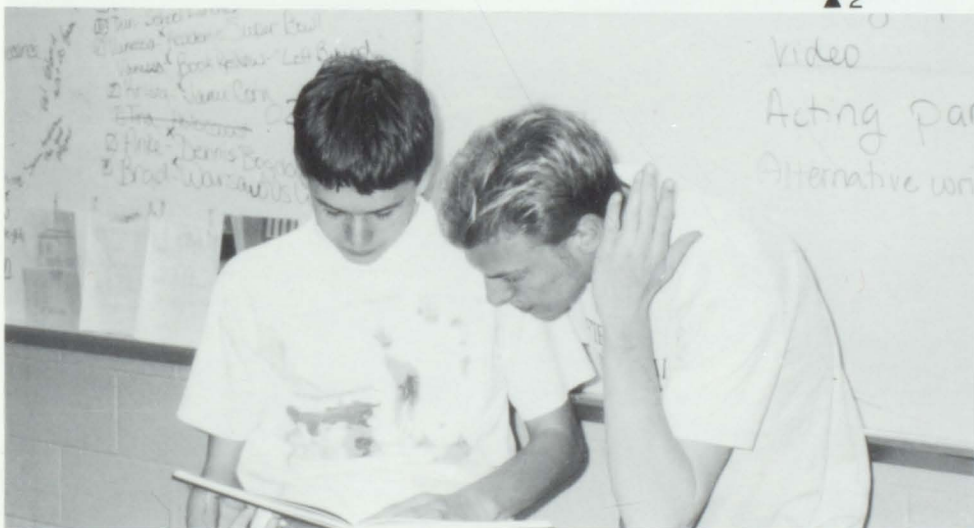

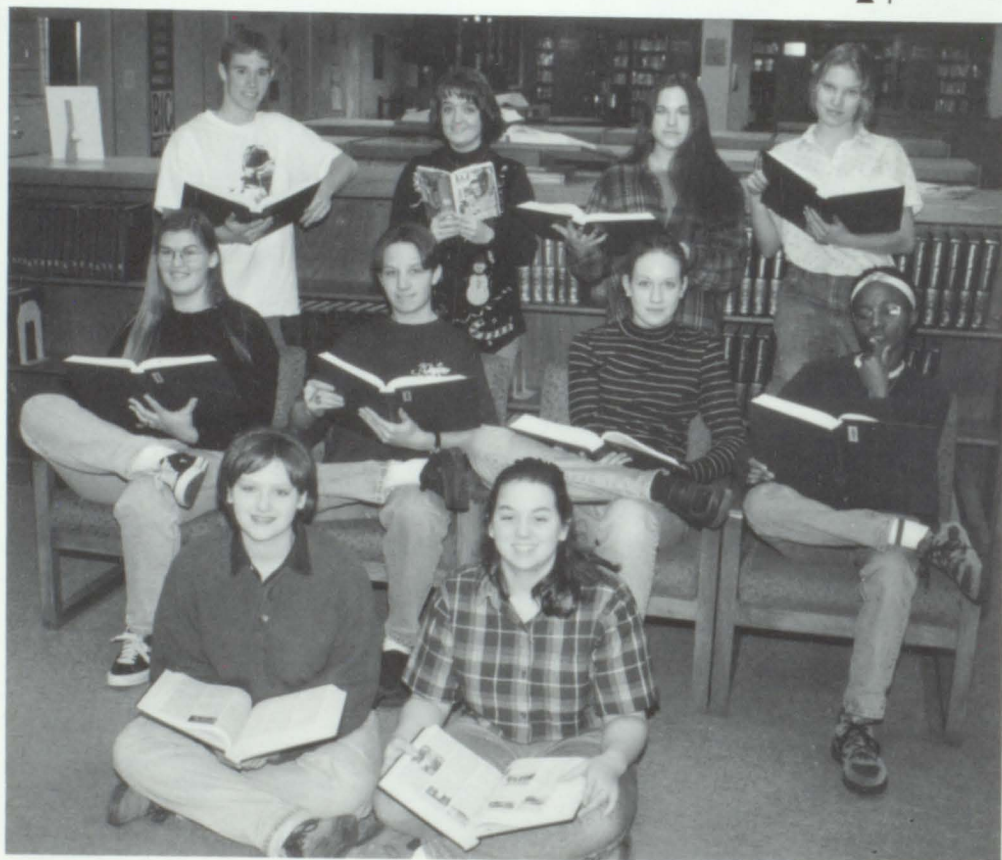

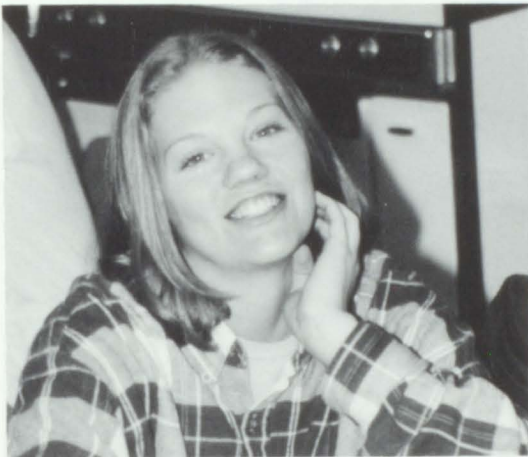
HELPS OUT
